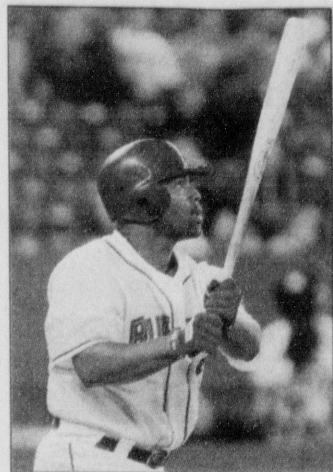

NCAA lifts Michigan's postseason ban

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — Michigan became the first school in five years to win an appeal with the NCAA on Thursday.

The Wolverines will be eligible for postseason play in 2004 after winning an appeal of a ban that resulted from a booster's payment to players. The decision to overturn the ban handed down in May was made by the NCAA's infractions appeals committee.

Michigan's successful appeal ends its seven-year saga involving former booster Ed Martin, who died this year.

Twin terrors

Iowa linebackers Abdul Hodge and Chad Greenway share a love of hitting

IOWA CITY — Abdul Hodge strolls down the hill to the Iowa practice facility wearing a skin-tight black tank top, dreadlocks to the base of his neck and a shiny gold necklace.

Chad Greenway scuffs along in a pair of flip-flops, blue jeans and a white "Nothing Runs Like a Deere" T-shirt.

But, really, it's the same guy, just different packages.

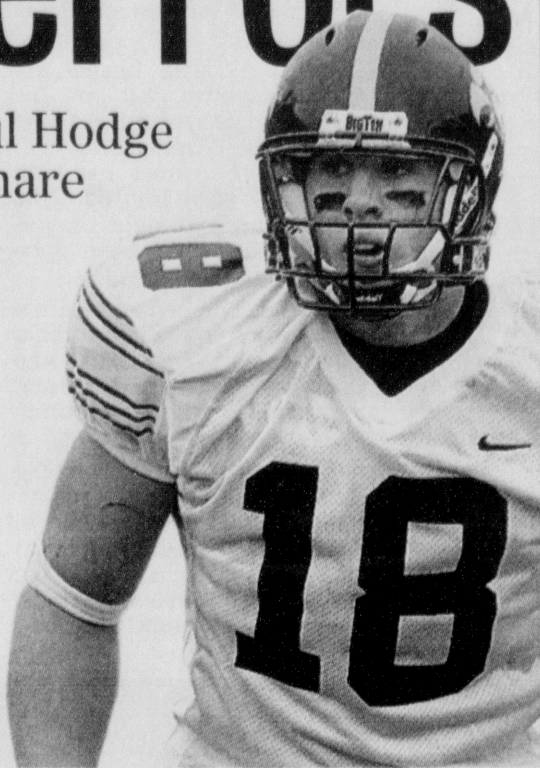
Greenway comes from Mount Vernon, S.D., population 400. Hodge was born in the Virgin Islands and grew up in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., population 152,000.

Greenway knows how to neuter a pig. Hodge doesn't.

"Yeah, people say that we're totally different. He's from way up there, I'm from way down south," Hodge said. "But we've got a lot of stuff in common, attitude-wise."

Off the field, Hodge and Greenway walk similar lines. The soft-spoken Hodge carries himself like he wouldn't hurt a gnat. As he put it, he's "calm, just smilin' and havin' fun." Greenway prefers the shadows, too.

They're communications majors, so they study together. They watch game film together.

They're linebackers, and that calm stuff goes out the window. They're more of the tackle-hoarding, ball-hawking kind. Those low-key guys know how to flip that crazy switch when they hit the field.

"I guess I get a little mean streak when I'm on the field maybe," Greenway said. "But I'm mild mannered off the field, and I just try to stay low-key. When I'm on the field, it's just something happens. I love the excitement and I love to hit. "Off the field, Abdul's probably even a little more low-key than I am. But on the field, something happens. It's competitive nature and stuff like that."

Whatever it is, it's working. The duo has posted eye-popping tackle numbers twice in a row.

Hodge wrapped up 15 tackles in games against Iowa State and Arizona State. Greenway two-upped him, with a pair of 17-tackle games, earning him co-Big Ten defensive player of the week honors.

That's 64 tackles from two guys — the type of numbers that will launch a couple of mild-mannered sophomores to the top of the Big Ten. Greenway's 12.8 tackles a game ranks him first in the conference. Hodge is third at 10.5 a game.

They say their tackle numbers have a lot less to do with them and a lot more to do with the guys in front of them. There's that similarity stuff again.

"The key is our defensive line keeping guys off us," Hodge said. "They're doing a good job. Me and Chad are just free to run around and make tackles and make plays."

