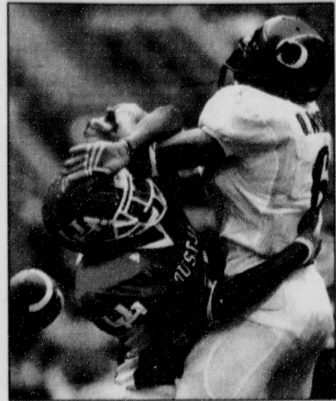

Iowa State to accept donations Saturday

AMES — To assist with disaster relief efforts in the wake of Hurricane Katrina, the Iowa State Athletics Department, working with the student government, will be accepting monetary donations for the Red Cross prior to the Cyclones' 6 p.m. football game against Illinois State Saturday at Jack Trice Stadium.

Donations can be made in cash or by check. Donations stations will be located near the top of both corners of the east and west concourses.

Saints unlikely to play season in New Orleans

NEW YORK — NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue says it's unlikely the Saints will play in New Orleans this season after the devastation Hurricane Katrina and its aftermath inflicted on the city.

The Saints will move into a hotel in San Antonio, Texas, this weekend in preparation for their regular-season opener at Carolina Sept. 11.

But it still hasn't been decided where they will play their home opener Sept. 18 against the New York Giants or play the rest of their games.

Tagliabue said moving the first game to New Jersey was one possibility, and while he didn't name any specifically, the Alamodome in San Antonio seats 65,000 for football, about the same as the Saints' regular home at the Superdome in New Orleans.

MLB, NBA and SEC donate \$1 million each

NEW YORK — Major League Baseball and the NBA have pledged \$2 million to help the victims of Hurricane Katrina, and the Southeastern Conference is donating \$1 million to disaster relief.

In addition to the SEC's donation, the league announced Thursday that each of its 12 universities will coordinate fund-raising efforts at home football games during the next several weeks.

There are plenty of new faces, whose names and numbers you'll see Saturday. Here's a crib sheet as you skim through this year's roster:

The next leaper?

Herb Grigsby, a sophomore from Mayflower, Ark., was

asked how tall he is. He hedged a little bit.

"Uh, five ... er, six-foot," Grigsby said. "Somewhere in there. Pushin' it."

Iowa Coach Kirk Ferentz joked Grigsby is still pushin' 150 pounds. Grigsby says he's 175. The roster says 6-0, 170.

There seems to be little debate that Grigsby will be in the rotation at receiver. The Hawkeyes are set with seniors Ed Hinkel and Clinton Solomo. Grigsby and junior Calvin Davis are listed as backups. In each of the last three years, a receiver has made "The Leap" — Mo Brown in 2002, Ramon Ochoa in '03, and Solomon and Warren Holloway last year.

"Those guys all worked hard," Grigsby said. "They were patient and waited their

turn. That's what you've got to do. There's a lot of good college athletes on this team."

And Grigsby, who in two years has exactly zero statistics, has waited. He's played in just one game, but coaches have raved about his progress this offseason.

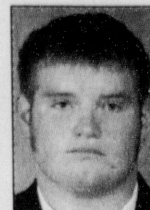

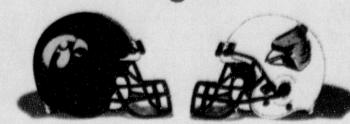

Cougars win thriller

Kennedy needs OT to top Xavier in season opener

CEDAR RAPIDS — The whole world was in Matt Carey's hands, then he almost threw it away.

Carey, Cedar Rapids Kennedy's rookie senior quarterback, called his own number on a fourth-and-goal from the 1-yard line in the first overtime period and plunged into the end zone to give the Cougars' a thrilling 16-13 win over Cedar Rapids Xavier in a Mississippi Valley Conference opener last night at Saints Field.

