New plan for UI sports

Men's, women's athletics become one department under Bowlsby's direction



Gazette sportswriter IOWA CITY — To a feminist field hockey player, this might seem like a bad deal. But be assured, the University of Iowa athletics department won't be a boys' club.

That was the message UI President Mary Sue Coleman emphasized Friday

during a press conference to announce the consolidation of the UI men's and women's athletics departments. "I'm concerned that we main-

tain our commitment to women and that we make progress in gender equity," Coleman said. "I would not have made this move if I didn't believe Bob Bowlsby were not committed to the same end."

Bowlsby, UI men's athletics director for the past 10 years, will assume responsibility for all athletics programs at Iowa. A senior women's administrator position will be created, with the expectation that this person will serve as chief operating officer within athletics.

Bowlsby said the search for that position will begin immediately.

Coleman said she adopted all four recommendations made by a nine-member task force appointed to review the UI's sports programs following Aug. 31 retirement of Dr. Christine Grant, who headed the UI women's athletics department through its 20 years of existence.

The committee's recommendations included the centralization of all unrestricted sources of athletics income. Thus, athletics revenues will be combined and distributed to all UI athletics

Following the committee's lead, Coleman announced four changes Friday:

■ Bowlsby will assume overall supervision of the athletics department, working closely with Paula Jantz, interim director of women's athletics, during the transition.

University general counsel Mark Schantz will assume administrative responsibility for oversight of athletics. Essentially, Schantz is the liaison between Coleman and the athletics department, similar to the position recently vacated by Ann Rhodes, former vice president for university relations and new a member of the UI general counsel's office.

Rhodes was co-head of the Grant committee.


