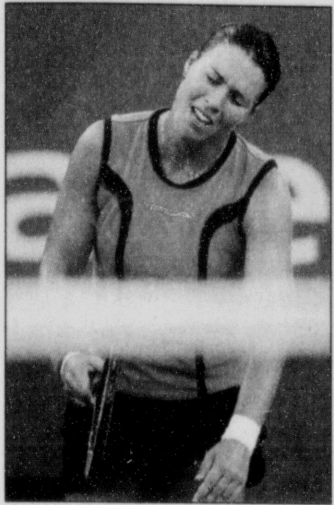

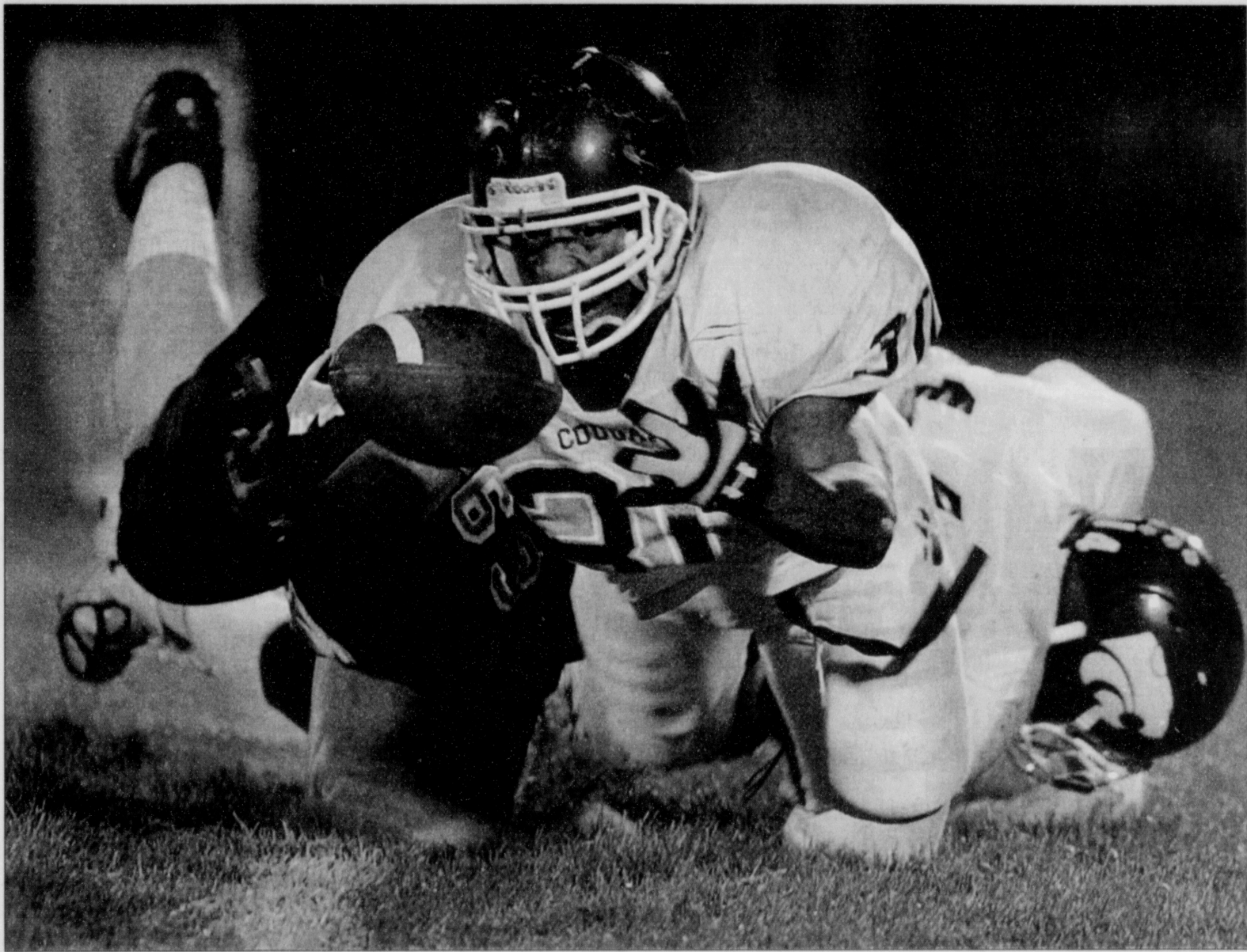

## Reutzel leads Prairie

## Senior's field goal wins OT marathon over Kennedy

CEDAR RAPIDS — Adam Reutzel has proven he can win football games with his churning legs. He can also win them with his right foot.

