The Saints will move into a hotel in San Antonio, Texas, this weekend in preparation for their regular-season opener at Carolina Sept. 11.

But it still hasn't been decided where they will play their home opener Sept. 18 against the New York Giants or play the rest of their games.

Tagliabue said moving the first game to New Jersey was one possibility, and while he didn't name any specifically, the Alamodome in San Antonio seats 65,000 for football, about the same as the Saints' regular home at the Superdome in New Orleans.

Cougars win thriller

Kennedy needs OT to top Xavier in season opener

CEDAR RAPIDS whole world was in Matt Carey's hands, then he almost threw it away.

Carey, Cedar Rapids Kennedy's rookie senior quarterback, called his own number on a fourth-andgoal from the 1-yard line in the first overtime period and plunged into the end zone to give the Cougars' a thrilling 16-13 win over Cedar Rapids Xavier in a Mississippi Valley Conference opener last night at Saints

A standing-room only crowd of several thousand fans on an impeccable late summer evening held its collective breath as it watched the ball squirt out of the back of the end zone after Carev made his decisive plunge.

a starter. "We've got so many weapons, you got to try to keep everybody happy."


