UI creates thorough throwback weekend

IOWA CITY — Somewhere, there's a 1939 kitchen sink that feels slighted.

The Iowa sports marketing folks found a place for everything else from the era in "Throwback Saturday's

Vintage referee uniforms. Old Gold helmets. Knickers for ballboys. Hats for fans. Banners above the arches. A throwback halftime show. Outfits for program vendors. Ragtime combos around the stadium.

Spawned on the plane ride home from January's Outback Bowl by equipment manager Greg Morris and director of football operations Bill Dervrich, the "Throwback Game" is almost nine months in the making.

"I was amazed at the old pictures the university had around that we were able to find the right stuff to wear,"

Morris said. "It's been a ball. It's a lot of work. It's something that I would enjoy doing again.'

Iowa got entrepreneurial to cover the costs of the game.

An entire uniform set helmet, jersey, pants — cost \$240 to produce, but Iowa sold them for \$500 apiece, Klatt said. They sold out in 13 days. The profit helped the Hawkeyes purchase throwback uniforms for Kent State. The Golden Flashes will wear their 1972 conference championship uniforms.

Iowa is selling most of the throwback items, which assistant athletics director Rick Klatt said should put the university in the black after this weekend.

'Right now I couldn't tell you if we're 10 bucks up or 10 bucks down," Klatt said. "But generally speaking, it's going to be a positive thing more than a negative, not to mention all the intangibles — the excitement, the national publicity, the fun that's being created."

"I kept waiting for them, waiting for them. I even slowed down a bit, but that's not the way I run my race. So I picked it back up and kept going. They never came."

West's girls and Cedar Rapids Kennedy's boys won with similar ease. scorers in the top seven and tallied 22 points. Kennedy was second with 59. Led by a 1-2-3 finish from Drew Craig, Ryan

Williamson and Adam Hairston, Kennedy took the boys' crown with 22 points. Prairie was second with 74. Craig and Hairston passed Cedar Rapids

Southwest Missouri State outlasts Drake

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (AP) — Cody Pratt rushed for 217 yards and two touchdowns Thursday night to lead Southwest Missouri State to a 31-26 victory over Drake.

Pratt's 4-yard run on the first play of the fourth quarter put Southwest Missouri (1-0) up 24-20, the Bears' first lead over Drake (0-1).

Southwest Missouri's defense stopped Drake on its following possession when Jovon Lewis intercepted Connor Jostes' pass and returned it 22 yards to Drake's 18 yard line.

After a 6-yard run by Pratt, quarterback A.J. Porter found Jay Steinbroner in the end zone for Southwest Missouri's second touchdown in 43 seconds to give the Bears a 31-20 lead.

Drake made it close when Jostes connected with Tyler Putnam for a 14-yard score with 4:03 remaining, making it 31-26 after the 2-point conversion failed.

Porter was 16 of 36 for 235 years, two touchdowns and two interceptions. Jostes (Iowa City High) was 26 of 41 for 234 yards, three touchdowns and two interceptions.


