City boots Trojans

Wooldrik, Little Hawks dominate in rout of crosstown rival

IOWA CITY — Two weeks ago, Iowa City High senior Matt Wooldrik left the game against Cedar Rapids Washington in the second quarter with bruised ribs. The next week against Linn-Mar, the talented tailback, still banged up, had only four carries for eight yards.

Wooldrik's Friday night frustration ended last evening and crosstown rival Iowa City West paid the price, as Class 4A No. 3 City High won the "Battle for the Boot" at Bates Field, 30-3.

Wooldrik led the way for the big-play Little Hawks (5-0), gaining a season-high 148 yards on 16 carries with two touchdowns.

"The last two weeks have been pretty hard. I've been in a good amount of pain," said Wooldrik, whose career-high is 166 yards against Kennedy in the 2000 season opener. "But this felt like the old days. The line was making the holes and I just saw the daylight and kept running."

While Wooldrik got his yards, West sensational sophomore Greg Coleman was held in check by a City High defense that entered the game allowing 60 yards rushing per contest.

Coleman finished with a season-low 76 yards on 23 carries. His previous low was 157 yards against Washington in Week 2.

"They're a great ballclub - defensively and offensively," said Coleman, who has 858 yards rushing this season.

City High held West to 59 yards in the second half and 163 yards for the game. The Little Hawks also kept Coleman from

scoring a touchdown for the first time this season. It also was the first time City High hasn't allowed a touchdown in a game this season.

"It's never easy. We studied all week. We had a gameplan," City High linebacker Justin Jordan said. "We were looking for straight cutbacks. We wanted to lock (Coleman's) game down. We wanted to prove his rushing game couldn't beat this relentless defense."

City High struck early, and never trailed.

On the game's first drive and sixth play, quarterback Connor Jostes hit split end Calvin Davis with a 32-yard touchdown pass with 9:12 left in the first.

Trailing 7-0, West countered with an impressive 18-play, 66-yard drive that resulted in Nick Miller's 33-yard field goal with 5:56 remaining in the second.

On the drive, which lasted 7:40, quarterback Grant Norland completed an 18-yard pass to tight end Chris Larson on 4th-and-12 from the Little Hawk 35.

"Our kids played their hearts out," said West Coach Dan Dvorak, whose team dropped to 1-4. "I'm proud of their efforts. This is as hard as we have played this season."

Ten seconds. That was the time of the Little Hawks' next touchdown drive.

Set up by Davis' 42-yard kickoff return, Wooldrik scored on a 42-yard run on the

drive's only play. The extra point by Jostes gave City High a 14-3 lead with 5:35 remaining in the half.

"We've got a lot of weapons, so everybody is going to have to take a turn," said City High Coach Dan Sabers, whose team is averaging 43.6 points. "Last week, it was Warren (McDuffie). The time before, it was Calvin and Connor. Tonight, Connor wasn't on so well, so it was nice to go to Woody."

Ten seconds. That was the time of the Little Hawks' next touchdown drive.

And like the previous score, City High used special teams fireworks to start the drive in Trojan territory.

This time, Wooldrik returned a punt 26 yards to the West 25.

"Special teams is a big part of our offense," said Davis, who capped the game's scoring with a 31-yard interception return with 11:09 remaining. "Special teams is an area where we feel we have the athletic ability to make some big plays."

Following his own 22-yard run, Wooldrik found the end zone again on a 3-yard burst with 1:14 left in the half.

City High, which outgained West, 185-104, led 20-3 at the break.

City High leads the regular-season series with West, 22-10.

The Little Hawks travel to Dubuque Hempstead next Thursday, while the Trojans host Cedar Falls on homecoming next Friday.

Unbeaten Raiders cruise past West Liberty

WILLIAMSBURG — Williamsburg wanted to make a statement early against unbeaten West Liberty, and the Raiders did just that, racing out to a big early lead and hanging on for a 27-7 victory.

The Comets of West Liberty hadn't allowed a point all season on defense, but the Raiders (5-0, 3-0 2A-7) changed that on the first possession. Tailback Nick Fetzer and quarterback Sam McDonald led the Raiders on an 11-play, 61-yard drive that sucked up nearly five minutes, giving the Raiders a 7-0 lead.

The drive was capped by a 10-yard touchdown pass from McDonald to Tory Greiner.

After forcing the Comets (4-1, 2-1) to punt after three plays, the Raiders needed only one play to score again. This time Fetzer took the handoff and broke free for an 80-yard sprint to the end zone.

After getting the ball back again, Williamsburg scored its

"We came out with a great game plan and our kids were prepared," Williamsburg Coach Curt Ritchie said. "I think West Liberty's defense brought out the best in us today."

The Comets finally got going in the second quarter, getting its only score on a Chad Fridley quarterback keeper from 14 yards out.

McDonald later hooked up with Greiner again with a 20-yard touchdown pass to give the Raiders a 27-7 halftime lead.

The lead might have been bigger, but two touchdowns were called back because of penalties.

"That's a sign we're an undisciplined team, but I think we're getting better," Ritchie said. "I think our kids know there's so much room for improvement."

Williamsburg outgained West Liberty, 443-93. Fetzer had 215 yards rushing on 21 carries by halftime. He finished with 264 rushing yards on 33 carries.