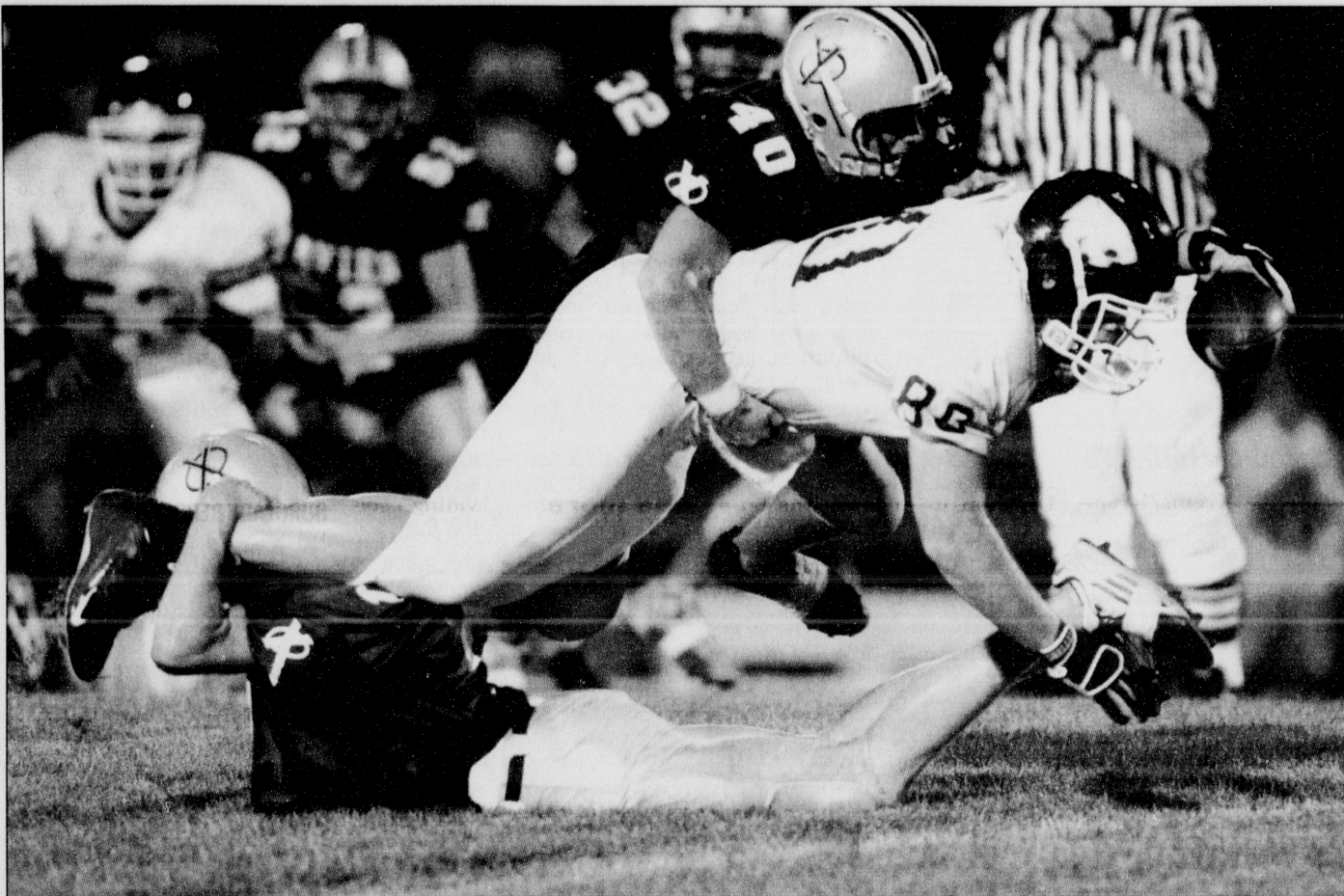
A standing-room only crowd of several thousand fans on an impeccable late summer evening held its collective breath as it watched the ball squirt out of the back of the end zone after Carey made his decisive plunge.

It took several seconds for the officials to signal the TD.

Carey said he never fumbled.

"I actually threw the ball in celebration because I knew I had the touchdown," Carey said. "It probably wasn't a smart move. But I got to call the play, too. So I said quarterback sneak all the way."

This looks like it might be a Kennedy team that doesn't do anything easy all season. It didn't even force the overtime period until Carey hooked up with senior tight end Ben Lamaak for a 14-yard touchdown pass to knot the game at 10 with 4:29 to go. The scoring pass capped a nine-play, 52-

yard drive, the Cougars' most prolific of the night.

"On that one play, Ben went one-on-one with the defender, and he's going to win that every time," Carey said.

