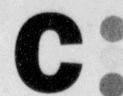

Glaus' tiebreaking shot keys Angels

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — The Anaheim Angels monkeyed around with Minnesota for seven innings, then watched Troy Glaus put them in control of the AL championship series.

Glaus hit a tiebreaking homer off J.C. Romero in the eighth inning, and the Angels got two great catches in the ninth to beat the Twins 2-1 Friday night to take a 2-1 series lead.

"It's fun playing in the post-

season," Glaus said. "That's why we put all the time and effort in in spring training."

Garret Anderson's second-inning homer off Eric Milton had put the Angels ahead, and Jarrod Washburn seemed unstoppable until Jacque Jones' RBI double to left over Anderson in the seventh, which ended an 0-for-18 skid.

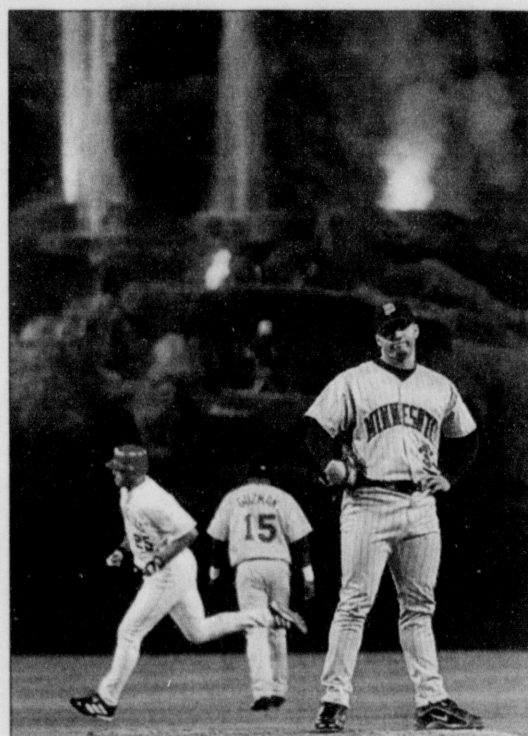
Then came the "rally monkey," who during the regular

season appears only when the Angels trail after the fifth inning. Like closer Troy Percival, he's coming in a little earlier than usual during the postseason.

Anaheim failed to get a run despite advancing a runner to third with one out in the seventh, but Glaus led off the eighth with his fourth homer of the postseason, an opposite-field drive into the right-field bleachers off Romero, the Twins' fifth pitcher.

CEDAR RAPIDS — The members of the Cedar Rapids Washington defensive unit watched enthusiastically Friday night while their counterparts on offense posted big play after big play during the first half of the Warriors' game against Cedar Rapids Xavier.

In the second half, it was the defense's turn to put on a show.

Class 4A third-ranked Washington forced two big

turnovers in the fourth quarter that led to touchdowns, and the Warriors stopped the Saints, 31-10, in the second game of a Mississippi Valley Conference double-header that helped celebrate Kingston Stadium's 50th anniversary in front of an estimated crowd of about 8,000.

Nathan Shultz recovered a fumble on the Xavier 6-yard line coughed up by Saint quarterback Mike Sayre after he was knocked down from behind by newcomer Taveres Johnson. That led to a 6-yard touchdown run by Poul Collins with 8:57 left in the game to give the Warriors a 24-10 lead after Xavier had moved within a touchdown.

On the Saints' next possession, the Warriors twisted the knife in a little deeper when newcomer Johnson intercepted a Sayre pass and returned it 54 yards for a touchdown with 6:40 left.

Washington improved to 6-0. Xavier lost its second straight and dipped to 3-3.

"We knew Xavier would come out fired up. Both teams are when we play each other," Washington Coach Paul James said. "I have to hand it to our defense. They really toughened up in the second half."

The Warriors did every-

thing pretty well, which is rapidly becoming a trademark of the team.

Collins was his usual elusive self, rushing 27 times for 190 yards and two touchdowns. Flanker Adrian Arrington caught five passes for 83 yards and had a touch-

down-preventing interception in the first half.

