

Frudden masters Noelridge final time

CEDAR RAPIDS — Noelridge Park has a special place in Jeni Frudden's heart, and in her legs.

"It's been like a second home course for me," said Frudden, a senior at Iowa City West. "This being my final race here, it was a little emotional."

Frudden ran on the Noelridge grass Thursday like no girl has ever run before. She completed her 2-mile race in 10 minutes 53 seconds, smashing her course record by 14 seconds.

That helped propel West to a sweep of the team titles at the Mississippi Valley Conference Valley Division cross country meet.

The West girls did the expected, cleaning house with six of the top nine spots to remain unbeaten.

West accumulated 23 points. Cedar Falls edged Dubuque Wahlert, 70-72, for second place.

West outduelled Wahlert for the boys' crown,

45-53. Cedar Falls was third with 77 points. The Trojans' conquest was what really tickled Coach Mike Parker.

"This was very important for our seniors," Parker said. "Where we were four years ago, it was a long way from where we are now. I'm so proud of this team."

FRUDDEN HAD hoped to break 11 minutes at the MVC Super meet last week at Waterloo. But she pushed the pace too hard and that bit her at the end.

Thursday, she had a more controlled start. And a brilliant second mile. She went out in 5:25 and finished in 5:28.

After the race, she beamed

and held out her left hand. Written in ink Monday: "10:54."

"(Parker) told me he thought I could run 10:53, but I didn't think so," she said. "So I wrote 10:54."

Frudden broke away from teammate Robdu Adam and Wahlert's Sara Fassbinder with about a mile to go. Fassbinder finished in 11:14, Adam in 11:18.

"With the exception of Muscatine, Jeni has set course records everywhere she's run this year," Parker said. "There have been some great runners in this state, but she's doing things that have never been done before."

Sisters Lynn and Janet Dobyns finished fifth and sixth for West. Shirley Stern was eighth, Julia Frudden ninth.

Linn-Mar's Andy Hodge was the individual boys' champ. The sophomore ran away from Wahlert's Tom Hein in the final half-mile, and finished in 16:38. Hein (16:44) and Wahlert's Dan Corken (16:48) were second and third.

The title was Hodge's third this season.

"Two weeks ago, winning this meet became my big goal," Hodge said. "Everybody kind of sat back and ran in back of me."

Hein went past Hodge at the 2½-mile mark, but Hodge quickly countered.

"He kind of surprised me when he went by, but I opened up on my stride when I went around the last turn," Hodge said.

West's Robert Hubbard, Joey Gugliuzza and Tyler Snetelaar were fourth, fifth and sixth.

"We always seem to have a different leader, but we've always had a great top three in those guys," Parker said. "And I think we're going to be a lot better in a couple of weeks."

Home cooking again at Iowa State

And this time, Cyclones can host postseason run

AMES — Members of the Iowa State women's basketball team don't even need to talk about the pot of gold that's at the end of the rainbow this season.

All they have to do is look around campus. "There are banners all over the place," senior center Angie Welle said Thursday afternoon during the team's annual media day. "I don't think you really need to talk about it. We all know what's at stake. We all know the opportunity we have."

Hilton Coliseum, the home of the Cyclones, is the host site for the 2002 NCAA Midwest Regional March 23 and 25.

Getting ahead of ourselves for a second, if Iowa State qualifies for the NCAA tournament with at least a No. 4 seed, it could play four postseason games on its home floor, where the Cyclones have a 62-2 record the last four years.

Iowa State has advanced to the Sweet 16 the last three years, but has never reached the Final Four.

"(Hosting a regional) is a great opportunity, nobody can deny that," said Iowa State Coach Bill Fennelly, who has a 138-50 record in six years in Ames. "This shows the level of our program and the commitment of our fans that the NCAA would bring a regional to Ames, Iowa."

