Vinton-Shellsburg never seriously threatened. The Vikings' deepest pene-



"Oh yeah, I realized it," said first-year City High head coach Sabers. "I've got to walk in that gym all the time and look at the banners. We've done it in other sports, but it's been awhile for us in football. We had an undefeated season last year, then couldn't get it done in our last regular-season game. So it's real nice to come up here to Prairie and get it done against a real

good football team." "We've had a bunch of good teams that have come through City High," added City High quarterback Connor Jostes, superb again with 183 total yards, a touchdown pass and four extra-point kicks. "Five years, it seems so long."

City High (8-0), ranked third in Class 4A, scored on its first four possessions to put this one away. The Little Hawks showed their typical balance, rushing for couldn't ask for a better start for 212 yards and passing for another 135.

Senior tailback Matt Wooldrik had 148 yards rushing on 24 carries and scored three touchdowns for City High: on a 4-yard run in the first quarter, a 1-yard run in the second and a 53-yarder in the third.

Jostes ran for 56 yards and threw for 128 more, including a 50-yard TD pass in the second quarter to Caleb Recker.

OWA CITY - The Iowa City West football team went toe-to-toe with Cedar Rapids Kennedy for three quarters Friday night.

However, all it took was fifty-six seconds for the Cougars to score two fourth-quarter touchdowns and deliver the knockout blow to the West in a 21-7 win at Trojan Field.

Trailing 7-6, Kennedy senior running back Jared Godbey scored on a 10-yard run with 10:57 remaining. Godbey also ran for the 2-point conversion and a 14-7 lead.

"I was hoping (we would eventually score a touchdown)," Kennedy Coach Tim



1973 — Reggie Jackson of Oakland had RBI doubles in the first and third innings to lead the Athelics to a 3-1 victory over the New York Mets and set up a seventh game in the World Series.

1979 — John Tate beats Gerrie Coetzee in a 15-round decision in Pretoria, South Africa, to win the vacant WBA heavy-weight title.

1984 — Rueben Mayes of Washington State rushes for 216 vards and scores four touchdowns to overcome a 28-7 halftime deficil and lead the Cougars to 49-42 victory over Stantord.

1990 — The Cinclinnati Reds complete one of the biggest upsets in baseball history, beating the Oakland Athletics, 2-1, to win the World Series in four games.

1993 — Devon White's two-run triple capped a six-run eighth inning as the Toronto Blue Jays railled for a 15-14 victory over the Phillies and a 3-1 World Series lead. The 29 runs shattered the Series record of 22 set in Game 2 in 1936, when the Yankees beat the New York Giants 18-4. It was also the longest nine-inning game in World Series history — 4 hours, 14 minutes.