Quarterback Warren Sues was efficient, completing 5 of 9 passes for 88 yards. But the eye-opener may have been the play of Johnson, a 5-11, 170-pound senior who just became eligible after transfer-

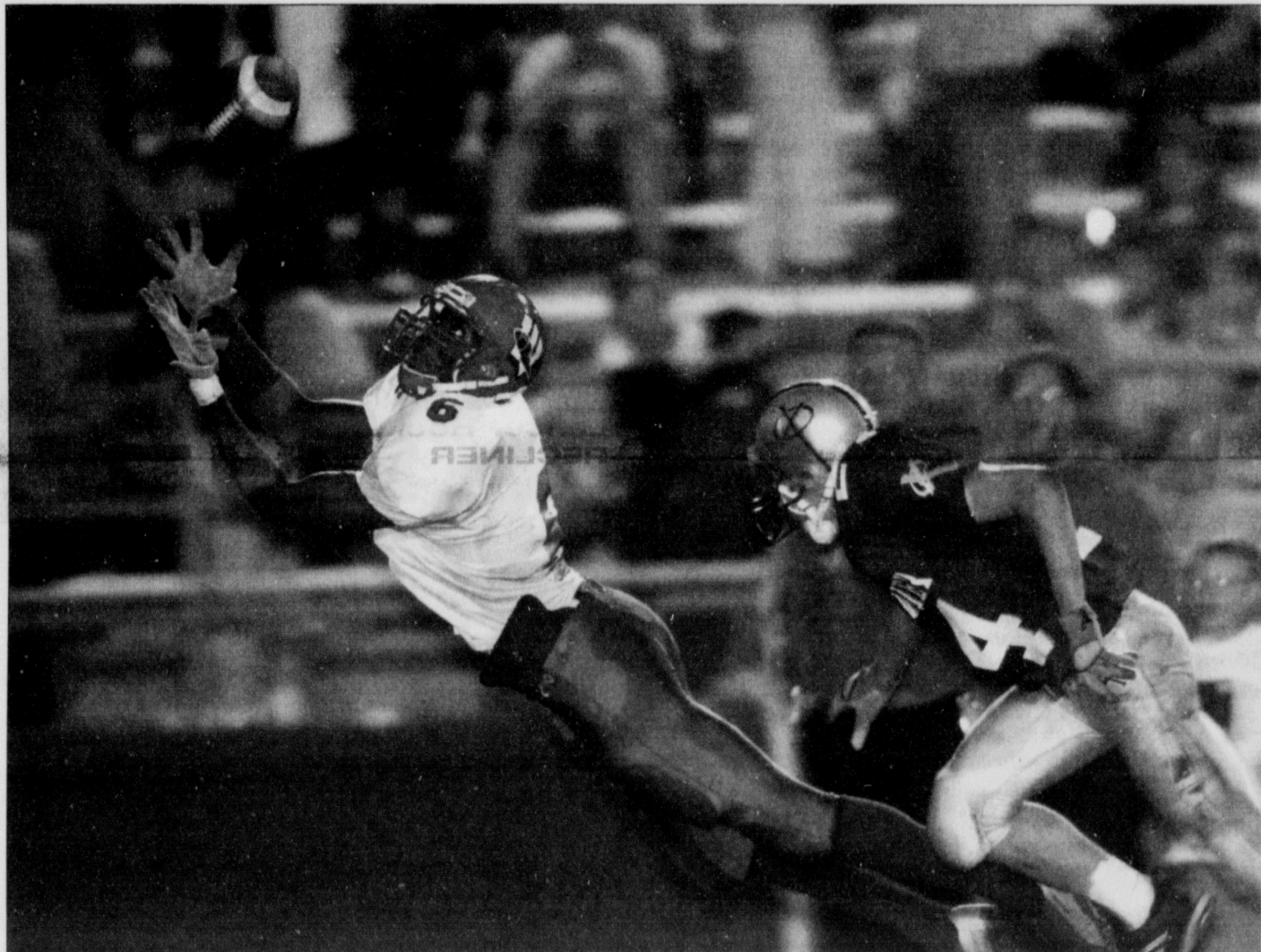
ring from Waterloo East.

"He's a very good athlete," James said.

"He stepped up and did a nice job."

Washington used its big-play capabilities to build a 17-3 halftime lead despite fall-

Jefferson rides third-quarter burst

CEDAR RAPIDS — Getting into the end zone for Cedar Rapids Kennedy has been like trying to win the lottery.

