great win over a great team like Xavier."

Klith was the offensive star, rushing 30 times for 204 yards and a 63-yard touchdown that salted the outcome early in the fourth quarter. Because of sacks and tackles for loss, Klith finished with more yards than his team, 204 to 195.

"We just wanted to play power football like we always do," said Klith, who unofficially has 1,202 yards rushing this season. "We knew we had to get at least one more won if we had any chance of getting to the playoffs."

The Hawks struck on the game's first possession when Nate Suchomel connected on a 47-yard touchdown pass with Colin Dietrich to put the finishing touches on an impressive, 10-play 80-yard opening drive. It came at the 7:46 mark of the first quarter.

Then it was time for Kramer, Fiala and the rest of the Prairie defense to take center stage.

With the Saints working from the Hawks' 36-yard line, Fiala burst through the line and got one of his big mitts on an attempted pitch, knocking the toward the Hawks' goal. Kramer was way ahead of the pack and scooped the ball up on his own 44, marching in untouched to give the Hawks a 14-0 lead with 4:05 remaining in the first quarter.

"I saw the ball come loose after Bryan tipped it and all I was thinking about was getting to the ball," Kramer said. "The coaches put me where they think the ball is going to be."

Prairie added a third first-half touchdown when Reutzel basically walked into the end zone from 2 yards out to cap a 10-play, 77-yard drive at the 9:09 mark of the second quarter, and the 21-0 lead held until halftime.

Xavier quarterback Matt Lukan threw for 102 yards in the first half but was intercepted once and was part of three plays that netted minus-40 yards, including the tipped pitch that went for minus-20 before Kramer scooped it up. The Saints had minus-16 yards rushing at halftime.

Lukan finished 18 of 35 for 218 yards with a 17-yard second-half touchdown pass to Geoff Wagner. T.J. Sayre caught eight passes for 102 yards.

Xavier (5-3) plays at Iowa City West next Friday with very slim playoff hopes still alive.

They just couldn't handle Prairie last night.

"They're a bigger and stronger team than us," Xavier Coach Duane Schulte said.

Prairie's game against Cedar Falls is the latest in a brutal string for the Hawks.

"Why not?" Jelinek asked.

"We played City High last week, Xavier tonight and Cedar Falls next week. Why not? We'll probably take on the Packers after that and Iowa after that."

Cougars close in on playoff berth

Rout of Wahlert puts Kennedy in good spot

CEDAR RAPIDS — It's one down and one to go for the Cedar Rapids Kennedy Cougars. One more win, and they'll be a part of the playoff show.

The other main story lines in last night's 48-13 Kennedy victory over Dubuque Wahlert at Kingston Stadium included the continuation of the Metro's dominance of the three Dubuque and two Waterloo public schools. And then there's big Ben Lamaak continuing to make the rare tight-end-to-quarterback position change look way too easy.

But first things first, and that's Kennedy's being on the verge of qualifying for the Class 4A postseason. Win next week at Linn-Mar, and the Cougars (6-2) are in the playoffs for the first time since 1999. Lose, and there will be a lot of scoreboard watching on the northeast side of Cedar Rapids.

"We start preaching one game at a time, and now it is (down to one game)," Kennedy Coach Tim Lewis said. "We've got our work cut out for us, we're playing a good team. But we're playing, I think, as good of football that has been played around here for a while. I guess if you've got to peak, this is the time to do it. I think our kids are excited."

If Kennedy plays next Friday as it did last night, especially in the first half, it likely won't have to sweat out seeing how other potential playoff qualifiers fare. The Cougars rung up a 27-0 halftime lead on Wahlert (1-7), thanks to good defense and a nice offensive blend of the run and pass.

The 6-foot-5, 250-pound Lamaak first started taking practice repetitions at quarterback in Week 4 but didn't make his official position change until just last week. Either way, he is playing like he's been a QB forever.

He runs Kennedy's diverse spread offense well.

"It's not me," Lamaak insisted. "It's the coaches, it's my teammates, it's the offensive line. Those guys are

making plays. I'm just giving them the ball, and those guys are doing the rest."

