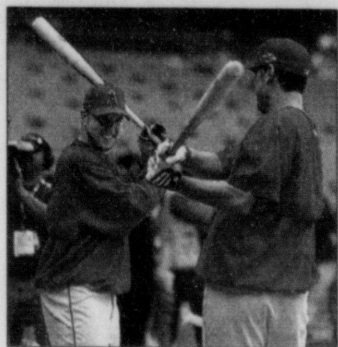

Puckett charged in alleged sexual assault

■ MINNEAPOLIS — Baseball Hall of Famer Kirby Puckett was charged Friday with dragging a woman into a restaurant bathroom last month and grabbing her breast, according to the criminal complaint, which cited several witnesses.

The former Minnesota Twins star was charged with a felony count of false imprisonment and a gross misdemeanor count of criminal sexual conduct.

If convicted, the 41-year-old Puckett probably would be put on probation and given less than a year in the county workhouse, according to County Attorney Amy Klobuchar.

Ex-Hawkeye Rucker dunks Lakers to win

■ ANAHEIM, Calif. — Guy Rucker's dunk with 27.4 seconds remaining lifted the Los Angeles Lakers to a 91-89 comeback victory over the Golden State Warriors in an exhibition game late Thursday night.

Rucker, a former University of Iowa player, finished with six points, six rebounds and a blocked shot in 12 minutes. Kobe Bryant led the Lakers with 22 points and Derek Fisher added 15.

NBA fines Mavs, suspends Nelsons

■ DALLAS — Mavericks Coach Don Nelson and assistant Donnie Nelson were suspended for the season's first two games by the NBA, which also fined the team \$150,000 Friday for contact with players who were ineligible for the draft.

The Nelsons — Don is Donnie's father — went to two private workouts in June in Yugoslavia.

It was the ninth time the Mavericks have been fined — for a total of \$1,155,000 — since January 2000, when Mark Cuban bought the team.

Cuban said the coaches were only observing players, not supervising their workouts.

Team spokesman Gregg Elkin said assistant Del Harris probably will coach the first two games, Oct. 30 at Memphis, and Nov. 2 against visiting Phoenix.

Kennedy upholds pride

MARION — An outsider might observe that there have been cat fights in the back alleys of the greater Metro area this fall that had more at stake than Friday night's little skirmish between the Kennedy Cougars and Linn-Mar Lions at Linn-Mar's Armstrong Field.

But don't begin to suggest to Kennedy Coach Tim Lewis

and the rest of the Cougars the game between the two Mississippi Valley Conference also-rans was meaningless.

"We talked all week long about how this is a game for pride," Lewis said after watching his Cougars score the winning touchdown with just over 5 minutes left to pull out a 15-14 win over the host Lions.

"I'm not a big believer in the theory that there are games where you don't have anything to lose," he said. "In every game you're involved in, there's always something to lose."

Both of these teams have endured their share of losing this season. Kennedy used its second win in three weeks to improve to 2-5 while Linn-Mar dropped its sixth straight to fade to 1-6.

The Cougars, who have struggled offensively all season, had things working nicely Friday night.

Junior quarterback Mark Paterson completed a career-high 14-of-25 passes for 176 yards and two touchdowns, including a 5-yard touchdown pass to John Hook with 5:07 left in the game that proved to be the game-winner.

"I haven't been throwing that good lately but my arm felt good all week," said Paterson, who inherited the quarterback duties when senior Derek Thoma was injured in Kennedy's second game and lost for the season.

"I threw a couple of bad passes tonight but I was able to get one to Hook when we really needed it."

It was Paterson's second touchdown pass of the night. He connected with Ben

Ethier from 5 yards out for the Cougars' first touchdown with 38 seconds left in the first half.

Ethier, a 6-foot-3, 215-pound senior tight end, finished with four receptions for 70

yards.

The Cougars also totaled 188 yards on the ground with junior Blake Fisher accounting for 102 on 22 carries.