Reutzel split the uprights on a 21-yard field goal attempt on third down of the first overtime to lead Cedar Rapids Prairie past Cedar Rapids Kennedy, 23-20, in a

three-hour marathon that ended just before 11 p.m. played in front of a capacity crowd on a beautiful evening at Prairie's John Wall Field.

Reutzel had missed an extra point and a 44-yard field goal in regulation, but made amends in the extra session.

Kennedy had possession of the ball first in overtime, but Prairie's Matt Musil picked off a Tyler Thompson pass to give the Hawks the ball and their shot at glory.

The Hawks improved to 2-0, and the Cougars dipped to 1-1.

Prairie led by 14 at half-time before Kennedy came back on the arm of quarterback Thompson. A 6-5 senior, Thompson threw touchdown passes of 5 and 24 yards to Ben Lamaak and 58 to Nick Baker to knot the score at 20 with 4:32 left in the game.

It wasn't quite enough.

The Hawks won with an offense that featured Reutzel — he rushed for 182 yards on 35 carries — and a defense that produced 13 tackles for loss for 44 yards.

Thompson completed 15 of 28 passes for 261 yards and the three second half TDs.

Kennedy was often its own worst enemy. It got whistled for nine penalties, 65 yards, including two 15-yards that kept Prairie scoring drives alive in regulation.

Prairie led at halftime, 14-0, thanks to Reutzel's 35-yard touchdown run in the first quarter and a 21-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Joe Cooper to wide receiver Glen Fox in the second quarter.

But the story of the first two quarters was the Hawk defense, led by Bryan Fiala and Zach Covington.

Kennedy went into the

locker room at halftime with 84 total yards, including only 21 on the ground. The Prairie defense sacked Kennedy quarterback Tyler Thompson four times for minus-15 yards and recorded five other tackles for loss for another minus-13 yards.

Fiala and Covington had a hand in six of those nine plays that resulted in negative yardage for the befuddled Kennedy offense.

Meier was limited to 41 yards on nine carries and was knocked for a losses twice.

## Warriors top J-Hawks in golden anniversary meeting

CEDAR RAPIDS — Cedar Rapids Washington showed off a brand new kind of defense last night at Kingston Stadium.

You've heard of the bend-but-don't-break defense. But you've probably never heard of the bend-and-break defense.

It goes like this. You allow the opposing team to travel up and down the field quite a bit, then take the football away from them before they get to the end zone.

Washington employed that "strategy" a ton in its 50th meeting with

rival Cedar Rapids Jefferson, forcing four telltale turnovers that helped give it to a 36-7 victory.

"It was nice to see guys step up," said Washington Coach Paul James. "When you thought that maybe we were struggling a little bit defensively, we had people step up."

For an example of how things went last night, check out the first-half statistics.

The J-Hawks outgained the Warriors by about 30 yards. They owned the time of possession by about a two-to-one margin and limited Washington to seven second-quarter plays.

## Iowa alum donates \$5 million to Kinnick renovation plan

## Gift matches largest ever for Hawkeye athletics

IOWA CITY — The Bill and Nancy Krause family matched the largest gift in University of Iowa athletics history and took a big chunk out of the capital drive for the Kinnick Stadium renovation, Iowa Athletics Director Bob Bowlsby announced Friday at the Athletics Hall of

Fame.

The Krauses' \$5 million gift represents half of the initial \$10 million goal for the capital campaign. The donation equals a 2002 gift from Russell and Ann Gerdin of North Liberty, much of which went to the Gerdin Athletic Learning Center.

"This gift is an enormous step forward for us, in terms of keeping the quality of the stadium project and in making sure that we fund it in a way that keeps Iowa football accessible," Bowlsby said.

The Kinnick renovation

project will cost about \$87 million — funded through private gifts, luxury suites, club seating, increased advertising and concession revenue. All funding will come from non-public sources. The stadium is slated to be completed in time for the 2006 football season.

The Iowa Board of Regents asked Iowa to obtain 80 per-

cent commitments for the suites and club seats by Sept. 1. Iowa Associate Athletics Director Mark Jennings said Iowa has 100 percent commitment for the luxury suites and outdoor club seats and almost 100 percent commitment for the indoor club seats.

"It's going very well," Jennings said. "This was the other piece that we needed to get done, to get started on the capital campaign. Our goal was \$10 million. We want to raise \$15 million. This obviously gets us a long way

toward that goal."

Iowa has received a few smaller gifts toward that capital goal, Jennings said, and some more major gifts are in the works.

None, though, is slated to be big as the Krauses' gift.

With the \$5 million donation, the Krauses could have the plaza/stadium entrance named after them. No naming rights were announced Friday, but something will be announced later, Jennings said.

# Tigers edge West

No. 3 Trojans can't punch in decisive score late in fourth

IOWA CITY — Schuyler Paxton just did what he has been taught in practice, and he made one of a handful of big plays by the Cedar Falls defense in an 18-13 high school football victory over Iowa City West last night at Trojan Field.

