## Bonds at all-time high

### 70th HR catches McGwire

**H**OUSTON (AP) — Barry Bonds took all the frustration bottled up inside him and sent No. 70 into the upper deck in right field.

With one big swing Thursday night, Bonds tied Mark McGwire's home run record — a feat even Big Mac thought might last a lifetime when he did it a mere three years ago.

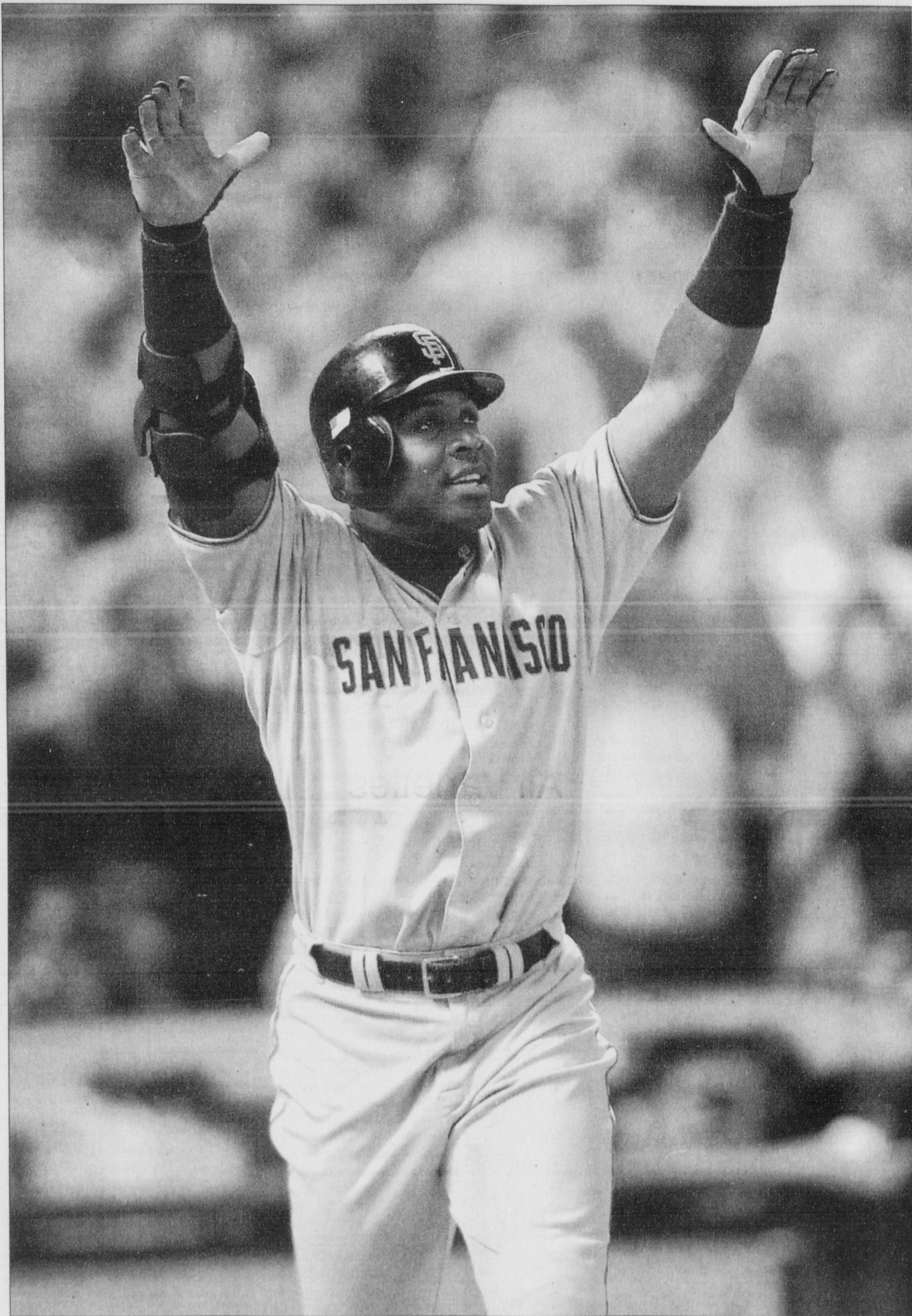
"It was electrifying," Bonds said.