"Any time you've got good defensive linemen like our front four, it makes it easier. Instead of going down and being turned over by those linemen, you're free to run around and just hit. It's fun."

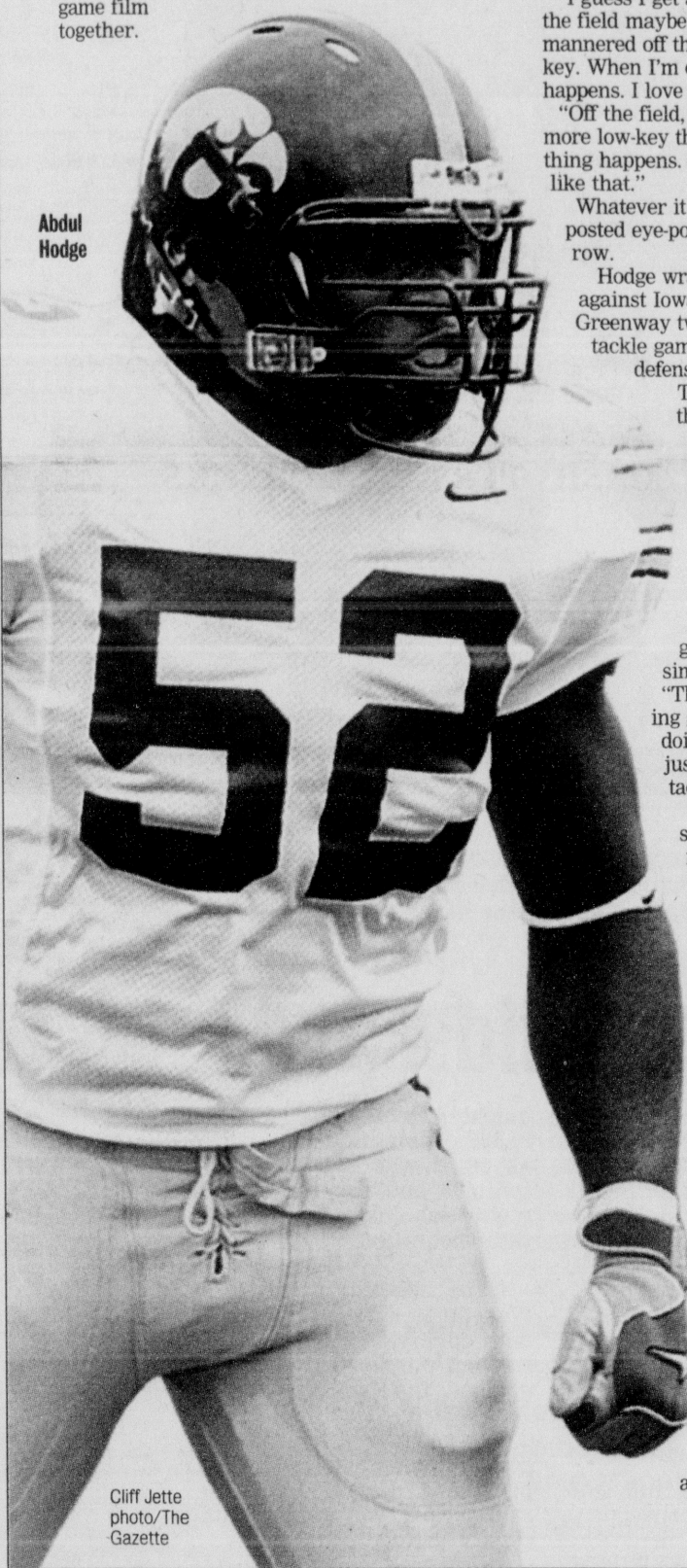
One of those defensive linemen, Jared Clauss, said the wild streak in Greenway and Hodge definitely sets the tone for Iowa's defense, which ranks third in the nation in scoring defense, giving up 8.2 points per game.

"Even though they're sophomores and I'm a senior, Abdul's the one that calls the plays and Chad's the one that makes the adjustments at the line. They're the leaders," Clauss said. "They're the guys that are making the calls out there. So, yeah, you look up to them."

They look to each other. Greenway and Hodge said their off-field chemistry helps them on the field.

"Instead of saying, 'You go here, I go here,' we can just look at each other," Hodge said. "Right

Reutzel kicks troubles away

Late field goal lets Prairie nip Kennedy

CEDAR RAPIDS — Adam Reutzel was struggling big-time with his responsibilities as Cedar Rapids Prairie's punter Thursday night.

In seven attempts, Reutzel had shanked a couple off the side of his foot and sent others straight into the stratosphere while averaging 25.9 yards a boot.