The Cougars keep playing, but they keep coming up a number or two shy of the jackpot.

Things got better for the Cougars (1-5) with a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns, but it was too little, too late Friday night as Cedar Rapids Jefferson held off Kennedy, 27-23, at Kingston Stadium.

"We had the ball inside their 5-yard line three times and came away with just six points," Kennedy Coach Tim

Lewis said. "But that's not how you play this game. You have to execute."

"That's been a problem all year long. I don't know exactly what to do. We work red zone, we work goal-line every day in practice. It's a mental thing when you get down. It's a case of who wants it the most. Apparently, the teams we have played so far this year have wanted to stop us more than we have wanted to get in the end zone."

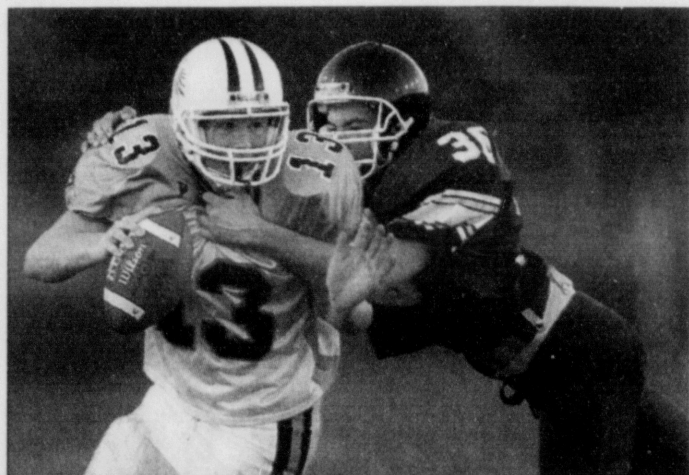
Jefferson (3-3) had the de-

sire to keep Kennedy (1-5) out of the end zone, and the J-Hawks also made sure they kept the momentum on their side of the field.

The Cougars tried a little trickery at the end of the first half, but Derek Hinke's pass off a fake field goal attempt fell incomplete and the J-Hawks had a 13-6 halftime lead.

"That was a real big play for us," said Jefferson senior running back and defensive back Ashton Northern. "It was a good fake, but we had Jordan Goforth there to make the play."

Jefferson has been a second-half team this season.

Northern, who scored all four Jefferson touchdowns, had 73-yard run on which he

went from one sideline to the other, setting up his first score of the third quarter.

ing behind, 3-0, and despite losing a pair of fumbles. The Saints took the early lead by using 11 plays to move to the Washington 10 and Andrew Davis booted a 27-yard field goal with 1:26 left in the first quarter. The Warriors answered on their next possession when Michael Herzberger knotted the game with a 45-yard field goal. Washington punched the ball into the end zone twice in a 2-minute, 4-second span of the second quarter, the first on a high-stepping, twisting 18-yard touchdown run by Maurice Cantrell and the second on a 5-yard run by Collins. Cantrell's touchdown was set up by a 54-yard Collins run, and Collins' TD followed pass completions from Suess to Arrington of 12 and 36 yards.

The Saints almost got a huge momentum boost late in the half when Dan Lynch recovered a Washington fumble on the Warrior 46 and a screen pass from Mike Sayre to John Maher picked up 35 yards to the 11. But Arrington went high in a jump-ball situation in the end zone to pick off a Sayer pass with 50.5 seconds left in the half, ending the threat. Xavier scored its only touchdown on a 16-yard pass from Sayre to Jason Sweet on the first play of the fourth quarter. The MVC grind continues for both teams next Friday night when Xavier hosts Iowa City West and Washington entertains Dubuque Senior, its sixth straight game at Kingston.

Womochil said his team gave a flat effort.