With the Class 4A third-ranked Trojans knocking on the Tigers' goal line late in the fourth quarter, fullback Alex Kanellis tried to score a touchdown, but Paxton, a senior free safety, ripped the ball out of his hands to keep Cedar Falls ahead 18-6 with 4 minutes, 32 seconds left. The 10th-ranked Tigers took over possession at their own 5-yard line.

"The line held him up and he left the ball out there. I had to take it," Paxton said. "We work in practice on stripping the ball. Our defensive backs coach told us we had to step up and make plays, and we definitely did."

It was a Mississippi Valley Conference game of fourth-quarter frustration for the Trojans.

West (1-1), however, made things interesting in the final minute. Kanellis scored a 1-yard run on fourth down with 56 seconds left. The Trojans started the drive at the Tigers' 17 after a blocked punt.

West's Zack Topping then recovered the onside kick at the Tiger 42 with 53 seconds left.

But an intentional grounding penalty, two incompletions and an interception by linebacker Regis Baskerville off a Marcus Ahrens pass sealed the victory.

Tiger defensive back Nate Curran also intercepted an Ahrens pass at the goal line on a 4th-and-14 play with nine minutes left.

"We definitely had our opportunities. It is frustrating," West Coach Dan Dvorak said. "We have to learn from this and be a better football team."

The Trojan offense sputtered for most of the night, with Kanellis, a University of Iowa recruit, its only weapon. The 255-pound senior gained 123 yards on 24 carries. The rest of the team racked up only 79 yards.

"Teams know Alex will run the football for us," Dvorak said. "We're looking to become more diversified and

find the right combinations."

If the secret wasn't out already about Taylor Brookins, it sure is after his performance against West.

The Cedar Falls junior is a talented tailback who will give Mississippi Valley Conference teams big problems this season.

Brookins, who didn't carry the ball in 2003, rushed for 138 yards on 26 carries and scored one touchdowns. In the opener against Dubuque Hempstead, Brookins had 224 yards and four touchdowns.

Brookins got dinged up in the second quarter, but he returned after missing five Tiger offensive plays and had

a momentum-swinging 31-yard TD run with 38 seconds left in the first half. Cedar Falls (2-0) took an 18-6 lead into halftime.

"I thought (Brookins) was good. He was gutty coming back after he got dinged there. He had a sore back," Cedar Falls Coach Pat Mitchell said.

Brookins' run wasn't the Tigers' only big play in the opening half.

With West leading 6-3, quarterback Ben Curran hooked up with Schuyler Oordt, who was streaking down the left sideline, on a 45-yard TD toss on 3rd-and-25 with 5:45 remaining in the

first half.

West (1-1) had the Cedar Falls punt return team to thank for its only touchdown in the first half.

The Tigers were flagged for illegal participation and roughing the kicker on two separate punts, which extended the Trojans' drive.

West made Cedar Falls pay on Ahrens' 3-yard TD sneak with 10:46 minutes left in the second quarter. On the 17-play drive, the Trojans gained 43 yards and Cedar Falls had 33 yards in penalties.

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# C.R. Xavier aerial show too much for Lions

CEDAR RAPIDS — One thought ran through Tommy Breitbach's mind after he dropped a sure touchdown pass in the first quarter last night.

"I was kicking myself for that," Breitbach said. "I wouldn't let it happen again. I just wanted another chance."

He got a second chance. And a third.

Breitbach set two school

game at Saints Field.

Breitbach set his first school record when he caught a 75-yard touchdown from Scott Schemmel on a halfback option pass in the third quarter, giving the Saints a 13-12 lead. He set the other mark when he scored on a 75-yard punt return in the fourth period for a 20-12 advantage.

They were the longest reception for a touchdown and the longest punt return for a touchdown since Xavier opened for business in 1998.

The Saints (1-1) were clinging to a 14-12 lead when Breitbach juggled a punt at his own 25 and held on. He scooted toward the far sideline, picked up terrific blocks, slipped a tackle and sprinted into the end zone.

"I just have to give it up to the blockers, there was just a wall there," he said. "There was open grass."

Linn-Mar (1-1) scored on its second play from scrimmage on a 77-yard run by Jeremy Tipton, and it looked like the Lions might be on their way to matching their 52-point outburst against Dubuque Senior a week ago.

Breitbach, a senior receiver, broke loose behind Linn-Mar's defensive backs on Xavier's second play from scrimmage in the first period,

but he dropped Dane Gilmour's perfectly thrown ball for six points.

He shook it off and had a game to remember.

Last week, Schemmel set a school record with a 76-yard run for a touchdown against Kennedy. Last night, he was on the throwing end of the 75-yard touchdown to Breitbach after taking a pitch from Gilmour.