There was only one way for Reutzel to make amends, and he came through in flying colors.

Reutzel, a 5-foot-9, 175-pound junior, nailed a 36-yard field goal dead on with nine seconds left to lead Prairie past Cedar Rapids Kennedy, 24-21, in an ugly Mississippi Valley Conference contest played in front of a blanket-wrapped crowd on a crisp and cool early autumn evening at Kingston Stadium.

"Last week I missed a 40-yarder but I was only about three yards short," Reutzel

said. "I was confident. I felt like it was an extra-point."

The win was the first for Prairie (1-3) and left Kennedy (0-4) winless. Prairie Coach Craig Jelinek said it was a much-earned win for his young team.

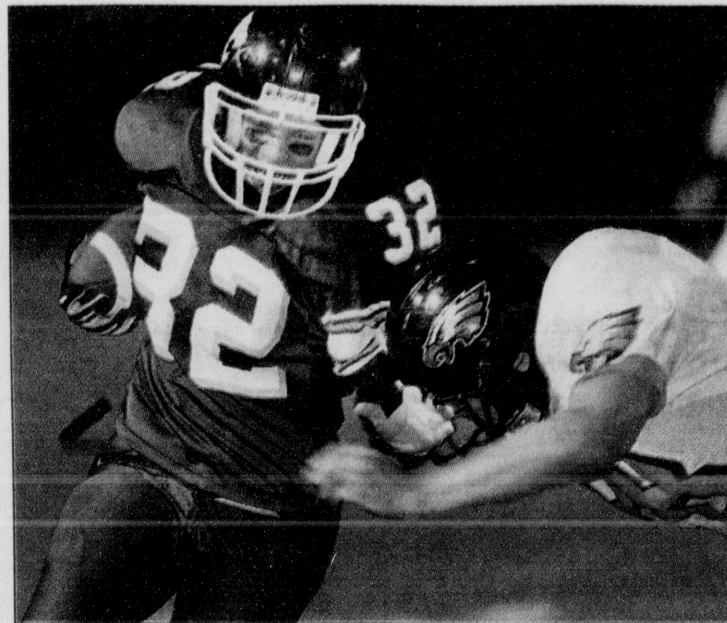
"I think there was a lot of pressure on the kids and they won it for themselves," he said. "We hung in there and the defense really came through in the second half."

Prairie trailed, 14-0, early in the game and 21-7 at halftime. But the Hawk defense forced five turnovers in the second half — six overall — and Prairie scored the game's final 17 points.

The turning point came midway through the third quarter with Kennedy facing a third-and-five on its 31. Cougar quarterback Mark Paterson dropped back to pass, and Prairie defensive back Glen Fox stepped in front of the throw and returned it 38 yards for a touchdown.

You could just feel the Prairie sideline inflate with newfound confidence.

Championship video pumps up West High

DUBUQUE — They dusted off their 1998 state championship video and watched it Thursday on their way to Dubuque.

Then the fourth-ranked Iowa City West football team made its best remake against Hempstead, cruising to a 31-6 victory in a Mississippi Valley Conference football game at Dalzell Field.

"We were watching the state championship 1998 highlight tape on the ride up here and we were just noticing

how much emotion they played with, especially on defense," said Alex Kanellis, a two-way West lineman who has committed to Iowa. "We were just like, 'Man, we have to come out and play with that much emotion. Have that much fun like they did.' I think we did a great job. everyone was so psyched."

West scored twice in the opening period, a 2-yard run by Ashton Winchel and a 28-yard pass play from Devin Dickel to Jordan Bontrager. Dickel connected with Eric

Springs, bluffs, habitat make Upper Iowa a favorite

DECORAH — The Upper Iowa River, with its exceptional combination of scenery, water quality and fish habitat, is the state's best river, in the estimation of Department of Natural Resources fisheries biologist Bill Kalishek, who took his post at the Decorah Hatchery to be

as close as possible to it.

While Kalishek appreciates the picturesque springs and bluffs in the Upper Iowa valley, his affinity for the river has more to do with its ability to support game fish.

Other Iowa streams boast equally good fish habitat, but they don't have as much of it, according to Kalishek, whose duties include managing the

Upper Iowa.

The Maquoketa, which Kalishek managed before taking the Decorah post in 1999, has world-class smallmouth bass habitat in the 4-mile catch-and-release zone below the Delhi dam and in a few other stretches.

The Turkey, which Kalishek also manages now, "comes the closest to rivaling

the Upper Iowa in terms of water quality and fish habitat," he said.

But the Upper Iowa has a nearly unbroken 70-mile

stretch with the rock, cobble and gravel stream bottom