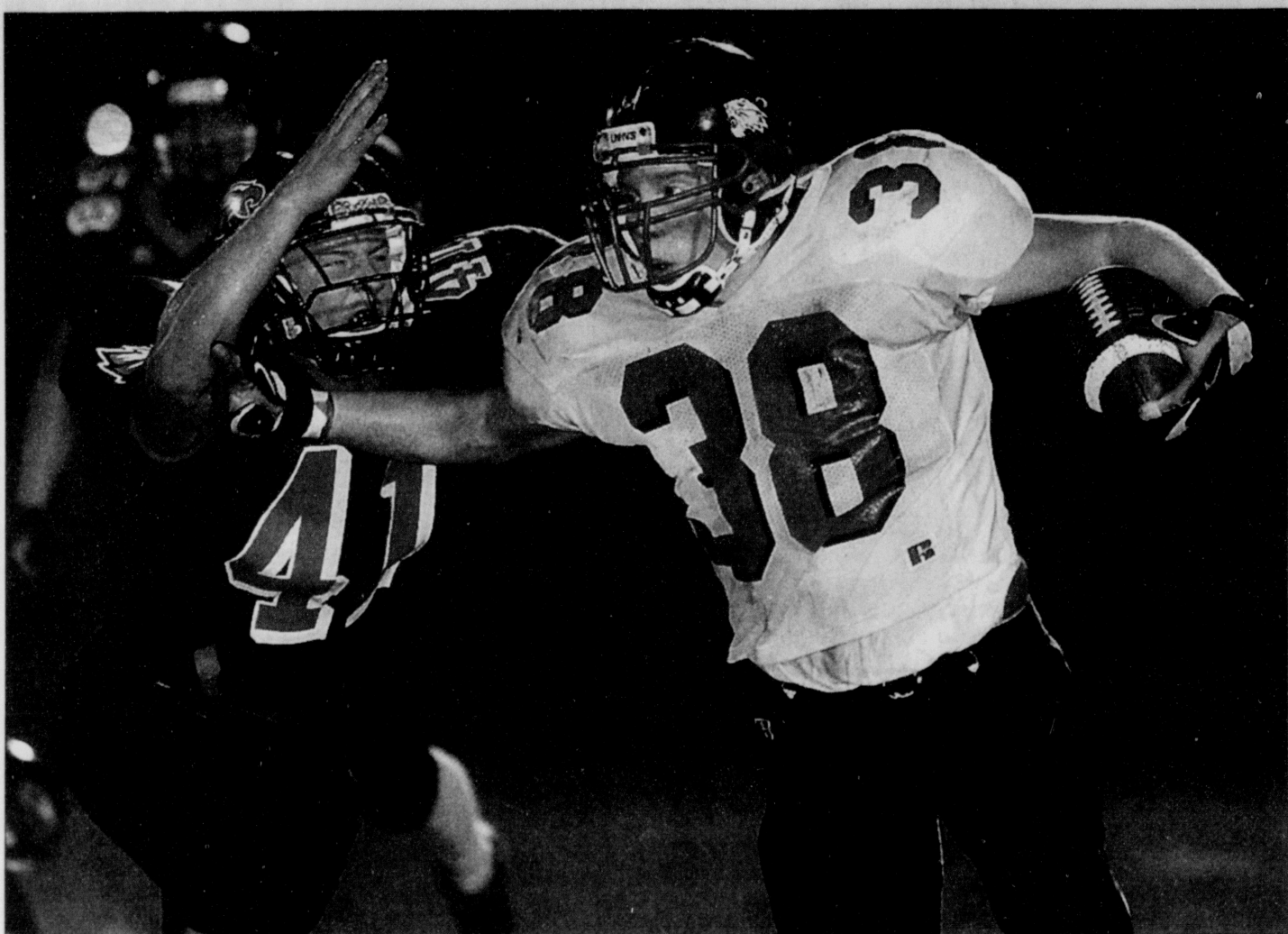

Prairie blasts Lions

Hawks limit visitors to 1 yard in second half

CEDAR RAPIDS — Craig Jelinek has seen lots of strong defensive efforts from his football teams at Cedar Rapids Prairie during his 14 years as head coach, but he couldn't remember anything like this. Prairie completely stuffed Linn-Mar Friday night with a suffocating defense and blanked the Lions, 30-0, in a Mississippi Valley Conference game at John Wall Stadium.

Linn-Mar had only 1 yard of total offense and no first downs in the entire second half. The Lions finished the game with 75 yards and four first downs.

"Our defense has been good all year," Jelinek said. "The kids really take a lot of pride in their defense."

"The kids out here like playing defense. They love to hit and be physical."