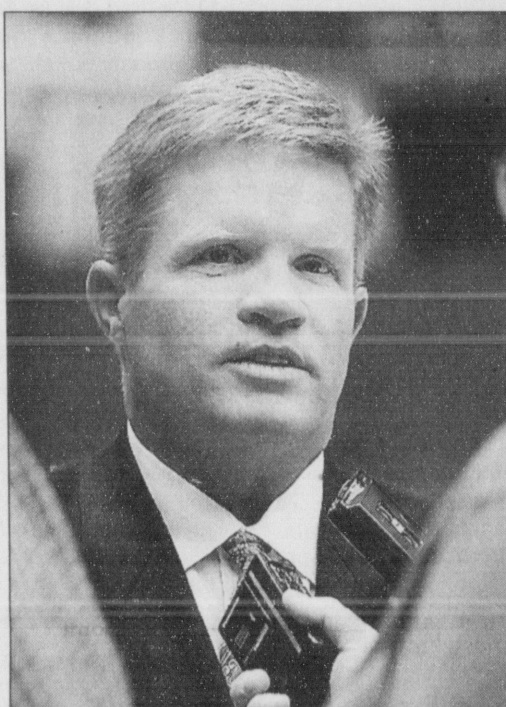
Getting back to here and now, the Cyclones, ranked anywhere from second to 12th by preseason publications, return three starters — Welle and guards Lindsey Wilson and Tracy Gahan — from a 27-6 team that tied school records for most wins and fewest losses and won its second consecutive Big 12 tournament championship.

Throw in returners Erica Junod and Mary Cofield, with six talented newcomers, and you have a pretty darned good team. Cofield, a junior, red-shirted last season after transferring from St. Ambrose.

"This has been the best fall we've ever had without a doubt as far as how hard they've worked (is concerned)," Fennelly said. "They're more excited about starting practice than any team I've ever been around."

Welle, a preseason first-team all-American, averaged a double-double last season with 18.3 points and 10.0 rebounds.

"Being a senior, I have to be a little more of a leader on the court," said Welle, a third-team all-American by The Associated Press as a junior. "As a player, I have to be more patient."

Gahan, a senior, averaged 12.3 points and 7.5 rebounds last season. Wilson, a junior, averaged 14.6 points and 5.2 assists in 2000-01.

If the season began Thursday, Fennelly said his starting lineup would have Wilson at point guard, Junod at off guard, Cofield and Gahan at forwards and Welle at center.

"I definitely think we have the personnel to be there at the end, but we have to take advantage of it," Gahan said. "We know (the Midwest Regional) is going to be hosted here, but we have to play and produce this season."

The Cyclones must fill the voids left by graduated starting guards Megan Taylor and Erica Haugen.

Taylor averaged 14.4 points, 6.1 rebounds and 2.8 assists last season. But she meant far more to her team than just statistics.

"The biggest thing was Megan's motor was always running. You don't see that very often," Fennelly said.

Prep all-Americans Anne O'Neil and Nina Smith will sit out this season after transferring from Illinois and Wisconsin, respectively. O'Neil, a Cedar Rapids Kennedy graduate, will be a sophomore guard next season. Smith, who prepped at Waterloo West, will be a junior center.

Frommelt's late TD scampers lift Hempstead

CEDAR RAPIDS — When Dubuque Hempstead back-up quarterback Matt Frommelt woke up Thursday morning, he figured the Mustangs' game against Cedar Rapids Kennedy later that night would be business as usual.

But around noon, Frommelt heard the news: starting quarterback Jeff Hoerner was ill and wouldn't be making the trip to Kingston Stadium.

Strap on your helmet, son. Duty calls.

Duty was answered.

Frommelt, a 5-11, 159-pound junior, scored a pair of fourth quarter touchdowns on sweeps of 8 and 16 yards and led the Mustangs to a stunning, 14-7 win over Kennedy to leave both teams with 4-3 Mississippi Valley Conference records.

"Me and (Hoerner) are good buddies and he called me around noon to tell me he was sick," Frommelt said. "I was pretty much shaking in my boots all day but I settled down come game time."

