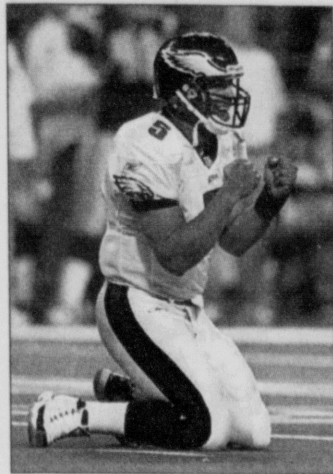

Boston Celtics sold to investor group

■ **WALTHAM, Mass.** — The Boston Celtics, one of the NBA's original and most storied franchises, will be sold to an investment group for \$360 million in a surprise deal announced Friday.

Under the agreement, which still requires league approval, the team will be passed into the hands of a group led by Boston-area venture capitalists Stephen Paglicua and Wycliffe Grousbeck, as well as Grousbeck's father, H. Irving Grousbeck, founder of Continental Cablevision.

Warriors ride big plays

J-Hawk rally falls bit short

CEDAR RAPIDS — A couple of big plays Friday night assured Cedar Rapids Washington of playing in a huge game next Friday night.

The Class 4A Warriors scored touchdowns on plays of 87, 31 and 15 yards and held off a ferocious fourth quarter comeback by Cedar Rapids Jefferson, and went on to win the 48th edition of the heated intracity battle, 24-17, in front of about 4,500 fans at Kingston Stadium.

In addition to the touchdown

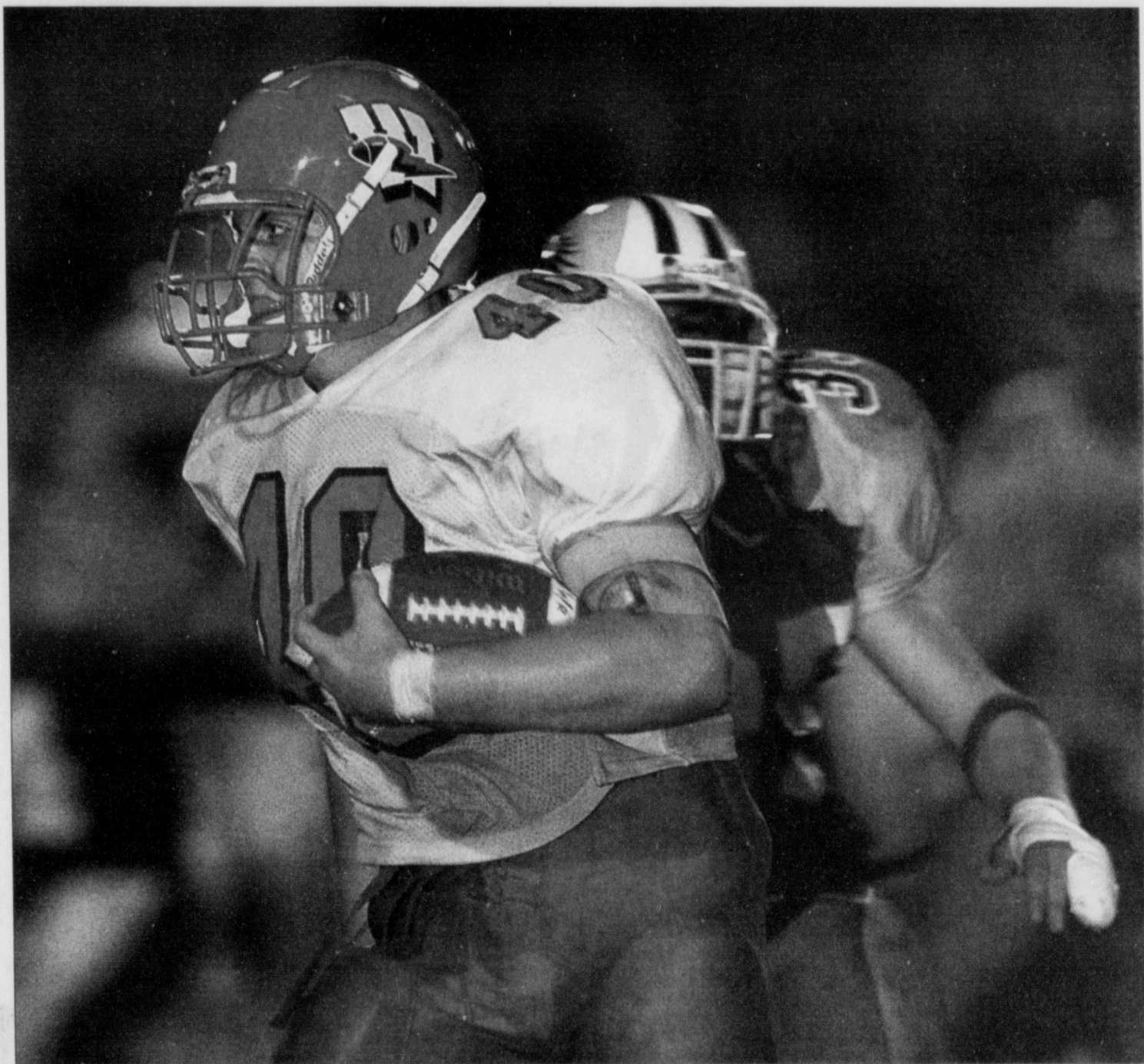
plays — an 87-yard pass from Warren Sues to Poul Collins, a 15-yard pass from Sues to Andy Seyfer and a 31-yard run off an end-around from Adrian Arrington — the Warriors had three other plays from scrimmage that covered 27 yards or more.

