

Before the state playoffs start, each of the six Cedar Rapids-Marion representatives in the Mississippi Valley Conference will get a shot at either topranked West or No. 2 City. West must play Xavier, Jefferson and Prairie. City High has games left with Linn-Mar, Ken-

nedy and Washington.

The first of those six to defeat West or City High prior to the 1999 playoffs will win "The Steel Toe Boot," a trophy I will commission to mark the beginning of the renaissance of Cedar Rapids high school football. Hopefully.

This is being done with nothing but respect and admiration for West's Trojans and City

High's Little Hawks. The football dominance they have displayed the last several years has been remarkable. City High has three state titles and a 69-10 record since 1993. West has a 47-3 mark and two state crowns since 1995. Since '95, the two schools have lost only a total of two games to someone other than each other.

If West and City hadn't been so good for so long, putting this bounty of sorts on them wouldn't be necessary.

The last time a Cedar Rapids-Marion school defeated City High or West was Sept. 5, 1997, when Prairie toppled City High, 17-10. The Little Hawks still finished the season as the state 4A runner-up.

The last time a C.R.-Marion school won a state football title

was when Linn-Mar accomplished it in 1990.

Reasons for Iowa City's edge in high school football are obvious. Sure, it has great coaches, great athletes, great school and parental support, great middleschool programs and great tradition. That's all helpful, yes. But here's what it really boils down to:

Like most college towns, Iowa City is full of kids who grow up tougher than barbed wire. The children of university administrators and professors live hardscrabble lives, clawing for everything they get. It makes them hard, it makes them mean. It's the law of the jungle in Iowa City. Just surviving those mean streets builds the hearts of warriors.

And yet . . .

There are five players from Cedar Rapids-Marion and Iowa City currently in the NFL. That's where the toughest of the tough play football. Believe it or not, C.R.-Marion is responsible for three of the five.

Linebacker Marc Lillibridge (Linn-Mar) is with the New Orleans Saints. Wide receiver Dedric Ward (Washington) is with the New York Jets. Quarterback Kurt Warner (Regis) is a St.

Louis Ram. Iowa City High has given the NFL receiver Tim Dwight of the Atlanta Falcons and tight end Michael Roan of the Tennessee Titans.

Dwight, Roan, Ward and Warner all scored touchdowns between Sept. 20 and Sept. 26. Lillibridge is on injured reserve all this season because of neck

surgery, but he also had a big weekend. He got married in Cedar Rapids last Saturday night.

So you see that Cedar Rapids can produce rugged, hungry football players just as well as Iowa City does. It's a matter of wanting it as much as those brawlers from Coralville, University Heights and inner city Iowa City.

That's where the "Steel Toe Boot" comes in to play. Which of you Metro teams can take that prize?

You Iowa City bad boys will slug it out tonight. Good luck to both sides. But beware. The season is far from over.

"I think they learned right away what my expectations ahead. were and what kind of program I thought we could have here."

"I think one thing that has really helped us is that we've only got one offensive lineman going both ways," Perkins said. "We're platooning up there, and that makes a big difference. We're able to stay pretty fresh heading into the fourth quarter of these games.'

OWA CITY — Larry Brown has seen his share of good quarterbacks in 20 years as a head football coach.

In the Iowa City High coach's opinion, none are better than Iowa City West's Kevin Long. Brown's Little Hawks (4-0) face Long-led West (4-0) tonight.

'I think he's as good as any high school quarterback I've seen in Iowa," Brown said. I can't think of anybody that I've seen that's better.'

At 6-foot-5, 200 pounds, Long is a legitimate Division-I prospect who already has received scholarship offers from Iowa, Iowa State and Kansas. He said he's received heavy attention from Kansas State in recent weeks.

Between his rushing and passing, Long has accounted for 753 yards and 11 touchdowns in four