After watching Houston pitchers work around him throughout the three-game series, Bonds finally got a chance to hit, leading off the ninth inning. He did not miss, hitting a 454-foot shot off rookie Wilfredo Rodriguez.

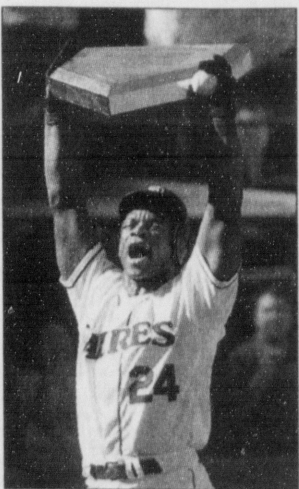
"I was happy I made contact. It's hard to just take pitches all the time," he said. "You really don't have an opportunity to swing."

Bonds immediately raised both arms in the air and began a slow trot around the bases. The record crowd of 43,734, which had booed when Astros pitchers walked him, rewarded him with a standing ovation.

The Giants won 10-2, completing a sweep that kept them two games behind Arizona in

## Seventy homers aren't what they used to be

**B**arry Bonds' pursuit of the major-league home run record has been an oh-that's-sorta-interesting kind of deal.

Bonds has had an astonishing season, one of the best a ballplayer has ever enjoyed.

But it hasn't been the stuff of legend, with the feel-good aura of the Mark McGwire-Sammy Sosa home run

derby of 1998. Some say it's because people liked McGwire and Sosa, and don't like Bonds. That's part of it. Bonds does seem to have the warmth of winter in Waterloo.

So what? He's a hero to the aloof and antisocial, an ever-

growing segment of the population that deserves to be represented.

Another part of the toned-down reactions to Bonds going for 70 homers and beyond is that the long balls have become as about as meaningless as Carrot Top's views on stem cell research.

Homers were once pleasant surprises, hoped for but seldom expected. When a guy hit 35 homers, he had a fantastic slugging season. When a guy hit 45, he was King Kong. It was a huge deal when George Foster of Cincinnati socked 52 in 1977. Or so my ancestors tell me.

Hank Aaron never hit 50 home runs. Neither did Reggie Jackson. Or Joe DiMaggio or Ted Williams or Harmon Killebrew or Ernie Banks or Mike Schmidt.

Roger Maris' 61 homers in 1961 meant something because it was a mythic total that re-

placed Babe Ruth's mythical total of 60. That was when a homer was a homer, sonny boy.

Now baseball is a game of too many teams and not enough pitchers, microscopic strike zones, hitters who have combined modern weight-training with modern chemicals, and stadiums built for homers instead of actual baseball. New parks in Houston, Denver and Milwaukee are farces when it comes to the numbers of homers they allow.

Speaking of Milwaukee, the Brewers represent how warped the National League game has become. The NL used to be the home of speed and defense, of stealing bases, of stretching singles into doubles and sliding hard into second base to bust up double plays.

Now it's the home of a bunch of guys who look like

football players swinging for the fences on 0-2 counts.

The Brewers have pulled off a pair of ignominious feats this year. They have already set the major-league mark for strikeouts in a season with 1,377.

They also will become the first team in major-league history to have more strikeouts than hits.

But they've hit 208 homers. Seattle did a wild and crazy thing. It built a ballpark that put premiums on defense and pitching. So the Mariners went into their game Thursday night at Anaheim with a ridiculously successful 113-45 mark.

The Mariners lead the American League in batting average, stolen bases and earned-run average and are second in walks. They score as many runs as anyone, and they also win. The money they didn't pay Randy John-

son, Ken Griffey Jr. or Alex Rodriguez went to others, guys who pitch and guys who can play.

The huge crowds at Safeco Field don't go home grousing about not seeing enough homers.

Seattle began Thursday with 400 fewer strikeouts than the Brewers.

Put the bat on the ball, like the Mariners' Ichiro Suzuki does. You put the bat on the ball, you run. You run, you might end up on base. You end up on base, you might score. You score, you might win.

Rod Carew resigned as Milwaukee's batting coach Thursday. Few ballplayers could hit as well as Carew. As batting coaches go, however, he might as well have been Rod Stewart.

## Prairie wallops Kennedy

**CEDAR RAPIDS** — You might be able to debate how good Cedar Rapids Prairie's football team is. Emphasis on the word *might*.

But there is absolutely no possible way you can question the resiliency of the Hawks.

