Fleisher's round of 60 ties Senior tour record

■ CLEMMONS, N.C. — Bruce Fleisher birdied 10 of his first 14 holes Friday for a 10-under-par 60, tying the record for the lowest 18-hole score in Senior PGA Tour history in the first round of the RJR Championship.

He is three strokes ahead of Mike McCullough, who birdied the last four holes for a 7-under 63.

Fleisher lost his bid to become the first senior golfer to shoot a 59 when his first chip shot from the left of the green on the par-5 finishing hole came up short of the green. His second attempt went 3 feet past the cup, and he settled for par.

Johnson breaks neck in one-car accident

■ ATLANTA — Atlanta Hawks forward DerMarr Johnson broke his neck in a car crash early Friday, an injury that is not life-threatening but could cause him to miss the season.

"A fraction of an inch one way or the other, and the doctor said it

would have been very bad," Hawks general manager Pete Babcock said.

Johnson was scheduled for surgery Friday afternoon at Atlanta Medical Center, Hawks spokesman Arthur Triche said, but could be released as early as Monday.

"In the long term, his prognosis is excellent," Triche said. "His playing status for the upcoming season is in question."

Johnson, 22, and two other men were in Johnson's car when it crossed the center line, hit a tree and caught fire.

Defense does it again

Washington great on special teams, too

CEDAR RAPIDS — This is what we've learned about the Cedar Rapids Washington football team two weeks into the 2002 season:

Led by a strong line, quick linebackers and an even quicker secondary, the Warriors have one of the best defensive units in the Mississippi Valley Conference.

With returner extradonaire Adrian Arrington and kicker/punter Michael Herzberger, the Warriors' special teams are rivaled only by their defensive unit.

With shifty tailback Poul Collins leading the way, the running game is rapidly maturing. The passing game? Well, that's still a work in progress.

The Washington defense posted its second straight shutout to start the season. Arrington returned a punt for a touchdown. Herzberger kicked a 37-yard field goal and Collins rushed for 149 yards and three touchdowns

to lead Washington past Kennedy, 38-0, in front of about 4,500 fans Friday night at Kingston Stadium.

Washington improved to 2-0 while Kennedy dipped to 0-2.

"Defensively ... we made a determination we wanted to keep things as simple as we could and let the kids use their athleticism," Washington Coach Paul James said at the conclu-

sion of the late-ending game. "These guys are 'sure' tacklers, and you don't always have that."

Before shutting out Prairie in last week's opener, Washington had not shut out another Metro opponent since beating Jefferson, 37-0, in 1996.

The Warrior defense — led by Andy Seyfer, Nathan Schultz, Tre Martin, Rob Bruggeman, Carl Protsch and Gavin McGrath — held Kennedy to 87 total yards of offense and forced eight punts.

Linn-Mar rally falls short

MARION — It was a game they seemed to have a stranglehold on several times. But it took an interception in their own end zone on the last play of the game before Iowa City West's Trojans finally celebrated a heart-stopping victory.

Linebacker Brandon Rogers picked off quarterback Clark Anderson's hurried throw to preserve West's 26-21 win over Linn-Mar in a thrilling prep football game Friday night at Armstrong Field.

The victory makes up somewhat for a demoralizing overtime loss to Waterloo West

last week for Iowa City West (1-1). A gutsy Linn-Mar team that rallied from two-touchdown deficits twice dropped to 1-1.

"That's character," said West Coach Dan Dvorak. "That's what makes you grow up ... They came back, but we held them when we had to."

West looked to be successfully grinding this one out when it ran five minutes off the clock late in the fourth quarter with a power running game that devastated the

Linn-Mar defense the entire game.

But stalwart running back Greg Coleman — who finished with 212 yards rushing and a touchdown — fumbled at the Linn-Mar 21, with Lion defensive back Nick Cappussi falling on it with 1:08 to go, giving the Lions one last gasp.

A couple of untimely 15-yard West penalties coupled with a nicely executed dink-and-dime offensive approach helped Linn-Mar drive to the 10 with one second left.

Anderson rolled out left on the game's final play, saw immediate pressure and appeared to rush a desperation

IOWA CITY — It's just a line, right? How complex can it be to get that yellow first down marker to stroll across the field on televised college and professional football games?

