

## Big 4th propels Kennedy

**C**EDAR RAPIDS — After committing four turnovers in the first half of its game with Cedar Rapids Jefferson Friday night, it looked like Cedar Rapids Kennedy was bound and determined to spend the entire night shooting itself in the foot.

Instead, it was Jefferson that shot itself squarely between the eyes.

The Cougars turned four Jefferson turnovers into four fourth quarter touchdowns and smacked the J-Hawks, 28-7, in front of an estimated 6,000 fans at Kingston Stadium.

"We knew Jefferson would be quick off the line and we

thought we had come with a good defensive plan to stop it," Kennedy Coach Tim Lewis said. "But it wasn't working in the first half so we made some adjustments at halftime. They seemed to be the right adjustments."

Jefferson was clinging to a 7-0 lead three minutes into the fourth quarter when the Cougars' defense took over.

Pat Kremer recovered a fumble in the end zone after Jefferson quarterback Cody Doonan was popped from behind to close the gap to 7-6 with 9:07 left in the game.

The J-Hawks fumbled the ball away again on their own 39 on their next possession, and 10 plays later Jared Godbey plowed into the end zone from a yard out to give Kennedy a 14-7 lead.

Then, in a 27-second spurt from the 2:38 to the 2:11 marks of the final period, Aaron Lagneaux scooped up another loose ball after Doonan was knocked silly by a charging Derek Thoma and returned it 29 yards for a touchdown, and Nick Mohinkle returned a pass interception 53 yards for another TD.

All four Kennedy touchdowns came in just over seven minutes.

In all, the Cougars forced seven J-Hawk turnovers.

"We knew when we came out of the locker room (after halftime) we could do it," said Godbey, who finished with a game-high 90 yards rushing from his halfback slot while doing a solid job in Kennedy defensive secondary. "We

**C**EDAR RAPIDS — Linn-Mar stopped Jason Kohl from running wild again Friday night at John Wall Field.

But they couldn't stop Cedar Rapids Prairie from walking away with a 24-7 victory.

Why? Simply put, the rest of Kohl's offensive and defensive teammates picked up the proverbial slack.

Like Hawk quarterback Tom Langhurst, who threw a first-quarter 12-yard touchdown pass to tight end Zac



## Storm plagues Des Moines tourney

WEST DES MOINES (AP) — Mike McCullough and Bob Gilder shot a 3-under-par 68s Friday to take the early lead in the soggy, weather-plagued Allianz Championship.

Two thunderstorms packing heavy rain and high wind played havoc with the first-year senior tournament, the first delaying the start by four hours and the other resulting in a 2-hour, 15-minute suspension.

The stormy weather rolled through a day after a possible tornado ravaged the Glen Oaks Country Club course during the pro-am competition. When Friday's play finally was called off for the day under darkening skies, 51 of the 78 golfers were still on the nearly deserted course.

Among them was Gil Morgan, who was 6 under with two holes left. Morgan and the others will finish their rounds this morning. Groupings then will be redrawn for the second round.

"It's a long day. You guys feel it, we do, too," said McCullough, who arrived at the course expecting tee off at 7:30 a.m. and did not finish

until shortly after 6 p.m.

"It was a good, solid seven hours of golf and concentrating a lot, which was hard to do."

Spectators were barred from the course because of the stormy weather. What galleries there were consisted of a few hundred club members and residents of the Glen Oaks housing development, enough to deliver a smattering of applause for a good shot.

"We had a few people, so it wasn't just disastrous," Morgan said. "At the same time, if you're playing well, you'd like to have some people there to appreciate some of the shots you're making."

Bobby Wadkins, Isao Aoko and Jay Sigel all came in at 2 under. Doug Johnson, David Lundstrom and Dana Quigley were 3 under.

McCullough, who plays in sandals instead of regular golf shoes, birdied

his first two holes and finished with six birdies and three bogeys. He knocked in a handful of long putts, including a 50-footer for birdie on No. 2 and a 30-footer for birdie on No. 9.

A winner twice this year, McCullough rolled in a straight-ahead 12-footer to save par on No. 12, which was his third hole of the day.


Morgan strung together three straight birdies after nifty approaches with his 9-iron, twice getting to 6 feet and hitting to 3 feet the other time.

Now, he said, he needs to finish the round well today.

"You're always concerned if you're going to continue it the next day," Morgan said.

The weather dealt a cruel blow to the tournament, which had been highly anticipated in the area and drew a classy field that included the top 15 money winners on the senior tour and golfing icon Arnold Palmer.

"It's nice to be here," Palmer said. "I wish we could do something magic to this weather."