Defensively, Kennedy did just enough to keep Linn-Mar

out of the end zone all but twice — a 48-yard run from Chris Janda in the first quarter and a 1-yard sneak from quarterback Clark Anderson in the second period.

team's first-half performance Friday against Cedar Rapids Xavier.

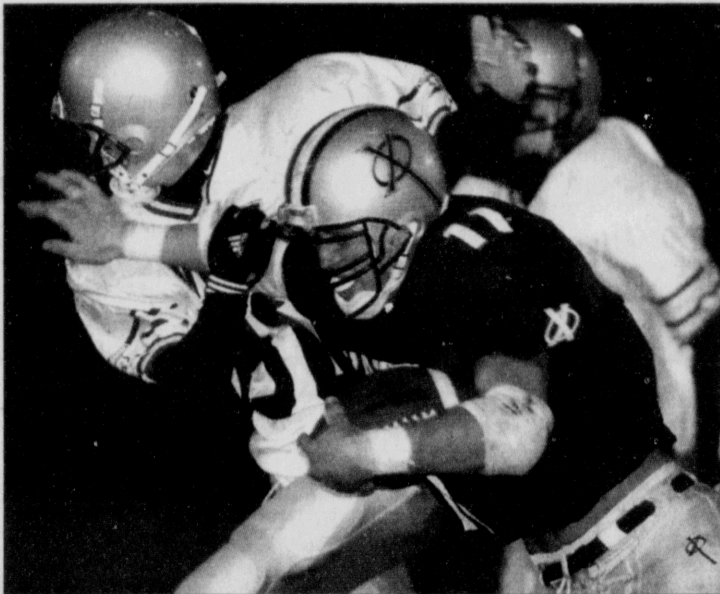
"The first half, we were out-coached," said Dvorak, West's head coach. "We were out-coached, we

Celtics, Timberwolves descend on C.R.

All-Star Garnett to treat preseason tilt like a regular game

Minnesota Timberwolves star Kevin Garnett has a message for those attending to night's NBA exhibition game at the U.S. Cellular Center.

"I approach a preseason game like a regular game," he said on NBA.com after Tuesday's 127-101 victory over the Chicago Bulls. "I don't see anything different in these games and regular season games, except they don't count. Fans pay

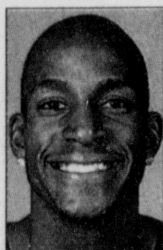
money to come see these games and you want to give the effort.

"You want to play hard."

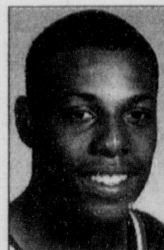
Garnett will be one of three 2002 All-Stars present tonight at 7 when the Timberwolves take on the Boston Celtics, with Paul Pierce and Antoine Walker. Garnett, a 6-foot-11 forward, averaged 21.2 points and 12.1 rebounds last year as Minnesota went 50-32.

The Timberwolves also feature 6-7 Wally Szczerbiak, who averaged 18.7 points last year. Szczerbiak, however, has been sidelined by injuries and his status is unknown.

Pierce, from Kansas, averaged 26.1 points and 6.9 rebounds last year. He and Walk-

er, who averaged 22.1 points and 8.8 rebounds, carried the Celtics to last season's Eastern Conference finals.

The Timberwolves are working on a new offense, trying to figure out where players fit in.

"I've been saying all year, I'm just playing players and I'm not putting a (position) number on anyone," Timberwolves Coach Flip Saunders said on NBA.com. "You'll see us go to our motion-type offense out of set plays, which makes it difficult for people to lock in on you."

"The offense is a learning process every single day, in order to get familiar with it."

Despite a 3-0 start in the preseason (before Friday's game at Indiana), Garnett said the new offense "is a pain in the butt."

"It's a very detailed offense," he said. "You give everyone freedom. Not just me — every-

Quarterback Aaron Vincent and receiver Jordan Bontrager hooked up on a pair of touchdown passes, covering 10 and 41 yards, which gave the Trojans a 28-21 lead with eight minutes remaining.

"We showed heart and we showed that we can handle adversity," said Vincent, who completed 8 of 12 passes for 132 yards. "We're going to take that to the next step and try to win our game next week."