Hempstead Coach Mark Ehlers had all the confidence in the world in Frommelt. Actually, his confidence lies with all his players.

"Our offense works because of everyone out there, not just one guy," Ehlers said of the wing-T set her prefers. "Our offense is a winning offense if everyone we put out there does their job."

Kennedy had taken a 7-0 lead in the game dominated by the respective defensive units when Jared Godfrey scored on a 17-yard run at the 10:50 mark

of the third quarter. Because of the way both defenses were playing, it looked like it might end up that way.

But the Mustangs discovered something in the fourth quarter when they racked up 104 of their 181 rushing yards. Frommelt's touchdowns came at the 5:52 and 1:42 marks of the fourth quarter.

Kennedy quarterback Matt Keel didn't have one of his best passing nights (4-for-22, 45 yards), but his legs almost got the Cougars a final touchdown in the last minute. Keel scrambled for gains of 9, 14, 24, 16 and 16 yards to lead the Cougars to the Mustang 9-yard-line before they ran out of time.

"This is the first time I can remember that I've not known what to say to a football team," Kennedy Coach Tim Lewis said. "I thought we had a great turn-around from last week (a 44-0 loss to Cedar Rapids Prairie) because tonight I thought we played very hard and very physical. I don't know what happened."

Kennedy finished with 277 rushing yards with Godbey netting 138 on 20 carries. The Cougars out-gained the Mustangs 322 to 207.

"I'm very proud of my kids," Ehlers said. "They never gave up. The coaching staff did a great job of making adjustments at halftime and we got the job done."

Dasso loses lead, gets it back in time

DUBUQUE — Eric Dasso couldn't believe what had just transpired in front of him. A little more than a mile into the Mississippi Valley Conference Mississippi Division cross country race, Iowa City High's Mark Kresowik overtook the Hempstead senior standout. And, before long, Dasso faced a deficit of roughly 10 yards.

But Dasso, well-versed on every divot on the Bunker Hill Golf Course layout, used his best kick of the season to catch and pass Kresowik in the final 30 meters to win in 16:16.13, a little less than two seconds ahead of Kresowik.

"I didn't see him at all until after the first mile, and when he took the lead from me, I thought, 'This isn't supposed to be happening to me,'" Dasso said. "He did to me what I did to (Senior's Nate) Seier and everybody else at the city meet."

"I knew if he could do that, he had to be a pretty strong runner, and he wasn't just going to die at the end. I really didn't catch him until the very end, when he died a little bit. I don't know, it was a little too close for comfort."

Dasso, who finished third at the state meet a year ago, used a home-course advantage. He benefited from running at Bunker two weeks ago in the city meet and from the huge throng of fans lining the course.

"It's a huge advantage, especially here," Dasso said. "I

knew when to expect things to happen, and I knew where to expect things to happen.

"Winning today gives me a huge confidence boost. I haven't had a good, strong kick like that since the end of cross country last year."

Dasso prevented a complete varsity sweep by Iowa City High. The Little Hawk boys underscored Senior, 28-74, while Hempstead finished sixth with 134 after No. 2 runner Justin Potter finished 29th. Jennie Funk won the girls race and led a 1-2-3-4-6 finish for City High, which underscored Hempstead, 16-79. Senior finished third with 89 points.

Kevin Oberfoell (16:47.17) and Seier (16:48.43) led the Rams by finishing sixth and seventh. Chad Kane took 19th and Nick Shanahan 20th, while David Sinsky and Chris Feller finished 22-23.

"We really concentrated on running a safe race today, because we wanted to finish strong and build some momentum for districts next Thursday," Senior Coach Jim Boughton said. "So the first mile, we ran pretty conservatively out of respect for the course."

"Next week and qualifying for state is what really counts."

The Hempstead girls also built some momentum for next week by finishing second and defeating shorthanded Senior.

Moyer, 3 homers let Seattle rebound

SEATTLE (AP) — Pressure? What pressure? Jamie Moyer and the Seattle Mariners handled their biggest game this season — and the Cleveland Indians — just like they've done 116 times since April.