# Big 1st half propels Marion

Offerman's 193 yards lead Indians past overmatched Stars

**M**ARION — This time, the floodgates opened *before* the skies opened.

Tony Offerman rushed for 193 yards and scored three touchdowns — all before halftime — as Marion raced past Starmont, 35-8, in a weather-shortened non-district football game Friday night at Thomas Park Field.

The game was called with 6:15 remaining after a brief downpour began and a single bolt of lightning descended

from the sky. The issue had been decided long before that.

Offerman led a ground attack that was full of big plays. The Indians (2-0) racked up 345 rushing yards on 27 attempts, an average of 12.8 yards a pop.

"That was fun," said Offerman, who sat out most of the second half after Marion built a commanding lead. "Our line played hard. They were opening some pretty big holes."

And Offerman scooted right through them. He ran a 4.48-second 40-yard sprint at a Northern Iowa camp this summer. Once he was loose, he was gone.

"We feature the tailback in our offense, and (Offerman) can really get through the hole fast," said Indians

Coach Tony Perkins.

Offerman scored on runs of 44, 79 and 19 yards. His first carry of the night — a 25-yard gain on a sweep — that got things flowing.

"I didn't have a very good game last week (100 yards on 16 carries in a 35-19 win over Maquoketa Valley)," Offerman said. "One of our assistant coaches told me to make the first carry my best one, so I could touch the ball a lot."

Offerman's three touchdowns staked Marion to a 21-0 halftime lead before a couple of backfield mates got into the act. Jason McGaffic scored on a 60-yard run on the first play of the second half,

then Jordan Forkner tacked on a 20-yard touchdown to make it 35-0.

**STARMONT (0-2)** scored its only touchdown when Jake Sargent hooked up with Mitch Devlin for a 27-yard tally late in the third quarter. The Stars threatened again on their next drive, but a goal-line stand stopped them a yard short.

The teams combined for 16 penalties, including 10 by the Indians that cost them 76 yards.

"There was a lot of talking back and forth," Perkins said. "The penalties are something that we can correct."

"From last week to this week, we took a huge step forward."

Midway through the third quarter, Kinney found Scheetz again, this time a 28 yard touchdown to give the Clippers the commanding 28-7 lead.


Regina continued to be stymied by their inability to establish a passing game.

# City High is more than Ram tough

Wooldrik's 4 TDs power Little Hawks

**I**OWA CITY — While Iowa City High has added a potent passing attack to its offense, the Little Hawks haven't forgotten how to run the football.

Behind a dominant offensive line, Matt Wooldrik ran for 96 yards on 13 carries, including

four touchdowns, as City High crushed Dubuque Senior, 61-7, Friday night at Bates Field. The game was stopped with 4 minutes, 12 seconds left by the 50-point rule.

"We wanted to give our work horse, Woody, a little more credit this week," City High quarterback Connor Jostes said. "He's our guy and he deserved all those yards and the touchdowns he got tonight."

But the real improvement in the running attack from last week to this week came on the offensive line.

"Those guys up front really picked it up this week," Wooldrik said. "They opened up some huge holes for me to run through and they did a much better job in pass protection."

City High Coach Dan Sabers agreed that it looked better, but he still wanted to see the game film before giving that unit too much praise.

"You could see that they did a better job this week of sustaining their blocks," he said. "But, we'll take a look at the films and make sure that everyone did things they were supposed to do."

In the first half, it certainly looked like the Little Hawks did everything it wanted to do.

City High needed just 30 offensive plays to score on its first six possessions en route to building a 41-7 halftime lead.

"That's just us doing a better job of executing," Wooldrik said. "When we do the things that we are supposed to do, we

should be able to score like that with our offensive weapons."

Wooldrik was the major weapon for City High in the first half, as he picked up 78 yards on 11 carries, including

TD runs of 1, 39 and 3 yards.

"We need to establish our running game to open things up for the passing game," Jostes said. "When we get people keying on Matt that just opens things up down the field

for our passing attack."

That's exactly what happened, as Senior got caught a few times in the game on play-action pass, including early in the third quarter when Davis hooked up with Calvin Jostes for a 29-yard scoring strike. Davis had six catches for 120 yards and two touchdowns, while Jostes was 8-of-16 passing for 162 yards.

"As former defensive coordinator, I can tell you play-action passes when done right are nearly impossible to stop," Sabers said. "Connor is a real student of the game and he, along with Wooldrik, do an excellent job of carrying out their fakes."

City High backup quarterback Curtis Seyers accounted for 93 yards of offense, including a 44-yard touchdown run midway through the fourth quarter.

Next week City High travels to Cedar Rapids to face Washington (2-0).
