West back in playoffs with rout of J-Hawks

IOWA CITY — Welcome back to the playoffs, Iowa City West.

Two seasons of sitting at home must have seemed like two lifetimes for the Trojans, who made six straight playoff appearances from 1994 to 1999. They won state titles in 1995, '98 and '99.

West punched its 2002 postseason ticket Friday evening with a 40-14 victory over Cedar Rapids Jefferson on Senior Night at Trojan

"Things just weren't right the last two years, but they're clicking now," said junior Greg Coleman. "(West) Coach (Dan) Dvorak, like (Iowa) Coach (Kirk) Ferentz, took time to build (the program) up, and now it's back."

The Trojans (7-2) will take a six-game winning streak into their Class 4A first-round playoff game at 7 p.m. Wednesday against an opponent to be determined. Pairings were announced late Friday after deadline.

Coleman was the star of the show Friday. The all-stater wrapped up the Mississippi Valley Conference rushing title, gaining 259 yards on 23 carries and scoring five touchdowns, which tied the single-game school record held by Carlos Honore (1994) and Chris Richardson (1998).

"That is all the offensive line," said Coleman, who finished the regular season with 1,684 yards on 208 carries and 19 touchdowns.

West, which has improved every week in Dvorak's opinion, has outscored its last six opponents by more than 21 points per game.

However, the Trojans were sleep-walking through a turnover-plagued first quarter and a half. They lost two fumbles and had an interception returned 70 yards for a touchdown by Araf Evans with 6:22 remaining in the first half, tying the game at 6.

West awoke from its slumber after Jefferson's

big defensive play.

On their next possession, the Trojans drove 60 From page 1C vards on eight plays, with Coleman scoring on 15-yard run with 3:06 remaining. Chris Sorrell's extra point gave West a 13-6 lead.

The Trojans scored again almost immediately. Senior fullback Rich Thompson did the honors from 2 yards out at the 1:32 mark. The touchdown, which gave West a 20-6 halftime lead, was set up by junior tight end Eric Smith's 33-yard reception.

"We knew we had to win the game to make the playoffs, and we weren't playing too well,' said West senior quarterback Aaron Vincent. "We knew we had to step it up because Jefferson has a great team. We stepped it up and won the game.'

Coleman made sure the Trojans weren't challenged in the second half, scoring on runs of 64, 30 and 8 yards. He gained 171 yards on 10 carries in the half.

"We just picked it up," Coleman said. "This team has grown up and it's learned how to play under pressure. We have to keep working hard. If we keep working hard, good things will

West's defense also stepped up, allowing only a 6-yard touchdown run by J-Hawk Ashton Northern with 3:34 remaining.

Northern, who needed 159 yards to reach the 1,000-yard plateau for the season, gained 82 yards on 19 carries.


