

Tigers dispatch Cougars

Taylor Brookins was thrilled to be back on the football field after sitting out the first two games of the season for violating school policy.

"I'm proud to be back," the Cedar Falls all-state tailback said. "It's definitely more fun than sitting on the bench, let's just say that. I wanted to get some of my anger out after the last two weeks."

Ben Curran was thrilled to have Brookins back on the field.

"Getting Taylor back was a good thing for us," the Tiger quarterback said. "It was a big game for us tonight and having Taylor back helped a lot. He's one of my best friends on the team."

The combination of Brookins and Curran, Curran's twin brother Nate, big tight end Brady Loper and suffocating defense proved too much for Cedar Rapids Kennedy, as Class 4A fourth-ranked Cedar Falls pounded No. 9 Cedar Rapids Kennedy, 45-7, last night at Kingston Stadium in front of a Kennedy homecoming crowd of about 6,500 fans, 5,000 of whom were clad in the home team's green-and-gold.

Brookins, a powerful, 5-foot-9, 201-pound all-stater, carried 32 times for 187 yards and a touchdown, with all but nine of those yards coming in the first three quarters. He rushed for 1,664 yards and 18 touchdowns as a junior a season ago.

"I thought he really looked good tonight," Cedar Falls Coach Pat Mitchell understated.

Curran, meanwhile, kept the Kennedy defense honest by completing 14 of 18 passes for 218 yards with touchdown throws to brother Nate and Loper. Curran's yardage was a career high, surpassing the 188 he threw against Kennedy last year in the UNI-Dome.

Nate Curran caught seven passes for 119 yards, including an 18-yard TD reception. Loper had four catches for 69 yards, including a 1-yard touchdown reception.

"Our passing game was sharp tonight and our pass protection was sharp tonight," Mitchell said. "But I want to compliment Kennedy. I think they're going to win a lot of games."

In all, Cedar Falls (3-0) totaled 495 yards of offense.

The Cougars struggled against a Cedar Falls defense that limited the Cougars (2-1) to 104 total yards, including minus-1 in the third quarter.

Kennedy's only highlight came right after the Tigers had scored on their first possession. On the ensuing kickoff, Cordale Baker fielded the kick at his 3-yard line, handed it to homecoming king

Jarion Beets on a reverse, who in turn went 95 yards for a touchdown with 7:52 left in the first quarter.

Kennedy Coach Tim Lewis had his team in a lengthy postgame meeting and couldn't be asked for comment.

Cedar Falls built a 21-7 halftime lead with textbook Mitchell football, controlling the ball and the clock while winning the battle of field position.

By effectively mixing the run and the pass — 190 yards passing, 96 rushing — the Tigers' three first-half scoring drives covered 82 yards on nine plays, 54 yards on seven plays and 84 yards on six plays.

Brookins capped the first drive with a 30-yard run off a toss-sweep left, Ben Curran hooked up with Loper from from 1-yard out on a nifty little play-action pass to cap the second, and Ben Curran

found brother Nate with a perfectly throw pass from 18 yards out to finish the scoring.

Ben Curran completed 10 of 12 passes for 190 yards and the two TDs in the first half alone. Brookins had 96 yards on 20 carries at the break.

Kennedy committed three turnovers in the second half while the Tigers ran wild. Cedar Falls' second-half touchdown drives covered 54 yards in seven plays (Ben Curran 1-yard sneak for the TD), 30 yards on six plays (Stu Craig 1-yard run) and 20 yards on four plays (Jason Goulden 11-yard run). Goulden also kicked a 41-yard field goal.

Kennedy takes on the role of visitor this Friday when it plays Cedar Rapids Jefferson back at Kingston.

Lions extend Waterloo East's losing streak

MARION — Waterloo East High School won 55 straight football games from 1965 to 1972, but the scales are almost level now.

The Trojans now have lost 48 in a row.

Hunter Smoak rambled for four touchdowns in the first half Friday night and Linn-Mar kept Waterloo East winless in the 21st Century with a 54-0 conquest at Armstrong Field. The Trojans (0-3) have not won since the final game of the 1999 campaign.

Waterloo East put up a fight early, but the Trojans did not have the manpower to compete with Linn-Mar (2-1). The Trojans had only 25 healthy players to start the game, and one of them was sent to the hospital in the second quarter with an unspecified injury.

"I think they're moving in the right direction," said Linn-Mar Coach Bob Read. "Their sophomores are undefeated. I think they'll end it (the losing streak) next year, or maybe later this year."

Waterloo East won the sophomore game, 40-20, raising its record to 3-0. The Trojans had 30 tenth graders on the sophomore roster and 22 juniors on the varsity roster, giving new coach Charlie Aldrich hope for the future.