Their three touchdown drives covered 98 yards in four plays, 96 yards in 10 plays and 74 yards in five plays. "We were able to sustain some drives with some big plays and our passing game came around a little tonight," said Sues, who completed 7 of 13 passes for 158 yards and the two TDs. "Our running game also played well, but (Jefferson) played some good defense at the same time and it turned into a good game."

The win sets up a showdown next Friday night between Washington (4-0) and second-ranked Cedar Falls (4-0) back at Kingston.

The Warriors didn't show nearly the dominance on either side of the ball they showed in their first three wins.

They fell behind 3-0 on a 26-yard field goal by Jefferson's

Steve Evans in the first quarter — the first time Washington had trailed all season — and led, 10-7, at halftime behind a 35-yard field goal from Michael Herzberger and Collins' 87-yard touchdown reception.

Washington led, 24-3, after Arrington danced into the end zone untouched with 8:10 left in the game.

"I was really happy with the

way we stepped up when we had the ball," Washington Coach Paul James said. "This wasn't the greatest effort defense-wise, but we stopped them when we had to."

It may have been a matter of the J-Hawks (1-3) running out of time and timeouts. Quarterback Cody LaKose threw touchdown passes of 40 yards to Matt Brecht with 5:46 remain-

ing, then came back to throw a 31-yard scoring pass to Araf Evans with 2:12 left.

The J-Hawks got the ball back one more time, but could only watch as the second ticked away.

"We've been getting ourselves into deep holes but we're proud of our kids and the way they hung around and never said die," Jefferson Coach Jim

Womochil said. "We had some opportunities early to get on top of this one, and we fumbled the ball on the (Washington) 1-yard line and got stopped on the (Washington) 3."

"I thought our offense moved the ball pretty consistently all night, and I'm disappointed we ended up losing the ball game."

Prairie's defense smothers Kennedy

CEDAR RAPIDS — Cedar Rapids Prairie's offense was great early and pretty good late. Its defense was great early, late and everywhere in between.

Hawk defenders held Cedar Rapids Kennedy to 91 total yards, 9 rushing, recorded seven quarterback sacks and pitched a shutout in an impressive 27-0 Prairie win Friday night at John Wall Field.

