Europeans leave Yanks in a stupor

BROOKLINE, Mass. (AP) — Not even America's 1-2 punch could stop Europe from what could shape up to be another Ryder Cup runaway.

Tiger Woods and David Duval, the top two players in the world, were mere mortals Friday in the presence



Baseball tags out another umpire

Shulock draws 3-game suspension

NEW YORK (AP) — Baseball disciplined another umpire Friday when American League president Gene Budig suspended John Shulock for three games and fined him an undisclosed amount following a blowup in a game between Anaheim and Tampa Bay on Monday night.

Budig acted because of Shulock's "overly aggressive behavior, display of temper, inappropriate remarks and physical contact" with Tampa Bay catcher Mike DeFelice.

Working behind the plate in the game at Anaheim, Shulock