Just look at the way Prairie was able to rebound Thursday night from a morale-busting, last-second loss for the second time this season. A nearly flawless overall performance was

more than enough for an eyebrow-raising 44-0 shellacking of Cedar Rapids Kennedy at Kingston Stadium.

The spread was surprising because Kennedy (4-2) came in with a four-game winning streak.

"We raise tough kids out there," said Prairie Coach Craig Jelinek. "Both physically and mentally. They've been stung twice, but they are a very resilient group. They believe in the coaching staff, and the coaching staff believes in them."

You could certainly excuse players and coaching staff if there was a lack of said belief.

Prairie (4-2) lost to Dubuque Hempstead last week on the last play of the game. Four weeks ago, the Hawks lost to Cedar Rapids Xavier in the final minute of the game.

So this team is roughly 30-some seconds and five points away from being unbeaten.

"We have only three returning starters from last year, but we're two plays away from being 6-0," Jelinek said. "But you don't dwell on that. You just can't."

"We knew we should have won last week," added Prairie fullback-linebacker Casey Clark, who had a pair of touchdowns — one running and one receiving. "So we wanted to come out tonight like it was another quarter against Hempstead. We were all very mad that we lost. We wanted to come out and really put it to (Kennedy)."

Which you can safely say the Hawks did.

Prairie scored 31 first-half points, 21 in the second quarter. And the blitzkrieg began on just the second play of the game, when Hawk quarterback Tom Langhurst connected with running back Jason Kohl on an 80-yard catch-and-run touchdown.

A 30-yard field goal by Chris Krueger made it 10-0. Then Langhurst threw two more TD

## Early black football star Simmons dies

**CHICAGO (AP)** — Ozzie Simmons, one of the first black All-American college football players, has died. He was 87.

Simmons, who taught physical education for 38 years in Chicago's public schools, died Sept. 26 of complications from Alzheimer's and Parkinson's diseases in a Chicago nursing home.

Simmons played halfback for the University of Iowa from 1934-36, was an All-American in 1935 and was selected to the All-Big Ten team in 1934 and '35. He was Iowa's top rusher in his last two seasons, and led the team in scoring in 1936.

Winners don't get anything, except the satisfaction of a job well done.

So for all you Cyclone fans — and others with time to kill — think carefully and mark your answers with a No. 2 pencil.

**Question:** What is ISU's all-time record against teams ranked sixth or higher in Associated Press polls?

- A) 10-39-2  
B) 0-49-2

That's right. The Cyclones have never defeated a team ranked sixth or better in 51 tries, according to the school's sports information department. They have two wins over No. 7 teams — Oklahoma State in 1985 and Nebraska in 1992.

**Question:** What is ISU Coach Dan McCarney's record against Top 25 teams during his seven years in Ames?

- A) 5-16  
B) 3-18  
C) 0-21

**Answer:** C.

McCarney has drawn a blank in 21 tries against Top 25 opponents. He's 25-24 against unranked teams, making him 25-45 overall.

**Question:** What is Iowa State's record in its last 10 night games?

B) 9-1  
C) 5-5

**Answer:** B.

The Cyclones have been tough under the lights, winning nine of their last 10 since the

start of the 1999 season. The streak includes wins over Indiana State, Iowa and UNLV — interrupted by a loss to Nebraska — followed by wins over Missouri, Baylor, Oklahoma State, Missouri again, Pittsburgh in the Insight.com Bowl and UNI.

Iowa State has won six straight under the stars.

**Question:** Nebraska buried Iowa State, 77-14, at Memorial Stadium in 1997. What was the score at halftime?

The Cornhuskers scored nine touchdowns in the first half, including one with five seconds left before intermission. It was

Tailback JaMaine Billups (Omaha), offensive guard Bob Montgomery (Lincoln), nose guard Paul Jarrett (Lincoln), linebacker Boyd Viers (Omaha), defensive lineman Andy Leaders (Omaha), fullback Matt Grosserode (Lincoln), quarterback Eric Perry (Kearney) and receiver John Davis (Papillion) are all from Nebraska.

**Question:** What is the status

of the all-time series between Iowa State and Nebraska?

B) 79-14-2 for Nebraska  
C) Both of the above

**Answer:** C.

There was a disputed game in 1907, with both sides claiming victory in Lincoln. An Iowa State drop-kick bounced over the crossbar for a 13-10 lead for ISU, but the referee said the ball could not bounce over the bar and wiped it away, giving Nebraska a 10-9 victory. Iowa State appealed to Walter Camp, an early father of the game and rules-keeper, who said the field goal should have counted for a 13-10 victory.