Well, it's so technical, Sportvision "1st and Ten" operator Steve Webster still hasn't discovered how to dumb down his job description to information-hungry football fans, even in his third

year with the company.

"I have not actually perfected that, coming up with the quick, perfect explanation," said Webster, a graduate of Iowa City High and Northern Iowa who lives in Phoenix when not working football games across the country. "It's difficult for me to break it down into layman's terms. It's such a technical process, it's not the easiest thing to break down."

But we're going to try, so take a deep

breath and maybe even fasten that thinking cap a notch tighter.

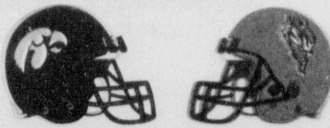
Sportvision is an independent company based in New York City with research and development facilities in

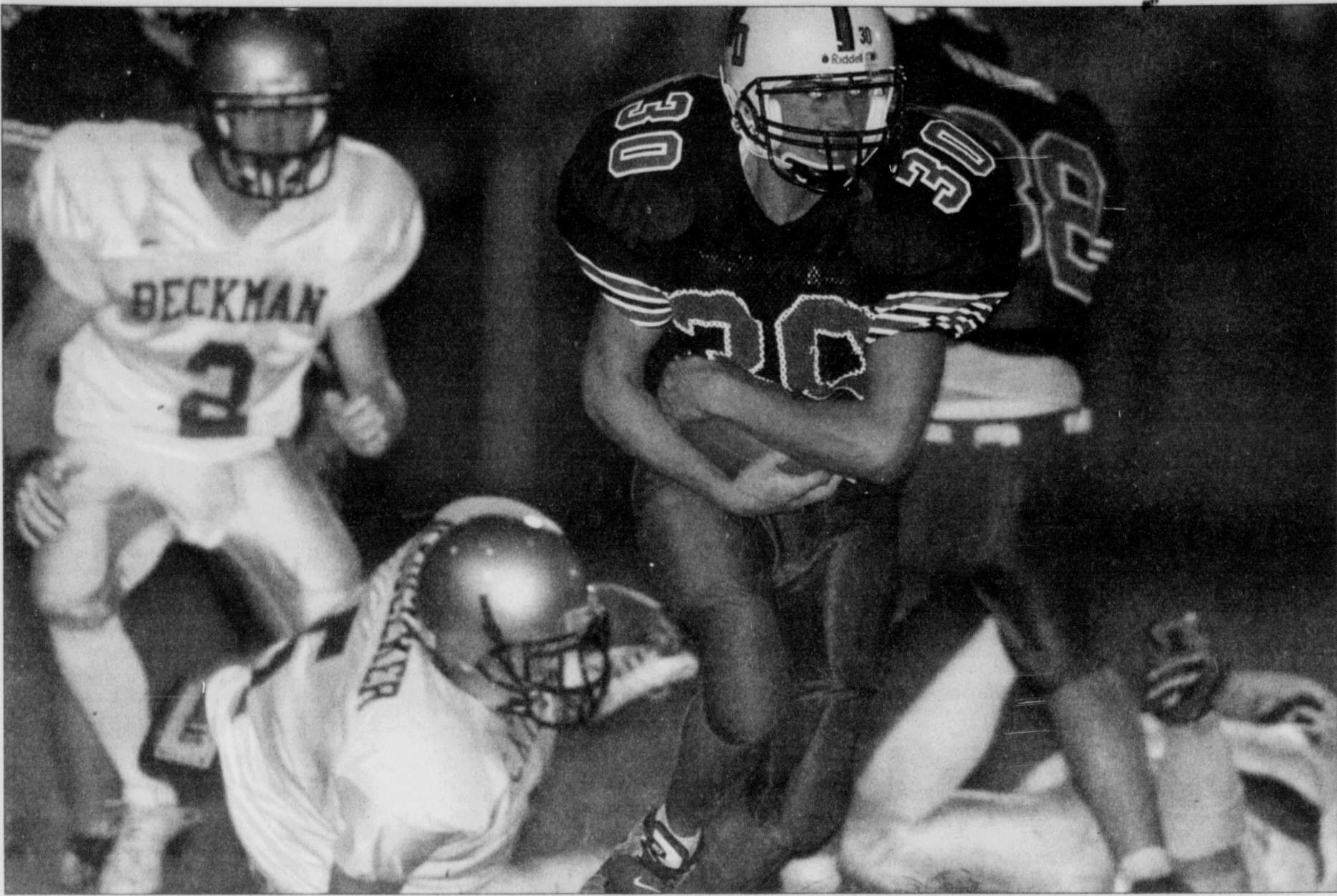

Raiders crush Savage Cobras

Williamsburg rolls to big victory; Hammes injured

SIGOURNEY — This football showdown had all the makings of a classic battle between two of Class 2A heavyweights — top ranked Sigourney-Keota and No. 4 Williamsburg.

After the teams traded hay-makers in the first quarter, the Savage Cobras received a devastating knockout blow in the second quarter when all-state spin back Dan Hammes suffered a broken left arm while playing defense.

Hammes didn't return to the

game, and the Raiders took control in the second half to post a 40-14 victory Friday.

"When you take your captain and leading player out of the lineup, it'll affect you," Sigourney Coach Bob Howard said.

Williamsburg capitalized behind the dynamic duo of Dustyn Baethke and Cody Wille, who combined to score all six of the Raiders' touchdowns. Baethke, coming a 270-yard performance against Center Point-Urbana, had 220 yards on 27 carries and three scores.

Wille scored touchdowns on a kickoff return, reverse and pass reception.

"This is a good win for us. This gives us confidence going into districts," Baethke said. "The hard work we put in this week — we have to do that the rest of the season."

With Hammes, who had 127 yards on 11 carries in the first quarter, on the sidelines, Williamsburg took a 21-14 lead on Baethke's 18-yard run with 1:09 left in the first half.

