■ MIAMI — Former University of Iowa player Ricky Davis was part of a three-team NBA trade Friday, going from Miami to Cleveland.

The Cavaliers got Davis from Miami and forward Brian Skinner from Toronto. The Raptors received forward Don MacLean. The Heat got swingman Chris Gatling from Cleveland.

"Ricky Davis is another young, athletic player that we get a chance to look at," said Cavs general manager Jim Paxson.

The 6-foot-6 Davis played one year at Iowa before entering the NBA Draft in 1998 where he was picked by Charlotte.

#### New York makes cut for 2012 list of bid cities

■ SALT LAKE CITY — The U.S. Olympic Committee trimmed the list of American cities bidding for the 2012 Summer Olympics to four, picking Houston, New York, San Francisco and Washington.

Dropped from contention Friday were Dallas, Los Angeles, Tampa, Fla., and Cincinnati.

The USOC will choose an American candidate from among the four finalists in November 2002. The International Olympic Committee will vote on the host city in 2005.

New York, battered by last month's terrorist attacks, was considered a sentimental front-runner.

## Schilling ready to take his shot

### Another 'ace' looking to slow down Yanks

PHOENIX (AP) — Kevin Brown couldn't beat them. Greg Maddux and Al Leiter couldn't do it, either.

All top aces, yet all of them wound up on the losing side when facing the New York Yankees in World Series openers.

Now pitching, Curt Schilling.

The Arizona Diamondbacks' best chance to end the Yankees' run of three straight championships could come later today on a hot night in the desert when Schilling opposes Mike Mussina.

Along with Derek Jeter and Bernie Williams, Schilling will be taking on two other strong forces — the Yankees' history and tradition.

"When you use the words 'mystique'

and 'aura,' those are dancers in a nightclub," Schilling said Friday. "Those are not things we concern ourselves with on the ballfield."

Schilling, 3-0 with an 0.67 ERA and three complete games in the NL playoffs, drew the start over fellow ace Randy Johnson.

"I recognize Game 1 as being the game that can set the tone," Schilling said. "I recognize the first inning of Game 1 is the inning that can set the tone for the game and all of the things that come with that."

More likely, what happens much later will determine the outcome. Because as potent as the Yankees are in the early going, no team becomes as dangerous in

the late innings — particularly at this time of year.

Since manager Joe Torre took over in 1996, the Yankees have won an amazing 15 postseason games they trailed in the seventh inning or later.

In that span, they've outscored opponents 113-57 in the late innings.

"I don't think it's just by chance," Jeter said. "This is a group that really understands what the postseason is about."

In the 1998 opener, Brown and the San Diego Padres led 5-2 before the Yankees struck for seven runs in the seventh inning.

In the 1999 opener, Maddux and the Atlanta Braves took a 1-0 edge into the eighth before the Yankees scored four times.

Last year, Leiter pitched the New York

## Saints rally, earn playoff slot

### Peck's 3rd TD sends Xavier past Cougars

EDAR RAPIDS — This was a team that lost its best lineman to a season-ending injury in the first game of the year.

This was a team that lost its do-everything quarterback to a

second-degree MCL sprain in his knee three weeks ago.

This was a team that had lost two games in the closing seconds by a total of seven points.

So getting behind by two touchdowns in the first quarter of its crucial game Friday night against Cedar Rapids Kennedy at Kingston Stadium didn't faze Cedar Rapids Xavier's football team. As far as adversity goes, the Saints had already been there and done

that.

"I really wasn't too concerned," said John Winter, the aforementioned wounded QB, who made his return to the starting lineup and helped Xavier to a 21-14 win. "We've had to overcome a lot. Coach made sure we were never down, we always stayed positive. That just says a lot about the guys

we got. It says a lot about their character to keep going. Just keep working hard, that's all we could do. Keep working hard. We know that hard work pays off."

That hard work did pay off for the Saints, who scored two second-quarter touchdowns to tie the game at halftime.

Justin Peck's 1-yard scoring run early in the fourth — his third touchdown of the game — capped this comeback thriller and sent Xavier into the

playoffs for the first time.

Xavier (6-3) will play a Class 4A first-round game against an opponent to be determined at a site to be determined Wednesday night.

## A tough day to play

Hawks honored victims with win at OSU in '91

IOWA CITY — The Iowa Hawkeyes took the field Nov. 2, 1991, at Ohio Stadium wearing plain black helmets.