Fleet-footed senior tailback Jason Kohl rushed for 160 yards and a touchdown for Prairie (3-1). Fullback Casey Clark ran for two touchdowns for the Hawks, who rushed for 302 yards and scored on their first three possessions.

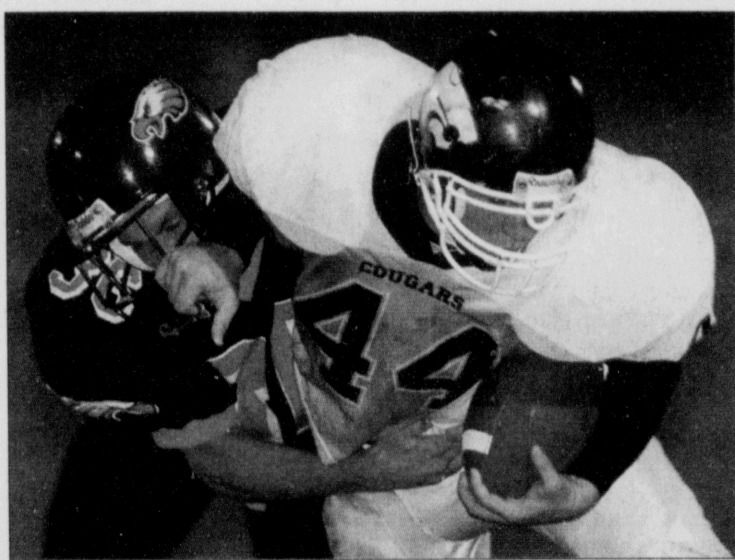
But it was a brick-wall of a defense driven by the constant

blitzing of linebacker Clark and the dominance of his mates up front that was the difference.

"I thought the whole defense played well as a unit," said Prairie Coach Craig Jelinek. "I thought we got to the ball very quick. I thought our pass rush really, really gave them a hard time."

"It's always nice to pitch a shutout," added Clark, an aggressive 200-pound senior. "Our

Riders' opponent brings new name, same challenge

Season opens with playoff nemesis from River City

CEDAR RAPIDS — So you want a tough opener? Try this one.

The River City Lancers head to the Cedar Rapids Ice Arena tonight to begin the United States Hockey League's regular season. Opening faceoff is 7:05.

You might know these Lancers better as the Omaha Lancers. The team changed its

name this season because it will move into a new 7,000-seat arena in Council Bluffs in mid-October.

Omaha/River City has oodles of tradition. The Lancers had the best regular-season record in the league a year ago, won seven of eight meetings with the Riders and eliminated them from the USHL playoffs in the second round.

And goaltender Dominic Vicari is back to torment the league's scorers. Vicari, who has committed to Michigan

State, was second in the USHL last season with a 1.78 goals against average and was third in save percentage at .926.

He gave up two goals in three postseason games against the Riders and shut them out in the series-clinching game four.

"That's OK," said Riders coach/general manager Mark Carlson. "As far as we're concerned, it's a clean slate. It's just Cedar Rapids versus River City."

The Riders return eight players from a squad that set

■ **ON TAP:** The Cedar Rapids RoughRiders begin their fourth United States Hockey League regular season by hosting the River City Lancers tonight at the Cedar Rapids Ice Arena. Faceoff is 7:05.

■ **SCOUTING REPORT:** The Lancers won the Anderson Cup last year by finishing with a league-best 95 regular-season points (on a 46-12-3 record). They eliminated the RoughRiders in the second round of the playoffs but lost to Sioux City in the Clark Cup.

■ The RoughRiders are coming off a franchise-best season in which they won 33 games and won their first playoff series. Cedar Rapids is without Canadian defenseman Owen Langis, who will be out for at least

two more weeks because of a separated shoulder suffered in the preseason.