That gives Schemmel two school marks in two weeks himself.

"It's not me that's doing it all," said Schemmel, a junior flanker who's also the backup quarterback. "Tommy got wide open on that pass. And last week I had great blocking."

Jon Geppert lugged the ball 29 times for 166 yards and two touchdowns for the Saints, who bounced back from their 21-6 loss to Kennedy in the opener.

Linn-Mar quarterback Blake Zundel pulled the Lions within 21-19 with 2:56 left in the game on a 19-yard touchdown pass to Blair Harris, capping a frantic 96-yard drive from their own 4-yard line.

Linn-Mar tried an on-side kick and failed, giving Xavier the ball at mid-field with a chance to run out the clock. The Saints did better than that.

Geppert took a pitch from Gilmour at the 17-yard line, made a sharp cut, bounced off a tackler and scored for a 27-19 lead with 1:11 left. Taylor Lynch kicked his fourth straight PAT for the final margin.

Offensively, Prairie much of the same thing it did in its season-opening win over Cedar Rapids Washington with Reutzel doing most of the heavy lifting.

For the second straight game, the 5-10, 175-pounder topped the 100-yard rushing mark in the first half, last night with 120 yards on 17 carries.

His 35-yard TD run at the 5:12 mark of the first quarter capped a five-play, 68-yard drive and showcased the offensive line as Reutzel followed a wall of blockers down the right side of the field.

The Hawks got a lot of help from the Cougars on their second touchdown. Kennedy had forced Prairie to punt from the 50, but the Cougars were assessed a 15-yard ille-

gal substitution penalty that gave the Hawks a first down on the Kennedy 35.

Three plays later Cooper hooked up with Fox on a pass that was tipped twice by Kennedy defenders before Fox pulled it in for a TD with 6:40 left in the marathon first half.

Prairie had 160 yards of total offense at the break.

Kennedy was penalized six times for 40 yards in the first half alone.

Prairie's lone second half touchdown came on an 8-yard run by Reutzel in the third quarter.

Both teams have difficult road tests next Friday night: Kennedy is at Cedar Falls and Prairie travels to Iowa City West.

And Jefferson still trailed at halftime, 28-7.

"I'm very disappointed because we have a better football team than this," said Jefferson Coach Jim Womochil.

"We've got to learn how to win. When we have bad things happen to us, we need to be able to overcome that."

Washington scored first on a Travis Rhone 22-yard run with 5:39 left in the first quarter. Jefferson came right back and looked to have the potential tying touchdown when J-Hawk receiver Matt Byers broke free on a long pass play.

But Washington defensive back Paki O'Meara sprinted out of what appeared to be nowhere, hit Byers from behind about a yard from the end zone and forced a fumble that Washington recovered. The Warriors (1-1) then scored on the ensuing possession on a 62-yard screen play from quarterback Will Suess to Rhone.

Jefferson came right back and scored on a Ben Crosby 4-yard run with 4:53 left in the second quarter that made it a 14-7 game. The J-Hawks

then recovered an "accidental" on-side kick at the Warrior 35.

But with momentum squarely with the west side, Washington linebacker Patrick Hidder intercepted a Josh Faaborg pass over the middle intended for tight end Bryant Kucera, broke a couple of tackles, got a couple of blocks and rambled 70 yards for a touchdown that gave the Warriors a 21-7 lead.

"I ACTUALLY misread the play call from the sidelines," admitted Hidder, who relays the defense his coaches want to his teammates in the huddle. "I think if he would have caught that ball, he would have been in the end zone. So I got a little lucky I was able to step in front there and intercept that. The coaches definitely would have been on me."

Jefferson (0-2) drove to the Washington 34 on the ensuing possession, but Faaborg was creamed from behind on a sack from blitzing cornerback Stacey Walker and fumbled, with Washington lineman Nick Lenzen picking it up and running it down to the Jefferson 13. Suess then hit back Randy Freno with a

13-yard TD pass on the next play, making it a 28-7 game with 15.8 seconds left in the half.

Like we said, bend and break.

"Last week, Prairie kind of shoved it down our throats a little bit," Hidder said. "But this week, we really stepped up on defense."

"We stressed to them all week about that old adage about getting better from week one to week two," James said. "We were pleased with them that we felt we showed improvement last week from half one to half two. We just needed to continue that."

Washington scored the only points of the second half in the third quarter on a 54-yard pass-and-run play from Suess to O'Meara and on a safety when Jefferson snapped a ball from punt formation deep in its territory out of the end zone.

Junior QB Suess completed all five of his passes for Washington for 161 yards and three touchdowns. Rhone had 15 rushes for 87 yards. Washington had no turnovers.

"We've got some great athletes and they make great plays," said Suess.