The trademark Tiger Hawk logo and gold stripe had been stripped for the first time in school history, as Iowa faced Ohio State at Columbus, Ohio, in a battle of top 15-ranked football teams.

This was their way to honor the five University of Iowa faculty members who were killed the previous day in Jessup and Van Allen Halls, when Gang Lu, a disgruntled Chi-

nese doctoral graduate in physics at the UI, went on a shooting rampage.

"That was something we could quickly do to show people that we were thinking about them," said Alan Cross, the team's tight end. "We were not only playing for us, but for all the people back in Iowa City who were going through that tragedy."

# C.R. puts 2 in 4A field

Once upon a time, Cedar Rapids Regis and Cedar Rapids LaSalle were playoff regulars.

Neither of those schools exist any more. Their descendant — Xavier High School — will write its first postseason chapter next week.

Xavier, in its fourth year of existence, rallied from an early 14-0 deficit to defeat Cedar Rapids Kennedy, 21-14, Friday night at Kingston Stadium.

"It means a lot to be the first playoff team here," said Xavier quarterback John Winter. "But I just feel real good for our coaches. They worked their butts off the entire year, and it just makes us all feel a lot better to finally get into the playoffs."

Cedar Rapids Prairie (6-3) joins Xavier (6-3) in the 4A playoffs, thanks to Waterloo West's 14-7 upset of Dubuque Hempstead.

The Mississippi Valley Conference will have four playoff representatives: Iowa City High completed a 9-0 regular season

5), Mount Vernon (District 6) and Williamsburg (District 7) had wrapped up playoff berths prior to Friday. Sigourney-Keota joined that threesome by whipping Highland-Lone Tree, 47-0, to win the District 8 title.

Despite the lopsided loss, Highland-Lone Tree (7-2) still qualified. The Raiders and Iowa Falls made it with two district losses, an event which rarely happens.

Highland-Lone Tree tied Center-Point Urbana for the final spot and got in on the last criteria in the tiebreaking system, alphabetical order. Because the last team alphabetically gets the nod this year, Highland-Lone Tree made it.

Mount Vernon, Williamsburg and Sigourney-Keota all are 9-0. Maquoketa Valley is 8-1.

In a showdown for a 2A at-large bid, Dyersville Beckman handled North Fayette, 41-21. The Blazers (7-2) were 2A-5 runners-up. Mid-Prairie (8-1) nailed down an at-large berth by beating Solon, 26-14.

Mid-Prairie is in the playoffs for the first time since 1976.

**LIKE XAVIER**, Edgewood-Colesburg joins the postseason fun for the first time Wednesday. The Vikings (6-3) earned a Class 1A at-large berth by thumping Alburnett, 42-14.

Wapsie Valley and North had wrapped up 1A berths a week ago. Wapsie Valley (8-1) is the District 3 champ; North Tama (8-1) won District 5 despite an 8-7 loss to Belle Plaine.

**CLASS A DISTRICT 6** arch-rivals English Valleys and HLV both qualified with huge wins.

English Valleys (7-2) is the district champion after beating Winfield-Mount Union, 57-6, while HLV (7-2) drubbed Harmony, 50-0.

East Buchanan (9-0) is the District 5 champion while Postville (8-1) qualified as an at-large team from District 4.

For some area qualifiers, this is old hat. Consider:

- Wapsie Valley, the Class 1A District 5 champion, is in for the 18th time.

- Class 2A unbeaten Mount Vernon and Sigourney-Keota have qualified for the 16th and 13th time, respectively.

- Iowa City High qualified for the 10th consecutive year and the 13th time in 14 seasons.

- West Delaware will make its 12th Class 3A appearance.

# J-Hawks no match for City

Little Hawks roll Jefferson in tuneup for postseason bid

IOWA CITY — Playoff berth — accomplished.

Mississippi Valley Conference title — accomplished.

Undefeated regular season — accomplished.

State title — to be determined.

Iowa City High secured its third goal of the season with a 27-0 win over Cedar Rapids Jefferson in an MVC football game Friday night at Bates Field.

"We still have the big one left, but this one pretty important as well," City High Coach Dan Sabers said. "There are 14 teams in the Valley, and we're the only one to go undefeated this season."

The Little Hawks, ranked third in Class 4A, won its ninth game of the season the same way it has won all season — with a stingy defense and a high-powered offense.

City High posted its third shutout and

ran its string of quarters without allowing a touchdown to 20.