Baethke had tied the game on a 4-yard run with 7:21 left in the second.

"We needed to be able to control the football. Our defense was on the field too much," Howard said. "they're too good."

Before leaving by ambulance, Hammes, who rushed for a school-record 351 yards against Fort Madison in the season-opener, gave his teammates a pep talk on the field in hopes of giving the defending state champions the inspiration needed to extend their 14-game winning streak.

But the Raiders were just too tough to beat.

Williamsburg (2-0), which has won 13 consecutive regular-season games, scored on its second and third possessions of the third quarter to take a commanding 34-14 lead.

Wille had both touchdowns on a 6-yard reverse and a 16-yard scoring strike from quarterback Casey O'Rourke.

After Williamsburg went three-and-out on the game's first possession, Hammes on his first carry dashed untouched up the middle 60 yards for a touchdown, giving Sigourney-Keota a quick 7-0 lead.

The Savage Cobras (1-1) didn't lead for long, as Wille returned the ensuing kickoff 75 yards for the tying touchdown.

"Wille's kickoff return was huge. He answered the call," Williamsburg Coach Curt Ritchie said. "This is a gigantic win for these guys."

Hammes gave Sigourney-Keota a 14-7 lead on a 3-yard scoring run with 4:29 left in the first quarter.

Third-quarter blitz lifts Bobcats

EPWORTH — With one drive, Western Dubuque recaptured the line of scrimmage and regained momentum.

Forced into a dogfight with old Highway 20 rival Dyersville Beckman, the Class 3A top-ranked Bobcats broke it open

with three touchdowns in a six-minute span in the third quarter and prevailed, 30-19, in a non-district football game Friday night at Buchman Field.

Western Dubuque (2-0), the defending 3A state champion, won its 10th straight game. It can credit a critical drive to begin the second half.

"We knew we needed to get the momentum back," said Bobcats Coach Tom Kilburg. "We had to start controlling the line of scrimmage again."

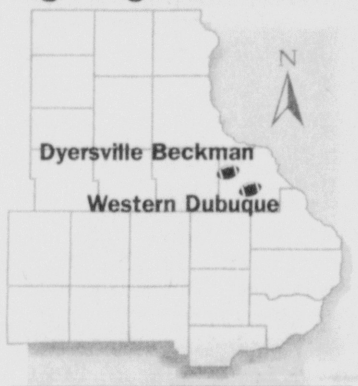
The Bobcats promptly marched 61 yards in 12 plays for a touchdown that gave them some breathing room at 16-7. Kevin Burds did the honors with a 12-yard run.