■ **NEW HEIGHTS:** The USHL has jumped to Tier I junior status this season. Teams are limited to the number of 20-year-old players they can have. Teams also cover the bill for player housing and equipment and must meet minimum attendance requirements. The folding of the Tulsa Crude and Rochester Mustangs leaves the league with 11 teams. There are no divisions this season. The top eight teams in points qualify for the playoffs.

Xavier Ws help Saints get another W

Weber, Webber and Weber excel on defense in victory vs. Linn-Mar

CEDAR RAPIDS — Nick Weber, Kyle Webber and Luke Weber are not related by blood or birth, just by brotherhood on the Xavier High School football team.

All three excelled on defense Friday night as Xavier blanked Linn-Mar, 23-0, in a Mississippi Valley Conference game at Saints Field.

Nick Weber, a defensive back, intercepted two passes. Kyle Webber, a linebacker, had a sack and several crushing tackles. Luke Weber, a defensive tackle, helped the Saints control the line of scrimmage and hold Linn-Mar to 167 yards of total offense. "Our defense was awesome," Kyle Webber said.

The public address announcer kept calling their names — Weber, Webber and Weber. It got a little confusing, even for Xavier Coach Duane Schulte.

"I yelled for 'Weber' one time and I got the wrong one," he said after the game with a smile.

"He was looking for Nick and I

showed up," Kyle explained. "It gets kind of confusing when they say 'Weber' and all three of us look."

There were too many Webers — or Webbers — on the field for Linn-Mar. The Lions (1-3) never got inside the 20-yard line all night against Xavier's defense.

"I'm real proud of this team," said Luke Weber. "We can accomplish a lot if we stay together and keep working hard."

Luke Weber, who has partial hearing, sometimes has trouble hearing the whistle due to his disability. He reads lips, and teammates make sure he knows what's going on.

"He's such a great kid and goes hard all the time. It's fun to watch him," said Jim O'Connell, Xavier's defensive coordinator.

Nick Weber intercepted one pass in the first half and another in the second to help Xavier (3-1). He also had a 59-yard reception on a trick play on Xavier's second play of the game to set up a 12-yard touchdown run by Jason Sweet.

Quarterback Mike Sayre threw a

lateral to Travis Sweet, who launched the pass to Nick Weber behind the Linn-Mar defense. Jason Sweet scored two plays later.

The Saints made it 9-0 in the second quarter on a 31-yard field goal by Andrew Davis.

That was the score at halftime when Xavier honored members of the 1982 LaSalle and Regis high school football teams that played for state titles 20 years ago.

The Saints salted the game away in the fourth quarter on a 5-yard touchdown burst by Chris Hoeger, making it 16-0, and a 9-yard touchdown run by Darrius Stewart with 20 seconds left.

