

Hawkeyes' Greiving leaves football team

■ IOWA CITY — A source close to the University of Iowa football program confirmed last night that running back Aaron Greiving has left the team, adding that team officials say the door remains open if he wants to return.

WOI-TV in Ames also reported Greiving's departure last night.

Greiving, a fourth-year junior from Ames, was slated to be the team's starter at the outset of the season but was slowed by a high-ankle sprain during two-a-days and a hip pointer. He missed three games.

Greiving has rushed 39 times for 120 yards, a 3.1-yard average.

Greiving filled in for an injured Laddell Betts in last December's Alamo Bowl and was named the Offensive Player of the Game.

Rodriguez, Bonds win Hank Aaron award

■ SAN FRANCISCO — Barry Bonds and Alex Rodriguez won the Hank Aaron award for the second straight year Thursday, with broadcasters voting them the best hitters in their leagues this season.

Bonds hit a major league-best .370 with 46 homers and 110 RBIs for the San Francisco Giants. He also set records with 198 walks and 68 intentional passes.

Rodriguez, the Texas Rangers shortstop, led the majors with 57 homers and 142 RBIs and batted .300.

Big-play Trojans blast C.R. Kennedy

CEDAR RAPIDS — It was economical football at it's best, and why not? On a miserable night in Eastern Iowa, why use 10 or 15 plays when one will do?

Iowa City West scored six touchdowns on plays of 37 yards or longer and buried Cedar Rapids Kennedy, 41-19, in front of a tiny gathering of fans

at cold, wet and windy Kingston Stadium Thursday night.

The Trojans' fifth straight Mississippi Valley Conference win upped their record to 6-2 and kept them in the hunt to snag their first playoff berth in three years. West wraps up the regular season next Friday night at home against

Cedar Rapids Jefferson.


"All we've talked about all year is getting better every week," West Coach Dan Dvorak said. "That hasn't changed at all. The way we look at it, we're 6-2 now and our goal next week is go out and improve to 7-2."

West seemed in control of this one from the outset, led by all-state running back Greg Coleman and an offense that showed immediately it could produce big plays almost on demand.

Coleman, who came in with an MVC-high 1,200 rushing yards, had touchdown runs of 46 and 53 yards and finished with 147 yards on 16 carries in three quarters of work.

"We wanted to come out and establish the line of scrimmage, and I think we did a good job of controlling things up front," Dvorak said.

Bonds, Kent help propel Giants to within a victory of title

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Teased and taunted for tiptoeing around Barry Bonds, the Anaheim Angels decided to challenge him.

Whack! Bonds lined an RBI double that sent the San Francisco Giants zooming to a big lead that not even these pesky Angels could overcome, winning 16-4 in Game 5 Thursday night to take a 3-2 lead in

the World Series.

Jeff Kent sealed it with a pair of two-run homers, starting the party in full force at Pac Bell Park and putting the Giants on the brink of their first World Series title since Willie Mays & Co. won it for New York in 1954.

Rich Aurilia's three-run homer in the eighth gave the Giants the most runs by a team in a Series game since

the New York Yankees walked Pittsburgh 16-3 in 1960. It was the 17th homer overall by the Angels and San Francisco, tying a Series record.

Once again, it took only one big swing by Bonds — Mays' godson — to swing the momentum in this Series. But, really, the Angels were caught in a lose-lose squeeze from the start.

They pitched to Bonds in

the first inning, and the Giants got three runs. They intentionally walked him in the second, and San Francisco scored three more.

Halloween was still a week away, but the big guy in orange and black had plenty of tricks and few treats for Anaheim.

Now, Russ Ortiz will try to clinch San Francisco's first crown when he starts Game 6

Saturday night at Edison Field against Kevin Appier. Both made early exits in Game 2, an 11-10 win by the Angels.

A sellout crowd of 42,713, tense when the Angels climbed back from a 6-0 deficit and brought the tying run to the plate in the middle innings, erupted when Kent

Steen continues walk-on pride parade

Three picks at Indiana earn senior Big Ten honors

IOWA CITY — Grant Steen was the tie-breaker. If you're keeping score, it's former walk-ons three, scholarship players two.

Steen's school-record three interceptions at Indiana made him the third consecutive former Hawkeye walk-on named the Big Ten's Player of the Week. Safety Derek Pagel and tight end Dallas Clark were honored the two previous weeks.

Iowa's other POWs — kicker


Nate Kaeding and quarterback Brad Banks — always have had scholarships.

Steen, Pagel and Clark have scholarships now. They've always played like they had one ... even if Mr. University wasn't checking them those big fat checks.

"If you come in here as a walk-on awestruck, you're going to fade fast," Steen said. "You can't think of it like that. I never really thought of myself as any less of a player. I had the same attitude that all the other guys on the team have."

A 6-3, 238-pound linebacker from Emmetsburg, Steen has seen walk-ons perish. They begin practice, get intimidated and lose interest. That was never an issue for him.

He's that typical football coach's son — a tough as nails, intelligent film hound.

"He's pretty hard-nosed and he's got a pretty high pain tolerance," said Tom Steen, his

father and the defensive coordinator at Emmetsburg. "He's pretty much always been that way. He never got a lot of sympathy from ol' Dad."


Steen wouldn't want it anyway. He didn't ask for hugs when he suffered a high ankle sprain his senior year in high school.

That high ankle sprain injured more than just his three-point stance — it took away most of Steen's hopes for a Division I scholarship.

So he came to Iowa without the tuition, training table and stipend.

He, like so many other walk-ons, just kept his head straight forward, his eyes