With an easy win.

Moyer took a shutout into the seventh inning and Seattle used three homers to bounce back and even their AL playoff series at one game apiece Thursday with a 5-1 win over the Indians.

"This was as close to a must-game win as you would want to be in," Mariners Manager Lou Piniella said. "This was a game we wanted to have, and Jamie got it done. He gave us exactly what we needed."

The 38-year-old Moyer, who won a career-high 20 games during the regular season and beat Cleveland twice, allowed five hits and one run in just the second postseason appear-

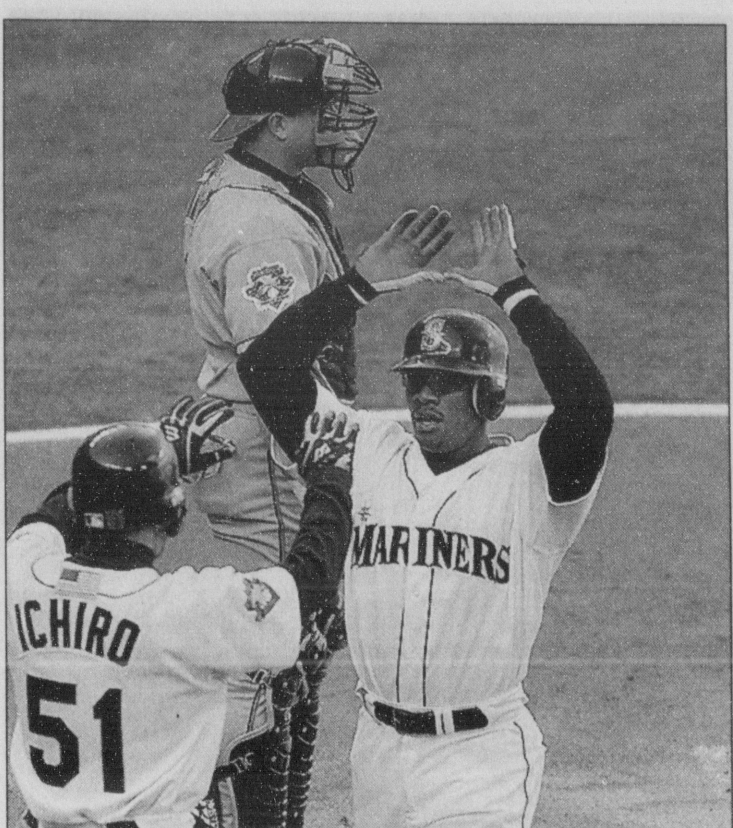
ance of his 14-year career.

In 1997, he was forced out of his only playoff start with a strained elbow and last season he missed a chance to pitch in October when he broke his kneecap during a simulated game tuneup before the ALCS.

"Getting to the playoffs healthy, and winning a playoff game is a dream come true," Moyer said.

Mike Cameron and Edgar Martinez hit two-run homers in the first inning off losing pitcher Chuck Finley and David Bell added a solo shot.

Another loss at home, and Seattle would have been in jeopardy of having its AL record-setting, 116-win season end prematurely. But as they did in winning the West by 14 games, the Mariners opened an early lead and never looked back.

Hudson backs Yankees to brink

NEW YORK (AP) — Another night of stellar pitching, this time by Tim Hudson, moved Oakland within a win of ending the New York Yankees' latest dynasty.

Hudson overwhelmed the Yankees for eight innings, Ron Gant homered and the brash, young Athletics held off New York, 2-0, Thursday night to head home with a 2-0 lead in their first-round AL playoff series.

After becoming only the fourth team to win three straight World Series titles, the Yankees must win three straight games to reach the AL championship series.

Oakland, beaten 3-2 by the Yankees in last year's division series, has won eight straight over New York going back to the regular season — and the Yankees haven't led in their

last 76 innings against the A's.

After surviving a ninth-inning scare, the A's head to a ballpark where they won their last 17 home games of the regular season.