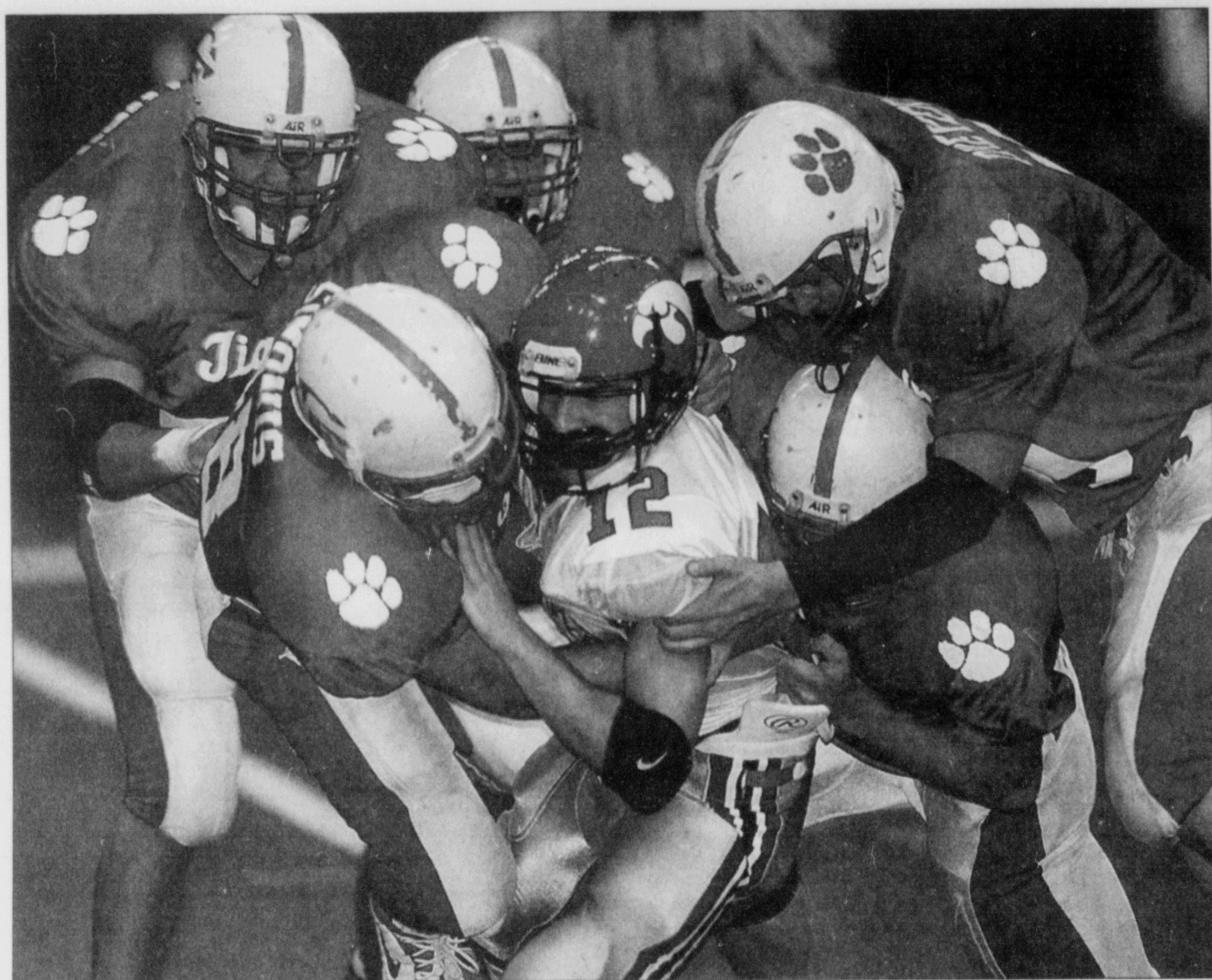

Tigers too much for I.C. High

Little Hawks fail to stop offense of Cedar Falls

CEDAR FALLS — It might not have been complete redemption, but it will work for now in the eyes of the Cedar Falls Tigers.

Class 4A No. 2 Cedar Falls rolled up 422 yards of total offense Friday night in a 45-7 victory over No. 10 Iowa City High at the UNI-Dome.

For the Tigers (4-0), it is the first win in six attempts against the Little Hawks (2-2)

and it helps avenge three straight playoff defeats against City High, including a 21-14 overtime game a year ago at the UNI-Dome.

Cedar Falls running back Derek Fournier was the main weapon in the Tigers' arsenal.

Fournier carried the ball 30 times for a career-best 270 yards including touchdowns of 47, 17, 3, 50 and 2 yards, which was also a career-best. He single-handedly outgained the City High offense, which had 250 yards of total offense.

"This made up a little for

last year, but not all the way," Fournier said. "This was almost like a playoff game for us, but we have a ways to go.

"Our offensive line had an outstanding game for me to get the yards I got. I can't say enough good things about them."

The Tigers wasted little time setting the tone, needing only seven plays to march the ball 72 yards, taking a 7-0 lead on a one-yard quarterback sneak by Nick Nelson. Fournier was the workhorse on the drive, carrying the ball five times for 48 yards.

