



Gable's return lasts 1 season

Legendary coach returning to role as assistant AD

Dan Gable felt in March the University of Iowa wrestling program still needed his help. Those feelings

changed. Hawkeye wrestling coach Tom Brands announced Friday that Gable was stepping

down after one season as his top assistant coach. Gable will return to his role as special assistant to the director of athletics on Oct. 1. He also will

continue to help the wrestling program, but not on a day-to-day basis.

"Dan has been my coach and my mentor. What's important to me is that he's going to remain involved in the Hawkeye wrestling program and will continue to play a significant role as we continue to make progress toward the goal of domination," Brand said in a statement released by the univer-

Gable did not return calls

"My assistant coach's role was always temporary and I'm not going anywhere," he said in a statement. "I'll be directly involved in our wrestling program as much as NCAA rules allow me to be."

Gable is the most successful wrestling coach in NCAA history, directing Iowa to 15 national titles and 355 dual wins in 21 years. He stepped down after the 1997 season, but returned prior to last season when Brands was named head coach.

He said at the Big Ten meet in March that he didn't always connect with the athletes today, but added "right now it seems like they still need some more work.

Gable said in the statement Friday the program is in "very, very good hands and there is absolutely no doubt that we're headed in the right direction.

Brands said there is no timetable for hiring Gable's replacement. Among those mentioned is Tom's brother, Terry, another former Hawkeye great who is coaching the U.S. freestyle program in Colorado Springs, Colo. ■ Contact the writer: (319) 368-8696 or

- When you're trying to break a long losing streak, the last thing you need is to play a perennial power that's coming off an upset loss.

That made last night's outcome at Armstrong Field a predictable one: Iowa City High 31, Linn-Mar 7.

Tonight they caught us on a tough draw," said City High Coach Dan Sabers. "We were disappointed with last week, there's no question. Our practices were much better this week, us coaches did a better job. We all did a better job."
