Kennedy makes City sweat

Little Hawks get past Cougars

IOWA CITY — Maybe it was a bit unimpressive. But when the driest things around are the water bottles, a football game that ends with a victory and a cool shower is acceptable.

Iowa City High, a preseason pick to win the Class 4A championship, sweated out a 21-7

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victory over Cedar Rapids Kennedy on a steamy, soak-your-jersey Friday night at Bates Field.

All the scoring took place in the first quarter.

"It was an ugly night. From our standpoint, it was an ugly game," City High Coach Larry Brown said. "But I've been coaching long enough to be pretty happy with a win."

The Little Hawks scored their three touchdowns in a span of 2 minutes, 11 seconds, after Kennedy had taken a 7-0 lead — and that was it.

Matt Wooldrik accounted for most of City High's offense, gaining 164 yards and scoring two touchdowns on 20 carries. The junior was making his first varsity start in place of star tailback Hakim Hill, who was serving a one-game disci-

plinary suspension.

Wooldrik scored first-quarter touchdowns on runs of 11 and 16 yards. He also uncorked a 33-yarder that brought life to the Little Hawks after they trailed.

On a night when officials stopped the game four times for water breaks, Wooldrik ran as if he was unaffected by the hot, muggy air.

"I was looking forward to this for a while," Wooldrik said. "I had a lot of energy. We didn't play as well tonight as we wanted to. But the offensive line was great. They gave me the holes."

City High outgained Kennedy, 259-214. The Cougars had 13 first downs to City High's 12.

It was not a typical Little Hawk pasting.

"Kennedy certainly is to be complimented," Brown said. "They played a great football game."

City High managed second-half scoring threats, but committed five turnovers.

Before Wooldrik and Co. erupted, Kennedy showed not just promise, but an ability to move the ball against the Little Hawks.

The Cougars went 54 yards on eight plays on the game's

opening drive before turning it over on downs at City High's 26.

Then, they scored first, when burly lineman Bob Leadford scooped a Skyler Moss fumble and hustled 48 yards for a touchdown with 5:13 left in the first quarter.

In the second quarter, Kennedy accounted for five first downs on a 72-yard drive that came up empty when Troy Blankenship was wide right on a 40-yard field goal try.

"I'm real proud of our kids. The word for this week was believe," first-year Kennedy Coach Tim Lewis said. "We came in believing."

"I'm sure there was some kids that doubted it. But we came out in the first half and they saw we could play with them."

Junior quarterback Matt Keel was sharp for the Cougars. He completed 14 of 27 passes for 144 yards. Six of Keel's darts went to Mike Hachey for 59 yards.

"(Keel's) going to be a great one," Lewis said. "He had a lot of poise out there."

Kennedy, which lost 20 starters from last year's team that beat City High, will continue its re-building process next Friday with a date against Cedar Rapids Jefferson.

Hill and City High return to action with a Thursday night tilt at Dubuque Senior.

Alburnett rolls by Central City

It's been said football is a game of field position.

Alburnett proved that theory to be true as it thumped Central City, 34-16, Friday night in a Class 1A game at Alburnett.

Quarterback Nick Scott took advantage of outstanding field position in the first half, scoring three times for the Pirates.

Alburnett jumped out to a 26-0 halftime lead on the three Scott touchdowns and another from Brandon Schrock. Three of the Pirates' first-half scoring drives started on the Wildcat end of the field.

Micky Roseberry set up the first score with a 30-yard punt return to the Central City 20. Scott scampered around left end the remaining 20 yards.

The Pirates recovered a Wildcat fumble on the 20 and, after a five-yard plunge by Austin Unertl, Scott took off again around the left end for a 15-yard score.

Scott got the hat-trick on a 65-yard interception return to make the score 18-0.

Alburnett then took over on the Central City 46 and capped off the drive three plays later on a 25-yard pass from Kyle Reed to Schrock.

"All those things were speed factors," Alburnett Jim Carver said of the field position. "We were able to pick up the fumbles and we able to get it done."

Roseberry ended the Pirates' scoring with a 60-yard touchdown jaunt in the third quarter.