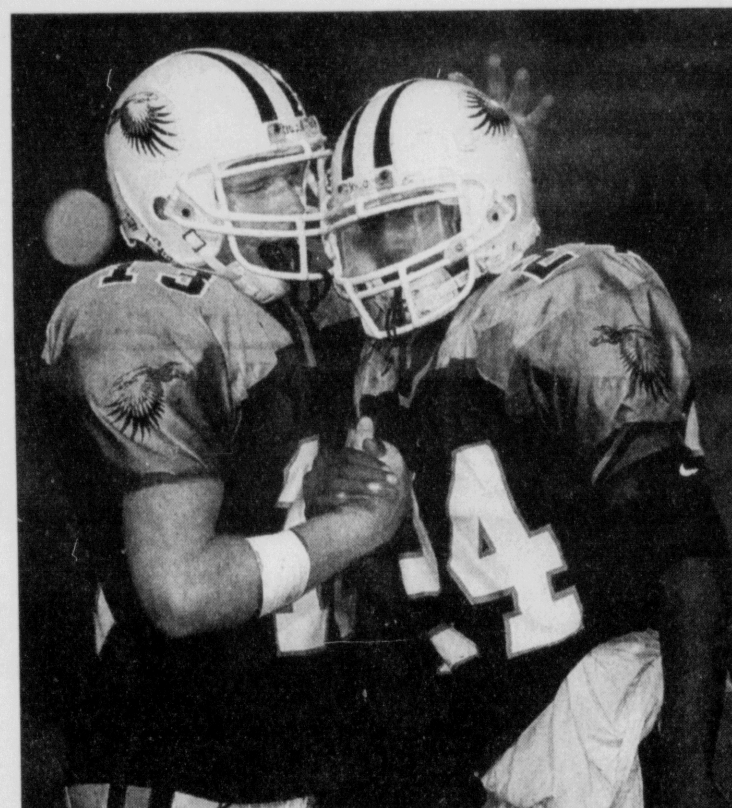
Cedar Falls attempted to increase its lead to 10-0 late in the first quarter, but Brian

Wingert's 32-yard field goal attempt was wide right after a nine-play, 43-yard drive.

That and one other stop in the second half were the lone bright spots for the Little Hawk defense, which allowed 56 points in the regular season last year.

City High's lone bright spot on offense was an 11-play, 86-yard drive right before the half. Caleb Recker capped the drive with a 27-yard touchdown reception on a jailbreak screen from Curtis Steyers, cutting Cedar Falls' lead to 21-7 at halftime.

Cedar Falls dominated in the second half, outgaining City High 172-68.

tains to injury this season. "It's just frustrating. I don't think our kids give up, but as I just told them, I just didn't see it in

Prairie held Kennedy to 19 total yards in the first half, including five rushing. Its offense, meanwhile, was about as dominant as its defense — particularly in a 21-point first quarter.

The Hawks took the opening kickoff and drove 65 yards on 12 plays for their first touchdown, a 3-yard dive by Clark. Ryan Hass connected twice with sophomore split end Glen Fox for first-down pass plays of 8 and 25 yards.

Prairie forced Kennedy to punt on the ensuing possession and took over at the Cougar 39. From there, it took all of two plays to score on a Kohl 29-yard burst off tackle. Kohl went untouched on the play. Russell Hartman's extra point made it 14-0 Prairie with 4:06 to go in the first quarter.

The Hawks weren't done. After a fruitless Kennedy possession, Prairie took over at the Cougar 42 and scored in two plays, this time on a Clark 37-yard fullback trap.

Hartman's extra-point boot made it 21-0 after a quarter. Kennedy's defense stiffened af-

ter that, and Prairie didn't score until the first play of the fourth, when Hass hit tight end Zahradnik for a 24-yard touchdown.

"Our offense bogging down was really a credit to Kennedy," Jelinek said. "Luckily we had the lead, and we were able to ride the lead out."