The game was a typical season opener, with a few physical and mental breakdowns combined with game-saving plays. Kennedy Coach Tim Lewis was glad to make the short 2-mile ride back to Kennedy with a victory in his pocket, and

said he never considered going for the tie after Xavier kicker Danny Bauer gave the Saints a 13-10 lead in their overtime possession with a 31-yard field goal.

"We had a foot to go," Lewis said. "If they can stop us with a foot to go, they deserve to win."

"We made a lot of mistakes. We didn't execute very well at all."

Xavier was in control most of the game, thanks to a tremendous advantage in

field position. Kennedy didn't start a possession deeper than its own 24 until the one that started on their own 48 and resulted in the Lamaak touchdown.

Carey completed 9 of 27 passes for 140 yards with one interception. Kennedy finally got its running game going in the fourth quarter when Luke Dolan carried eight times for 38 yards.

The Cougars finished with 239 yards.

Xavier tailbacks Eddie

Davis and Will Martin combined for 112 yards, with Martin getting 86 on 20 carries and Davis 56 on 15 carries, with Davis actually gaining 57 in the first half and Martin 83 in the second half. But the Kennedy defense, led by linebacker Mike Morio, kept the Saints in check, holding them to 162 yards, all the ground.

Davis' legs and strong defensive efforts led by senior tackle Jacob Kray and

QB Sanders shines for Panthers

CEDAR FALLS — What can Eric Sanders do for an encore?

How about the best game of his brief career.

Sanders finished his sophomore season as Northern

Iowa's quarterback last night, igniting the 12th-ranked Panthers to a 52-17 victory over Drake before 10,385 fans at the UNI-Dome.

After directing UNI to six consecutive wins last fall as a freshman, some wondered what else the former Oelwein prep could do.

The short answer: plenty. Sanders completed 14 of 17

passes for a career-high 289 yards and three touchdowns. He completed 11 in a row at one point, capping it with a 52-yard beauty to Nebraska transfer David Horne, who dropped Sanders' first pass of the night.

"First-game jitters," Horne said with a laugh.

Seven players scored touchdowns as UNI dominated its NCAA I-AA brother, albeit a smaller, non-scholarship sibling.

The Panthers totaled 528 yards of offense — 359 in the first half — and rotated three running backs before subbing freely at the end of the third quarter.

"Man, some guys made some plays tonight," Sanders said after improving to 7-1 as

a starter. "We've got so many weapons, you got to try to keep everybody happy."

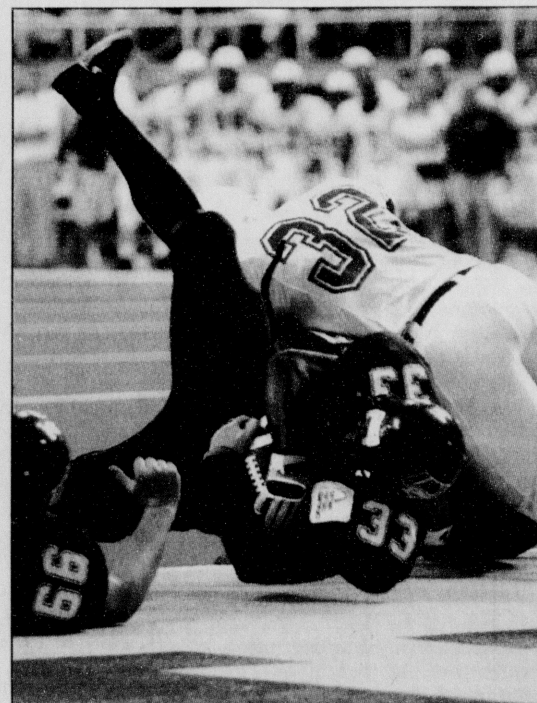
Everybody in the UNI camp seemed happy after this route.

Horne started in place of Terrance Freney and totaled 44 yards and a touchdown on nine carries. Freney, nursing a sore knee, managed 36 yards and a touchdown on nine carries. Jason Breeland added 33 yards on four rushes.

Corey Lewis, in mop-up duty, led the Panthers with 51 yards on 10 rushes.

"It was a very productive night offensively," UNI Coach Mark Farley said. "You'd be cheating them if you didn't