West extended its winning streak to four games and took another step toward its first playoff berth since 1999. The Trojans (5-2) play at Kennedy Thursday before concluding the regular season at home Nov. 1 against Jefferson.

Vincent's first scoring pass to Bontrager capped a 15-play, 98-yard drive on the opening possession of the second half. On the drive, Vincent completed 5 of 5 passes for 70 yards, two going to tight end Eric Smith for 36 yards.

"We showed them that up front we could handle them, and that kept us going the rest of the game," Vincent said.

Xavier (3-4) still led 21-20, thanks to a blocked extra point.

But the Saints gave up the lead after gambling and losing in the fourth quarter. Xavier tried to pick up a first down on fourth-and-two from its own 38-yard line, but quarterback Mike Sayre was stopped short. "That was sure a big stop, I know that," Dvorak said.

West's capitalized, as Vincent found Bontrager for a second scoring pass. Vincent then completed the two-point conversion pass to Luke Kerr for a 28-21 lead.

West senior Rich Thompson completed the scoring with a one-yard run. The touchdown was set up when he recovered a Sayre fumble at the Xavier 23.

Greg Coleman, the MVC's leading rusher, was his normal productive self with 181 yards on 24 carries, highlighted by a 66-yard touchdown run in the second quarter. The junior tailback has gained 1,186 yards this season.

But Coleman didn't have game-high rushing honors. Xavier senior Jason Sweet gained 205 yards on 30 carries.

The first half was full of offensive fireworks and concluded with Xavier on top, 21-14.

The Saints, using primarily an option attack, moved the ball at will, running over and through the Trojans for 275 yards on 32 carries. That's not too shabby for a team that entered the game averaging 150 yards on the ground.

Sweet did the most damage, gaining 155 yards on 19 attempts, including a 16-yard scoring run in the second quarter. Sayre added 66 yards on nine carries, including a 1-yard touchdown on the game's first possession. Matt St. Andrews gave the Saints the halftime lead, scoring on a 13-yard run with 43 seconds remaining.

Anderson completed only 6-of-24 passes for 71 yards and was intercepted once by Kennedy's Jake Settle. Most of his passes seemed headed the direction of 5-10 senior defensive back Derek Hinkle, who draped himself over and around the taller Linn-Mar receivers.

