# **CP-U** falls in overtime

Smallest player makes biggest play

Gazette sportswriter **IGOURNEY** Sande Choun stands 5 feet, 6 inches tall.

But the Sigourney-Keota quarterback made one of the biggest plays in a 21-20 overtime heartstopper over No. 7 Center Point-Urbana here Monday.

Choun's 5-yard touchdown run on a quarterback keeper capped the thrilling playoff victory for the Savage Cobras, who now get Starmont (10-1) in a Class 2A semifinal next Monday at the UNI-Dome in Cedar Falls.

CP-U (10-1) got the ball first in overtime and, after a motion penalty, scored immediately as Matt Ditch found Seth Wear for a 15-yard touchdown pass. But the two-point conversion pass failed, and the Stormin' Pointers' lead stood at 20-14.

Then on third down, Choun faked a handoff to Jake Flanders, fooling the Stormin' Pointers' defense, and rolled around the left end for a score.

One CP-U defender raised his arms in celebration, thinking Flanders had been stuffed at the line of scrimmage, while Choun scurried into the end zone.

Derek Greiner tacked on the extra point and sent the overflow crowd into a frenzy.

'That play has been working the whole year," Choun said. "I fake to Jake, then go around the corner. They never saw me coming.

CP-U committed four costly turnovers, including two in the final five minutes, to help force the extra period.

One of those miscues came with CP-U at the Savage Cobras' 5-yard line with the Stormin' Pointers driving for the apparent winning score. But a handoff exchange between Ditch and Ben Wyckoff was fumbled on third-and-4 with 4:53 to play,

S-K (9-2) was led by Flanders' 113 yards on 25 carries. The Savage Cobras amassed 354 rushing yards on the night.

Wyckoff carried the ball 14 times and had 102 of CP-U's 113 yards on the ground.

Based on common opponents, you figured CP-U would have the edge. The Stormin' Pointers downed North Cedar and Solon, both winners over Sigourney-Keota during the regular sea-

But this is a Sigourney-Keota team that won its eighth in a row and always has the capability of steam-rolling opponents with its powerful, yet deceptive, single-wing attack.

# Top-ranked Trojans vault into Class 4A semifinals

EDAR RAPIDS — For the entire season, Iowa City West's Kevin Long has done a first-class job of impersonating a first-rate high school

Monday night at Kingston Stadium, it was Long's first-class impersonation of a pinball that led West to its 24th straight

win over the last two seasons. Long broke at least four tackles and bounced off a couple of other would-be tacklers on a bruising 16-yard fourth quarter touchdown run that lifted topranked West to a 24-17 win over No. 8 Kennedy in a Class 4A playoff quarterfinal before an estimated 6,000 fans.

The Trojans improved to 11-0 and advanced to Friday's semifinal round at the UNI-Dome in Cedar Falls for the second straight year. They will play fifth-ranked Bettendorf (10-1) at 4:30 p.m.

Kennedy ended its season at 8-3.

The game was close not only on the scoreboard, but also in the stat book. West finished with 291 total yards, Kennedy with 301. The Cougars totaled 172 on the ground and 129 through the air, the Trojans 98 on the ground and 193 through

But close didn't cut it for the Cougars, The Cougars had tied the score at 17 on who let their emotions spill out on the field in the form of tears at game's end.

"I'm disappointed for the kids," Kennemoved the Trojans 68 yards in just six dy Coach Don Knock said. "This is a