## Stockdale loves to figure out foes' game plan

Most of the time, he already knows what's coming

IOWA CITY — Iowa senior Matt Stockdale isn't a guy who will beat his head into a wall to get psyched up for a football game.

He's much more mild-mannered than that in the Hawkeye locker room prior to kickoff. He leaves the emotional stuff to guys like teammate Jerry Montgomery.

"Montgomery will jump you," Stockdale said.

Iowa's starting left cornerback, Stockdale gets excited by having the confidence of knowing the opposing offense inside and out.

"That's the thing that gets me most jacked up, if I know every single formation and I have a good idea of what they're going to run," Stockdale said. "I figure they can't do anything."

So it's just a matter of putting the hours of film study to use by executing the gameplan on the field.

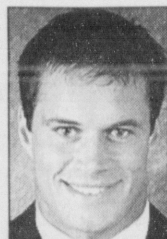
And once the whistle blows, Stockdale's aggressive side comes out.

Make no mistake, the 5-foot-10, 188-pound Iowa Falls native is a hitter, though not in the same class as Hawkeye hitman Bob Sanders, the team's strong safety.

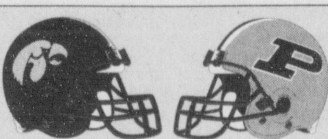
"I think once you get on the football field, you have to turn a rage on and you just have that attitude that you're going to hit somebody as hard as you can," Stockdale said. "And we have guys in the secondary who are going to do that day in and day out. That's been passed on to me."

That's not the only thing that's been passed on to him. John Derby, a Hawkeye linebacker from 1988-91, has preached preparation to Stockdale.

"That gave me a huge advantage because I was not the biggest or strongest guy out there," Derby said. "He's so interested in studying films that he's a step ahead of what's going on. That's something that comes from a lot of confidence."

Derby talks football and business with Stockdale daily.

Stockdale is doing an internship with Medtronic Sofamor Danek Surgical Sales, a company based in Memphis, Tenn., that delivers state-of-the-art products and services to spinal and cranial surgeons. Derby, who lives in Coralville, is a sales associate with the firm.

"He's told me about how you have to get yourself so jacked up and so prepared to play, so you can go up to every single player and say you're going to dominate him," Stockdale said.

Derby, a first team All-Big Ten pick in 1991, is very impressed with the 23-year-old Stockdale.

"He's exactly 10 years younger than me, so it's fun to see his energy as he gets ahead in life," Derby said. "If I was in his shoes, it would be awesome. He's so far ahead of the kids coming out now. He'll probably end up with a position in the company when he's all done with football."

"And he's playing pretty good football right now."

You can say that again.

Stockdale, in and out of the starting lineup his first three years, is making the most out of his senior season.

He has 10 unassisted tackles and a team-high six pass deflections in three games.

"Everybody is looking for Stockdale to make big plays and he's made every big play we've needed him to make so far," right cornerback Benny Sapp said.

For Stockdale, it comes down to not blowing a huge opportunity to make Iowa a winner again after three consecutive losing seasons.

"I've always been one to be fully committed to whatever I get into," Stockdale said. "If I were not able to go out with a smile on my face after my senior year, that would be just a huge disappointment."

passes: a 26-yard screen play to Clark and a 24-yard jump-ball to Dustin Waite.

Kohl finished the half with a 4-yard scoring run. A 5-yard third-quarter TD run from Clark and a last-minute 14-yard pass from backup QB Ryan Hass to backup receiver Dan Carver completed the rout.

"Our focus was there tonight," said Langhurs, who completed 5 of 11 passes for 168 yards. "The defense was great, the receivers were catching everything. We played a really good game tonight."

The Hawks stuffed Kennedy's offense, limiting

the NL West race with only a weekend series left at home against Los Angeles.

Bonds' teammates poured out to greet him at home plate along with young Nikolai Bonds, whose 37-year-old father hugged him tight at the plate. Bonds then pointed to his wife and daughters behind the third-base dugout as he returned to the bench.

"Everybody was telling me just be patient, be patient. I'm glad it's over. I'm glad my family was here. My wife gets to sleep now," Bonds said.