For now, however, it's still a mismatch. Linn-Mar had more than 50 players in uniform for the varsity game, and the Lions went strictly with their reserves in the second half after building a 42-0 cushion at intermission.

Linn-Mar's players have compassion for the Trojans, but all games count in the Mississippi Valley Conference.

"You have to play it like a normal game," Smoak said.

Actually, it wasn't entirely normal for Smoak. He became the featured runner for the Lions last night with Beau Evans sidelined with a sprained ankle and carried 18 times in the first half for 122 yards and four touchdowns.

Read was concerned about playing without Evans, but Smoak took over with TD runs of 2, 9, 4 and 3 yards on four consecutive possessions in the first half.

"The big guy stepped in and did a great job," Read said.

"It was a lot of fun. I enjoyed it," Smoak said. "All the credit goes to the offen-

sive line. They opened some big holes."

Linn-Mar rolled up 308 yards of total offense in the first half, compared to just 47 yards for Waterloo East.

Smoak's four touchdowns and four PATs by Grant Mahoney made it 28-0 with 4:11 left in the first half. The Lions made it 35-0 on a 13-yard touchdown pass from Mark Rigby to Joe Elgin, then made it 42-0 with three seconds left in the first half on a twisting 63-yard punt return for a touchdown by Blair Harris.

The entire second half was played with a continuous clock under the prep mercy rule, which keeps the clock running when a team has a 35-point lead or more.

Harris, a quick wingback, rushed 10 times for 110 yards in the first half with bursts of 29 and 40 yards.

It was a quick second half, but the Lions had time for a 33-yard touchdown scamper by Darren Mickens and a 2-yard TD by Ryan Shonka.

Linn-Mar honored its 1985 state championship team before last night's game. That club went 12-0 and beat Sioux City Heelan, 31-7, for the title. "It's inspiring, just having them watch us," Smoak said.

Prairie dominates trenches in shutout

CEDAR RAPIDS — They're jokingly referred to as the "Big Uglies." Linemen just don't get any respect.

But Cedar Rapids Prairie's "Big Uglies" produced some sexy results for their team last night at John Wall Field.

It was complete domination by the guys up front on both sides of the ball that gave tailback Jamie Klith a chance to sizzle, Iowa City West's offense plenty of fizzle and Prairie a 28-0 win. This was smash-mouth football at its utter finest.

"Hey, whatever gets the job done," laughed Prairie senior tackle Matt Trosky, when reminded about the unflattering nickname he and his fellow big men have. "Jamie is a great running back, and we'd like that kid playing with us any day of the week. We don't want the glory. We just want to block hard and let that 'W' be our reward."

Guys like Trosky did block hard last night, and Klith ran hard behind them. The junior back carried it 29 times for 209 yards and three touchdowns in less than three quarters of play.

Most of those runs came right up the middle. On an early second-quarter drive, Klith had three straight carries, and after a quarterback sack, 11 more feeds in a row,

eventually resulting in a 3-yard touchdown plunge. Then he ran straight up the gut for the two-point conversion.

"We condition pretty good, we keep pretty well conditioned," said Klith, who had 200 yards in the first half and only four carries in the second half. "Yeah, you get winded, but you've got to keep your head up and keep looking for touchdowns."

"Our men up front were outstanding. They're pretty good. I've got to thank them for pretty much all the yards I rushed for. I give them all the credit."

After last week's upset loss to Cedar Rapids Kennedy, Prairie head coach Craig Jelinek decided his team needed to go back to the basics. At Prairie, that means trying to be tougher and more physical than your opponent.

Needless to say, it worked.

"That's our personality," Jelinek said. "After we got stung last week, you've got to go right back to what works and get your kids confidence. And that's what we did."

"After the Kennedy loss, we felt we weren't physical enough," Trosky said. "So we had to start out being a little more physical this week. And I think we came out and showed people that we could be more physical."

That means defensively, too. While Prairie rushed for 246 yards, West was limited to 102 total yards, 64 rushing.

Prairie sacked West quarterbacks Matthew Aiken and Matt Hartman seven times, and West's leading rusher was tailback James Teel, who had a modest 25 yards. Prairie held a 21-0 halftime lead, then scored midway through the third for the final margin.

The deepest penetration West had all night was the

Prairie 40. Reserves played a lot of the second half.

"Without a doubt, Prairie dominated both sides of the ball," West Coach Dan Dvorak said. "They are very big up front, and we have a difficult time matching up physically with teams like that."

West dropped to 1-2. Prairie, which dropped out of the AP Top 10 in Class 4A this week, improved to 2-1.

"The only way to get over a loss is to get a win," Jelinek said. "It's just like losing a girlfriend. The best way to get over it is to get another one."