Linn-Mar collected 9 yards

in the first quarter, minus-7 yards in the third quarter and 8 yards in the fourth period against Prairie's swarming defenders.

"Pretty stellar," said Prairie linebacker/fullback Casey Clark, who contributed a bunch of tackles and two touchdowns.

"Our coaching staff put us in great position this week," Prairie linebacker Josh Hall said. "They gave us a job, and we just had to get the job done."

Linn-Mar (1-5) had one good drive all night, a 50-yard march in the second period that ended with a missed 30-yard field goal.

It was a rough night in many ways for the Lions. The game was delayed for 20 minutes in the fourth quarter after Linn-Mar defensive lineman Andy Harper suffered a seizure on the field.

Harper, who has a history of seizures, was removed from the field on a stretcher and taken to a hospital for treatment.

"They think he should be

fine," Linn-Mar Coach Bob Read said after the game, relieved.

"As sad as the game was, our thoughts are with Andy," he said. "It kind of puts the game in perspective when you have a kid down on the field."

Harper made a tackle, returned to the defensive huddle and suddenly collapsed. Medical personnel rushed to his side while players, fans and coaches waited anxiously.

"I've never seen that before and I never want to see that again," Read said.

Harper's parents came onto the field to be with their son. At one point, his mother apologized to Coach Read for delaying the game. "Can you imagine that?" Read said.

Prairie (4-2) took the opening kickoff and marched 69 yards for its first touchdown on a 2-yard burst by Jason Kohl.

Linn-Mar lost 3 yards on its first possession and tried to

punt, but Hall blocked the kick and Prairie took over at the 1-yard line. Clark scored on the first play and Aaron Mitchell's second PAT made it 14-0 with 6:38 left in the first quarter.

Mitchell booted a 27-yard field goal in the second period for a 17-0 lead. The Hawks made it 24-0 at halftime on a 33-yard touchdown pass from Ryan Hass to Spencer Stumpf.

Prairie made it 30-0 on its first possession on the second half on a 2-yard smash by Clark.

Kohl, who carried 18 times for 82 yards in the first half, got only one carry in the second half for four yards as Jelinek gave nine different runners a chance to show their stuff.

Linn-Mar's quarterbacks completed 3 of 14 passes for 11 yards. Tailback Andy Zeal carried 15 times for 49 yards to account for most of the Lions' offense.

West celebrates homecoming with rout

IOWA CITY — Rich Thompson is back where he belongs — cracking pads with his Iowa City West football teammates Friday nights.

That sure beats the heck out of standing on the sidelines with a helpless feeling like he did for three games after breaking his hand in the season opener against Waterloo West.

In his second game back in the lineup, Thompson made his presence felt Friday in West's 62-13 victory over Waterloo East on homecoming at Trojan Field.

The senior defensive end/fullback made countless tackles and even found the end zone on his only carry — a 5-yard run in the third quarter.

"It was very hard," Thompson said of missing three games. "There was no air. I couldn't focus at all during the game."

"This feels great (being back). I can't really explain how it feels missing those games and being able to come

back and play now."

West Coach Dan Dvorak can help.

"Richie is a great football player," Dvorak said of his captain. "You look at what he does on defense. He's a great athlete. He's able to play the run tough, he's able to chase the quarterback down. He makes plays all night."

West never was threatened, using a blocked punt, an interception return for a touchdown, a kickoff return for a score and a typical performance by senior all-state tailback Greg Coleman.

Winning its third straight, West improved to 4-2, continued its quest for the playoffs and handed East (0-5) its 24th loss in a row. East, which is coached by former West assistant LeShane Saddler, fell behind 28-0 before getting on the scoreboard.

"We're starting to trust each

other a little more," Thompson said. "We believe in each other, knowing that each man is going to get the job done."

Coleman rushed for 197 yards on 21 carries and scored touchdowns on runs of 3, 5, 24 and 1 yards — the first score set up by Tony Teel's blocked punt after West stopped East on the game's opening possession. Coleman has 1,012 yards this season.

West defensive back Weston Hodge accounted for the game's third touchdown, returning an interception 40 yards for a score. Hodge has had an interception each of the last three games.

Ashton Winchel got into the act with a big play, returning the second half kickoff 94 yards for a touchdown to extend West's lead to 42-13.