Lamaak powered his way to 76 yards rushing and a touchdown on a variety of successful sneaks and shotgun draws. He completed his first nine passes and 10 of 11 overall for 151 yards and two scores, including a perfect deep sideline rainbow to running back Herve Cantrell that went for a 73-yard touchdown early in the third quarter.

Cantrell had a fine all-around game, catching two passes for 89 yards and rushing for 108 more. That included a 3-yard touchdown run to cap Kennedy's first-half scoring late in the second quarter.

"(What Lamaak is doing) isn't really surprising me, to be honest with you," Lewis said. "He's a tremendous athlete. We went into the season saying that if we were to be successful, we were going to have the get the ball in Ben Lamaak's hands. The first six games, we weren't doing it . . . So we felt we had to do something."

Lamaak got Kennedy on the score-

board with a 12-yard run four minutes into the game, then Cordale Baker added a 14-yard TD sweep run for a 14-0 lead after a quarter. Lamaak hit wide receiver Daren Hlavacek with a 13-yard touchdown fade pass early in the second for a 20-0 Kennedy lead, then Cantrell scored to make it 27-0.

Wahlert converted the opening drive of the second half for a touchdown: a Bobby Avenarius 17-yard TD run. But Lamaak and Cantrell combined for their long score to give Kennedy back its 27-point lead, 34-7.

A Lamaak 1-yard QB sneak made it 41-7, and former-starter-turned-backup quarterback Matt Carey got the continuous clock going with a 1-yard TD sneak of his own early in the fourth quarter.

Kennedy outgained Wahlert by a 453-244 margin, including 273 yards rushing. The Metro came into last night with an 18-1 mark against Dubuque Wahlert, Hempstead and Senior, and Waterloo East and West.

Little Hawks crush Waterloo East

IOWA CITY — Waterloo East at least can say it led Class 4A third-ranked Iowa City High, if for only 91 seconds.

After C.J. Krusemark's 27-yard field goal gave the Trojans a 3-0 lead with 7:12 left in the first quarter, the rout was on.

City High's Ben Evans caught a pair of touchdown passes from quarterback Jon Gilmore on consecutive plays in the first quarter, covering 70 and 26 yards, respectively, and the Little Hawks rolled with expected ease to a 45-10 victory in a Mississippi Valley Conference football game last night at Bates Field.

East (0-8), losers of 53 straight games, has been outscored 276-16 this season. Playoff-bound City High (8-0) will try to complete an undefeated regular season with a win at Cedar Rapids Washington next Friday.

"We were a little ragged, but there were a lot of factors contributing to that," City

High Coach Dan Sabers said. "We got some things done that we liked. East is definitely making progress. They came out and did some things pretty well and we weren't quite ready to go."

Evans, a senior, caught a screen pass on 3rd-and-15 and ran untouched into the end zone for his first score, giving City High a 7-3 lead at the 5:41 mark.

After Trevor Hixon blocked a Trojan punt, Evans got behind the East secondary for a 26-yard scoring strike with 3:44 remaining.

"They were bringing a lot of people and we were able to set up a little screen," Evans said. "Jon stayed in there and took a hit and threw a nice ball. The line did a good job blocking, and I have great receivers who were doing downfield blocking and I was able to spring it."

Evans had a short night, but he squeezed in one last touchdown early in the third quarter, taking a middle screen pass 74 yards for a score. Evans, a state track

champion, finished with five receptions for 192 yards and three TDs.

Sabers said he's coaching a Division I receiver in Evans.

"I certainly think he's that type of ballplayer," Sabers said. "When he gets in the open field, he's dangerous. I sure like him, that's for sure."

Evans said Iowa, Iowa State, Northern Iowa, Western Illinois and Wayne State have talked to him, but he hasn't received a scholarship offer yet.

"I don't think I'm quite special enough of a player to get an offer before my senior year," Evans said.

Gilmore, who like Evans played about 2½ quarters, completed 9 of 12 passes for 276 yards and four touchdowns.

City High starting running back Travis Gobush didn't play with a foot injury, but Sabers expects to have him come playoff time. In Gobush's absence, senior Dorian Davis gained 73 yards on 17 carries and scored two touch-