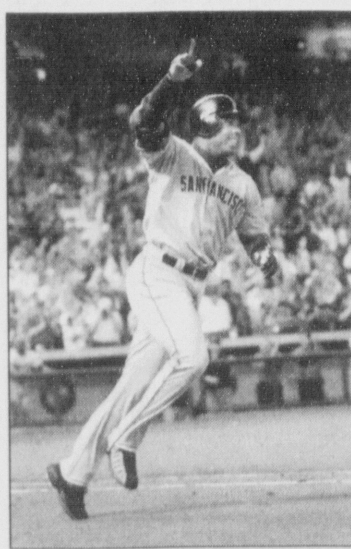
"I got frustrated when it was 8-1 and they intentionally walked me because it was not a really crucial situation. That's when I got really frustrated."

As for the man whose record he tied, Bonds said: "I have a lot of respect for Mark McGwire. For me, it is an honor to share this with him. He's a great home run hitter. He's always established power and strength. He put the record where it is."

WITH FANS STILL cheering at Enron Field, Bonds came out for two curtain calls. He took his position in left field to start the bottom of the ninth, was mobbed by teammates who were in the Giants' bullpen, then was replaced and walked off, waving his cap to fans.

Bonds' 70th homer marked the second big achievement of the day in the majors. Earlier, Rickey Henderson of San Diego scored his 2,246th career run and broke Ty Cobb's record.

Bonds hit his 564th career home run, moving him past Reggie Jackson — a distant relative — for seventh place on

the all-time list.

Among those cheering for Bonds was his godfather, Hall of Famer Willie Mays, who ranks third on the career list with 660 homers. Mays hit his 500th homer in Houston, at the Astrodome in 1965.

Bonds' father, former major leaguer Bobby, was with Mays in the Giants clubhouse and watched the historic homer on TV.

Bonds connected on a 1-1 pitch from Rodriguez, a 22-year-old lefty making only his

second major league appearance.

Bonds took a huge cut and missed the first pitch, watched a ball up and in, then launched a 93-mph fastball into the stands.

"I FEEL OK. I'm happy for him. He deserves what he got," Rodriguez said through an interpreter. "That was my best pitch."

The ball was caught by Charles Murphy, 33, of Houston, using his son's glove. He had bought his tickets Thursday.

"I'm sure there are plenty of options," he said of the prize souvenir.

Last year, Bonds hit a 458-foot shot that ranks as the longest in the two-year history of Enron.

Bonds, a 10-time All-Star who could be headed to his record fourth MVP award, had never hit more than 49 home runs in a season before this year.

Bonds had gone 19 plate appearances, including 10 walks and a pair of hit by pitches, without homering since hitting No. 69 Saturday.

## Bowlsby: Everyone will absorb budget cut

IOWA CITY — University of Iowa Athletics Director Bob Bowlsby said Thursday that his department's cutbacks in the university's attempt to slash a possible \$22 million in spending must be absorbed programwide.

UI President Mary Sue Coleman is expected to announce, later this month, specific plans for cutting the university's budget.

Faced with declining state revenues, Gov. Tom Vilsack has recommended the Legislature approve \$108 million in cuts, with half to come from the state's three public universities. Final decisions on the cuts will come when the Legislature convenes in January.

"I don't know that I can speculate on what we'll be called upon to provide in the way of reversion," Bowlsby said. "But I think we'll have to absorb it programwide."

Athletics is receiving \$2,352,526 from the UT's general fund in Fiscal Year 2002.

Bowlsby said the money is earmarked for the women's soccer and rowing programs, women's scholarships and women's salaries. The men's programs don't receive any institutional support.

But those same women's programs will not absorb the cutbacks by themselves.

"We wouldn't expect those people to bear the brunt of the reversion," Bowlsby said.

"I wouldn't speculate on exactly how we would come up with the reductions, but it isn't going to come back out of where it went. It would be devastating to those programs."

"He was quite a popular player and took quite a lot of physical abuse around the Big Ten because he was black and there were some real racial feelings in the league at that time," said George Wine, Iowa's former sports information director.

While playing at Iowa, Simmons' presence as a black player started the tradition of awarding a prize to the winner of the Iowa-Minnesota matchup. State governors first offered the prize in 1935 to smooth tensions that developed because of Simmons' presence on the team. The award started out as a living pig and is now a bronze trophy.

After finishing his career at Iowa, Simmons talked to the Chicago Bears, but the NFL was not integrated then.
