Iowa City West scored six touchdowns on plays of 37 yards or longer and buried Cedar Rapids Kennedy, 41-19, in front of a tiny gathering of fans

The Trojans' fifth straight Mississippi Valley Conference win upped their record to 6-2 and kept them in the hunt to snag their first playoff berth in three years. West wraps up the regular season next Friday night at home against

Cedar Rapids Jefferson.

"All we've talked about all year is getting better every week," West Coach Dan Dvorak said. "That hasn't changed at all. The way we look at it, we're 6-2 now and our goal next week is go out and improve to 7-2."

West seemed in control of this one from the outset, led by all-state running back Greg Coleman and an offense that showed immediately it could produce big plays almost on demand.

Coleman, who came in with an MVC-high 1,200 rushing yards, had touchdown runs of 46 and 53 yards and finished with 147 yards on 16 carries in three quarters of work. 'We wanted to come out and estab-

up front," Dvorak said. ■ Turn to 2C: West





SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -Teased and taunted for tiptoeing around Barry Bonds, the Anaheim Angels decided to challenge him.

Whack!

Bonds lined an RBI double that sent the San Francisco Giants zooming to a big lead that not even these pesky Angels could overcome, winning 16-4 in Game 5 Thursday night to take a 3-2 lead in

the World Series.

Jeff Kent sealed it with a pair of two-run homers, starting the party in full force at Pac Bell Park and putting the Giants on the brink of their first World Series title since Willie Mays & Co. won it for New York in 1954.

Rich Aurilia's three-run homer in the eighth gave the Giants the most runs by a team in a Series game since



Mets' move leaves Piniella with few options

■ ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. Lou Piniella's options appeared to dwindle to two Thursday accept the Tampa Bay Devil Rays' offer or sit out the 2003

The Devil Rays offered Piniella a four-year, \$13 million deal earlier this week, but they would not comment on his status Thursday. Under orders from commissioner Bud Selig, the team is prohibited from making any announcements about its managerial search until the World Series ends.

Neither Piniella nor his agent, Alan Nero, returned telephone messages Thursday. Newsday reported that Piniella had agreed in principle with the Devil Rays. Signing the deal would give him a raise over the \$2.5 million he was scheduled to make during his final year with the Seattle Mariners next season.

Closer undergoes shoulder surgery

■ ST. LOUIS — St. Louis Cardinals closer Jason Isringhausen had surgery on his right shoulder Thursday that could limit his availability early next season.

Team doctor George Paletta said the operation was a "cleanup" of the shoulder. During the procedure, a small tear was discovered in the labrum, which lines the shoulder socket, but Paletta said the rotator cuff was sound.

Isringhausen had 32 saves and a 2.48 ERA for the NL Central champions. But down the stretch, he was unable to pitch on consecutive days and it took him longer to get loosened up in the bullpen.

Harrison suspended for hit on Rice

SAN DIEGO -San Diego Chargers safety Rodney Harrison was suspended without pay for one game by the NFL on Thursday for his third serious rules violation in the past 16 games, a helmet-to-helmet hit on Oakland's Jerry Rice last Sunday.

If the Chargers' planned appeal is denied, the Pro Bowler could lose \$111,764, which is one-17th of his base pay of \$1.9 million.

Harrison, who's been fined numerous times in his nineyear career, refused comment as he left the Chargers' complex after practice, but said he might talk later in the day.

Becker given probation in tax evasion trial

MUNICH, Germany Former tennis star Boris Becker was sentenced Thursday to two years of probation and fined \$300,000 for tax evasion.

Becker, accused of avoiding \$1.7 million in taxes, admitted he kept a residence in Germany 10 years ago while claiming to reside in the tax haven of

Monaco. Prosecutor Matthias Musiol had asked for a 3½-year jail sentence. Becker's lawyer, Joerg Weigell, asked for probation, saying Becker wasn't the one who gave false information about his finances. Weigell said Becker has paid \$3 million in back taxes, double the amount sought by investigators.