"That was a big key for us," said quarterback Jay Lehman, who finished with 137 yards of total offense. "It was a momentum-getter. It was huge."

It also preceded the Beckman back-breaker.

Two plays after the kickoff, the 2A 10th-ranked Blazers (1-1) committed the game's only turnover. Nick Foxen recovered a fumble for the Bobcats at the Beckman 10, and Peter

Beckman's Zac Sherrman returned the ensuing kickoff 92

yards to bring Beckman closer, but the Bobcats answered with a long scoring march, capped by Burds' 2-yard run to make it 30-13 late in the third quarter.

Western Dubuque picked up 114 rushing yards in the third quarter alone.

"We had to establish the running game, and we did," Kilburg said. "That gave us a lot more confidence."

The Bobcats had things under control through most of the first half.

They marched 80 yards in seven plays to score on their opening drive. Lehman capped it with a 2-yard run.

Andy Schramm's 29-yard field goal made it 9-0 with 10:05 left in the half.

Lehman completed five of his first six passes, but cooled

afterward. The Western Dubuque offense cooled with it, and the Blazers got back in the game.

Beckman closed within 9-7 on Sherrman's 5-yard run with 35 seconds left in the half. Beau Ellingson set up the score with a 45-yard bomb — just before taking a vicious hit — to Ryan Hittenmiller along the right sideline.

Ellingson, who passed for 107 yards, connected with Chris Palmer for a late touchdown to complete the scoring.

Western Dubuque opens Class 3A District 3 competition next Friday at home West Delaware. The Blazers open 2A-4 action against Jesup at Dyersville.

throw to the middle of the end zone that a kneeling West linebacker Brandon Rogers cradled in his arms to end the game.

"We had a stunt on with our linebackers, and we were able to put some pressure on (Anderson)," Dvorak said. "Our linebacker just made a great read."

"We have huge heart," countered a downtrodden Linn-Mar Coach Bob Read. "We got the ball back when there was no hope to get the ball back and took it down to the last play."

Anderson completed 10 of 23 passes for 185 yards for Linn-Mar. Cappussi — a force on both sides of the ball — caught three big passes for 119 yards and added 29 yards rushing.

"Our players don't quit," Read said. "I'm really proud of them."

Sophomore fullback Nick Kanellis complemented Coleman with additional tough inside runs, finishing with 89 yards and a touchdown in his first stint as a varsity running back. Normally an offensive lineman and defensive nose guard and wearing No. 66, Kanellis was switched to fullback this week in practice.

The Trojans pounded out 326 yards rushing. But three lost fumbles and eight penalties for 85 yards kept West from pulling away.

"It felt horrible losing last week," Kanellis said. "But this week, it just feels great."

West held a 20-7 halftime lead on the strength of a Coleman 18-yard first-quarter TD run, a Kanellis 8-yard second-quarter TD run and a 26-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter from quarterback Aaron Vincent to end Peter Kolbo.

Linn-Mar's lone points came on a 10-yard Adam Haedt scoring pass from Anderson.

Anderson hit Cappussi on a nifty 63-yard scoring pass midway through the third to make it 20-14. A 5-yard scoring pass from Vincent to Adam Bontrager early in the fourth made it 26-14 West, but Linn-Mar's Andy Zeal returned the ensuing kickoff 95 yards to cut the deficit back to 26-21.

Linn-Mar got two final chances to take the lead, including a recovered West fumble at the Trojan 33 right after Zeal's TD, but couldn't quite get it done.

The special teams were just about as good. Arrington used a dazzling spin move to return a punt 63 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter and also had a 31-yard return later in the same quarter.

Herzberger drilled a 37-yard field goal, had a 47-yard attempt barely miss wide-right and consistently put his kickoffs in the end zone.

"I'm really proud of our special

teams," James said. "Jason Edwards is our special teams coordinator and he's doing a great job because we're doing a lot of things completely different from what we've done in the past."

Collins, a shifty runner who needed 16 carries to total his 149 yards, had touchdown runs of 5, 24 and 7 yards.

Washington hosts Linn-Mar at Kingston Stadium next Thursday night. Kennedy continues its march against MVC heavyweights by traveling to Iowa City High next Friday.