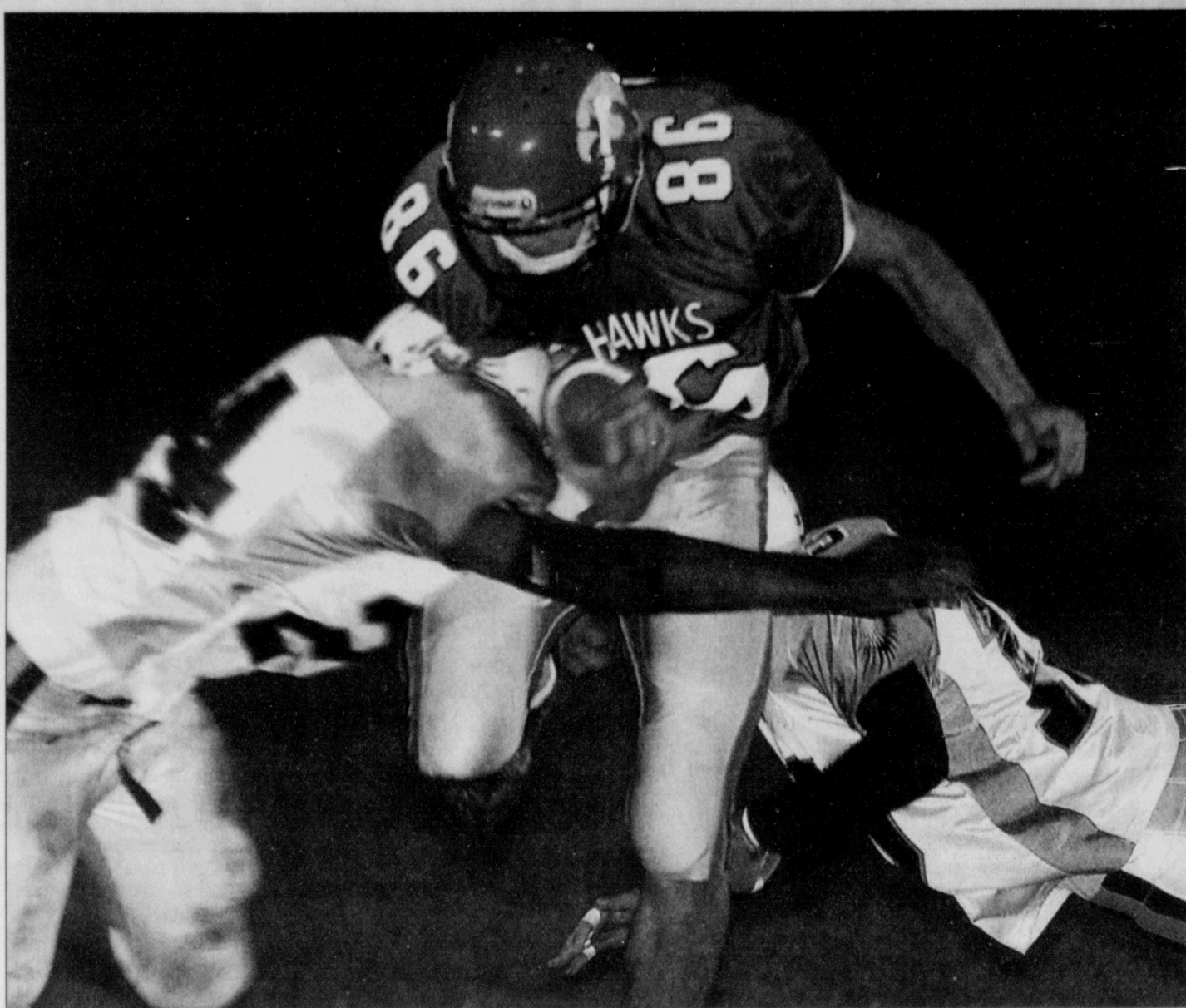
"I just stuck to my technique and got to them the best I could," Hinkle said.

The Lions rolled up 230 yards on the ground. Andy Zeal carried 25 times for 117 yards and Janda added 107 yards on seven carries, thanks to a two runs of 48 and 40 yards.

Kennedy took a 3-0 lead in the first period on a 20-yard field goal from Settle. The teams traded the lead the rest of game, with Linn-Mar going ahead, 7-3, on Janda's 48-yard run, Kennedy taking it back at 9-7 on Ethier's touchdown reception, and Linn-Mar wresting control before halftime at 14-9 on Anderson's sneak.

Kennedy hosts Iowa City West at Kingston Stadium Thursday night and Linn-Mar is at Waterloo West next Friday night.

Little Hawks survive

Defense comes up big, keeps playoff hopes alive

IOWA CITY — Iowa City High kept its slim playoff hopes alive, thanks in large part to an opportunistic defense.

The Little Hawks forced three turnovers in its defensive red zone to preserve a City High 27-20 victory over Cedar Rapids Jefferson Friday night at Bates Field.

"We practice for situations like that and we made the plays when we needed them," said City High senior linebacker Justin Jordan. "Our defense bent a few times, but we didn't break when it mattered the most."

Jefferson (3-4) controlled most of the second and third quarters. The J-Hawks outgained the Little Hawks (4-3), 153-51, during that period, but

Jefferson's only points during that stretch was 2-yard run by Ashton Northern, who had 129 yards on 25 carries.

On three other occasions, Jefferson had the ball inside City High's 20, but Cody Lakose threw two interceptions and Northern was guilty of a fumble. Jordan pounced on Northern's fumble at the City High 5 with 55 seconds left in the third quarter with the Little Hawks leading, 14-12.

"We were definitely on our heels," Jordan said. "Someone on the defensive line hit him square on the arm and the ball popped straight up in the air. There was no one that was going to beat me to the ball."