The Little Hawks set a new school record with 56 points allowed this year, breaking the record of 57 set by last year's squad.

"Our defense has been there all season, and we knew if we got the shutout tonight that record was ours," City High defensive back Alex Ebinger said.

"We've taken a lot of pride in not giving up a touchdown in five games, and it's something that everyone on this defense would like to keep going for four more games."

City High's defense was definitely put to the test. Jefferson (4-5) rolled up 207 yards on the ground against the conference's top-rated rushing defense.

"Jefferson is a good football team, and they went right at us," Sabers said. "They were very physical and did a nice job of running the ball. Our guys adjusted, and we stayed very tough mentally to get the job done."

On the other side of the ball, City High's Connor Jostes was 11 of 30 passing for 169 yards, but the senior had three completions go for scores. Jostes has a school-

record 22 touchdown passes.

After an interception on the opening series, Jostes came back to complete five of his next eight passes on scoring drives of 79 and 75 yards to give the Little Hawks a 14-0 halftime lead.

"Connor had a couple interceptions, but he came back and made some big plays when we needed it," Sabers said. "He's 9-0 as a starter, so I can't say too many things bad about him."

**FULLBACK MATT** Rhoades had his best offensive night of the year, catching six passes for 91 yards and two touchdowns.

City High's Calvin Davis started the second half with an 87-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. It's the second time this season he's returned kickoff for a score. He has 12 touchdowns this season.

The Little Hawks open the playoffs Wednesday night.

Dyersville Beckman rallied with 34 unanswered points Friday en route to a 41-21 victory over North Fayette that clinched a Class 2A playoff slot for the Trailblazers.

Quarterback Dave Rahe's 18-yard third-quarter keeper brought Beckman (7-2, 6-1 District 5) to within 21-14 and ignited the stream of Blazer points that followed. Tailback Rob Thole tied the game at 21-all with an 8-yard run with 1:58 left in the third quarter.

Zach Scherrman's 5-yard run put Beckman ahead for good with 7:56 left to make it 27-21.

North Fayette (5-4, 5-2), which had 140 rushing yards in the first half, mustered just 76 total yards of offense in the second half and didn't pick up a first down until the 4:30 mark of the fourth quarter.

Scherrman had a huge night for Beckman, piling up 273 yards and three touchdowns on 26 carries. Scherrman broke off on TD runs of 60 and 73 yards.

playoffs."

"I think Father O'Brien hit the nail on the head in our pregame mass," Xavier Coach Duane Schulte said. "He said to come out and play to our best potential, our best ability, and good things would happen. And that's what these guys did. We didn't do anything super special. We just tried to prepare for a good football team in Kennedy. We just tried to play hard."

Kennedy (5-4) leaped to its 14-0 lead thanks to a pair of big plays.

The first was a 65-yard pass from quarterback Matt Keel to receiver Nick Mohwinkel that set up Keel's eventual 5-yard touchdown run. The second was a 75-yard fullback trap run for touchdown by Aaron Lageneaux.

"We didn't really change anything," Schulte said. "It was a matter of two big plays that they had, so we just tried to stick with our same stuff and just keep pounding away."

Led by bruising fullback Peck, pound, pound, pound away was exactly what Xavier did. The senior toted the ball 31 times in the game and still didn't get to the 100-yard mark — finishing with 98.

But those consistently tough runs and a key pass play here or there was enough. Peck scored on a 6-yard run by Peck two minutes into the second quarter, then bolted into the

end zone again from a yard out 37 seconds before halftime.

His winner came on a 4th-and-goal play 1:02 into the final quarter.

"I've got to give a lot of credit to our defense," Peck said. "They gave up two early, but after that, they held them tight. We just wanted to wear them down. We know that we're in better shape than most teams. So we just wanted to keep pounding it down their throats."

Wasted opportunities is what best summed this one up for Kennedy.

The Cougars were inside the Xavier 35 three times in the second half but couldn't score. The game and season ended for Kennedy when Keel was stopped a yard shy on a 4th-and-3 scramble at the Xavier 30 with a minute remaining.

Even worse, as it all played out, Kennedy got the necessary help it needed from other teams to qualify for the playoffs. All it had to do was win.

But the Cougars didn't. "You've got to give Xavier all the credit in the world," Kennedy Coach Tim Lewis said. "They are a great football team, and they could have folded their tent but didn't."

"At the same time, I always our guys to leave the field with no regrets. And I don't think these kids did."