The Wildcats managed to put together two strong second-half scoring drives, first on a 25-yard touchdown pass from Dylan Schmid to Cody Ratliff and, late in the fourth quarter, on a Kevin Dudley two-yard run.

Roseberry led Alburnett with 70 rushing yards. Dudley had 148 yards on 31 carries for

A draw run netted no yardage, then Jedlicka took a pitch right down the sideline and into the end zone for the winning TD.

Bartlett's third extra point of the night made it 21-17.

Jedlicka then intercepted a desperation pass from backup Mount Vernon quarterback Kyle Nelson to file things away.

"We had lots of opportunities to quit and never did," said Solon Coach Ed Hansen. "Obviously, anytime you can get a win at Mount Vernon, you feel exceptionally good about it. track, then mobbed the field after the final horn sounded to end the game.

Thus ended an exhausting, yet joyous, evening for Klith, who toted the ball 30 times on a steamy night.

"In the first half, I was exhausted," Klith said. "In the fourth quarter, I wasn't even tired."

Prairie took a 6-3 lead when Klith gathered a swing pass from Joe Martin in the right flat, broke a tackle, then outran the coverage for an 84-yard score.

The play came on third-and-14 from the Hawks 16-yard line.

Klith got loose again early in the second quarter for an 82-yard scoring jaunt.

It was nothing fancy; Klith just took the handoff, saw a big hole and sprinted straight ahead to pay dirt.

That gave the Hawks a 13-6 lead. It was 13-9 at intermission.

West was deep in Prairie territory on each of its first four possessions in the contest, but settled for three field goals by Mike Swim.

Swim drilled field goals of 41, 44 and 40 yards in the first half.

He had a 21-yard attempt blocked.

Swim, who broke his leg in each of the last two soccer seasons, apparently suffered another serious leg injury during Prairie's winning drive.

The Trojans ran 31 plays in the first half, compared to 15 for the Hawks, and held an 8-2 advantage in first downs. But Klith's two big plays kept Prairie afloat.

West finally found the end zone — and regained the lead, 16-13 — on its first drive of the second half.

A play after quarterback Adam Smith's 34-yard scoring run was nullified by a holding penalty, Smith found Rex McDonald behind the Prairie secondary for a 44-yard touchdown.

The drive, apparently stalled at the West 33, was kept alive by a roughing-the-punter penalty.

West will entertain Cedar Rapids Washington in its home opener next Friday.

Prairie will pay a visit to Linn-Mar.

Regals answer call of fallen teammate

WELLMAN — "Let's win this game."

Those were the words of Iowa City Regina senior tackle Nick Tones as he was lifted into an ambulance on a stretcher with 3 minutes, 35 seconds left in the first half of the Regals' season football opener against Mid-Prairie Friday.

Tones, one of the team leaders, suffered what is believed to be a dislocated knee, while blocking for teammate Jason Callaghan.

The Regals, who were leading 12-0 at the time, took Tones' words to heart, as they went on to post an impressive 25-6 victory over the Class 2A Golden Hawks.

"We're going to the hospital right now to see him," Regina senior fullback/linebacker Tony Greazel said. "He worked way too hard for this. That kid has heart. He's the leader of this team. I've never been more emotional in my life."

"We had kids really step up."

First-year Regina Coach Kevin Miller isn't sure how long Tones will be out of the lineup

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with the injury.

"The kids got after it. I'm proud of their heart," Miller said. "The team stepped up after that happened."

The first half was all Regals right from the opening kickoff.

Class 1A Regina used a ball-control wishbone offense and a stingy defense to build a 19-0 halftime lead.

The Regals gained 196 total yards on 34 plays. Conversely, Mid-Prairie, which was playing without suspended quarterback Seth Fisher, gained only 18 yards on 16 plays. Fisher is out the first three games after violating the Mid-Prairie student code of conduct.

"They came out and outplayed us right from the start," Mid-Prairie Coach Mark Dalton said of Regina.

Regina rushed for 133 yards on 28 carries and two touchdowns — a 9-yard run by Greazel with 1:52 left in the first and a 1-yard dive by halfback Callaghan with 8:47 remaining in the second.