The Little Hawks, who didn't convert points on either interception, made the J-Hawks pay for this miscue. Tailback Phil Kenney, making his first start of the year, rambed 86 yards on the very next play, getting the ball down to the Jefferson 9. Two plays later, Jordan capped the

drive with his first touchdown run of the year, a 1-yard plunge.

Kennedy ran for 113 yards on eight carries for the Little Hawks, becoming the first City High running back to go over the 100-yard mark this season.

"I've been playing mostly defense the last four weeks," Kennedy said. "On Wednesday, the coaches moved me over to offense."

"When we took the ball over there, I knew that we needed a big play. The offensive line opened a nice hole and I saw a lane to cutback. There was no one there until I was deep downfield. I thought for sure that I was going to score on that run."

Jefferson cut City High's lead to 27-20 on a 5-yard touchdown pass to Jeff Foster from Lakose with 1:46 left. The J-Hawks playoff hopes

were ended when the Little Hawks' Pat Berry recovered the onside kickoff attempt.

Foster had a huge game for Jefferson with 10 receptions for 156 yards and two scores. He got the scoring started with a 10-yard scoring strike 4:37 into the game.

Linebacker Joel Barnes returned to the City High lineup after missing the first six games of the year. Barnes made his present felt as the senior was in on 14 tackles.

"We had JB back in the lineup tonight," Jordan said. "He played a great game and he made our defense tougher."

City High will attempt to keep its playoff hopes alive next Friday when the Little Hawks host No. 2-rated Cedar Rapids Washington. Cedar Rapids Jefferson, which still has a shot at a winning record, will host Dubuque Senior.

Arrington sets tone for Warriors in blowout

Junior contributes with interception, 2 touchdowns

CEDAR RAPIDS — Adrian Arrington said it all without uttering a word.

After Cedar Rapids Washington's 55-0 dismantling of Dubuque Senior Friday at Kingston Stadium, Arrington arrived in front of the television camera relaxed, smiling and munching on a stack of cookies. He looked like a child on Halloween, as did the rest of the Warriors in the wake of the blowout victory.

Though he was hardly the star of the game, Arrington certainly did his part, contributing a 47-yard touchdown run, a 20-yard TD catch and an interception. And each time the junior touched the ball against

the outmanned Rams, the same thought ran through his mind.

"End zone," Arrington said. "All I think about is the end zone."

Arrington's merciless attitude was appropriate in a contest where the mercy rule had to be invoked with 3:23 remaining in the game. Already leading 49-0, Warriors Coach Paul James opted for an early conclusion when he had reserve quarterback Blaine Stephenson throw deep to Andy Timmons.

Timmons' 41-yard touchdown reception was the final play of the game.

"There wasn't intent to do anything other than execute," James said. "All 40 players that got in the game did a real good job of executing."

Tailback Poul Collins, who went over 1,000 rushing yards for the season Friday, was the offensive standout for the Warriors. He finished the game

with 208 yards and two TDs on 10 carries.

Warren Suess contributed by completing 7 of 11 passes for 112 yards and two scores.

But quite a few Warriors deserved credit. Washington's offense rolled up a total of 544 yards, and the defense held the Rams to just 133 yards. The rushing defense was particularly tight, as Dubuque Senior could manage only 38 yards on 29 attempts.

Washington improved to 7-0. In their two remaining games, the Warriors travel to Iowa City High and close the regular season at home against Dubuque Wahlert.

But the Warriors did not allow themselves to look past the Rams. From the opening kickoff they dominated the con-

test, using big plays on both sides of the ball to build a 35-0 halftime lead.

"It's fun," center Rob Bruggeman said. "We just like to go out there and clock 'em."

The Rams could do nothing to stall Washington's industrial-strength offense in the first half. Though Washington had only five first downs to Dubuque Senior's six, that statistical oddity came about only because the Warriors scored so often and so quickly.

The Warriors had six possessions in the first two quarters and scored touchdowns on five of them. They also forced three turnovers.
