Jets fan sues Belichick over videotaped signals

NEW YORK — A New York Jets season-ticket holder filed a class-action lawsuit Friday against the New England Patriots and Coach Bill Belichick for "deceiving customers.

The lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court in Newark, N.J., by Carl Mayer of Princeton Township, N.J., stems from the Patriots being caught illegally videotaping signals from Jets coaches in New England's 38-14 season-opening win Sept. 9.

Mayer is seeking more than \$184 million in damages for Jets ticket holders.

Franchione sold inside info to subscribers

DALLAS — Texas A&M coach Dennis Franchione said he has stopped selling inside information on the Aggies in a newsletter to boosters who paid \$1,200 per year in subscription fees that helped finance the coach's personal Web site.

CINCINNATI (AP) - With their two biggest investments paying off last night, the Chicago Cubs are back in the play-

Alfonso Soriano hit another leadoff homer, Carlos Zambrano kept his cool and the Cubs clinched the NL Central with a 6-0 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

Thousands of Chicago fans made the five-hour road trip and cheered every move by the Cubs, who earned their first playoff spot since 2003 when Milwaukee later lost to San Diego, 6-3.

"This one was very important to me," said Zambrano of the Cubs' \$300 million off-(18-13), who lost the season opener in Cincinnati. "We started the season here. Before the game, I was thinking: Here we started, and here we fin-

But he's in Arizona instead. The outfielder from Cedar

Rapids is staying at an aunt's house and taking part in minor league instructional league. of all things Surprisingly he didn't get the call back to majors

when active rosters expanded from 25 to a possible 40 players at the beginning of Sep-

"It was disappointing," Sweeney said in a phone interview. "But, again, I'm kind of a young guy. I don't know if they wanted to see some of the other younger guys or what.

"What they told me was they wanted to see if (third baseman) Josh Fields could play left field. They didn't want me to come up there and sit on the bench for a month. So they told me to go to instructs, get my swing down and tear up the fall league.

Sweeney, 22, is set to begin play in the Arizona Fall League on Oct. 9. It's a month-long endeavor that involves top prospects from all 30 MLB clubs.

Then he will head back home to Cedar Rapids, where he'll spend the winter and prepare for spring training. It'll be an important spring training for him because he should have a legitimate chance to secure a 2008 opening-day spot with the White Sox.


Sweeney made his White Sox debut last September and got his second taste of the big leagues when he was called up to Chicago on April 29. He hit .200 (9-for-45) in 15 games, including his first major league home run, before getting sent back to Triple-A Charlotte.

That's where he stayed the rest of the season, hitting .270 with 17 doubles, 10 homers and 47 RBIs in 105 games.



IOWA CITY — Cedar Rapids Washington had doubledigit penalties, a couple of turnovers and one potentially crucial injury.

But the Class 4A ninthranked Warriors still managed to leave town last night with a victory in the Mississippi Valley Conference. Thanks to a fast start and a strong finish, Washington stayed undefeated and kept Iowa City West winless with a 27-10 triumph.

"I thought we did a great job. We played without a running back for most of the game and made some good plays when we had to," said Washington Coach Tony Lombardi, whose team overcame two turnovers and 12 penalties. "Our offensive line took the game over in the fourth quarter."

The running back Lombardi is speaking of is sophomore tailback Andre Dawson, the MVC's leading rusher, who left the game with about five minutes remaining in the second quarter with an injured right ankle.

Before getting hurt, Daw-son gained 55 yards on six carries, with runs of 21 and 24 yards.

"He's a sophomore, so any bump or bruise he has is a big concern," Lombardi said. "Hopefully, he can play this week. I learned a long time ago that you coach the ones you've got. We'll see what he can do."

Dawson's had a big run on each of the Warriors' first two drives resulting in TDs and an early 13-0 lead.

On the game's opening possession, dynamic receiver Keenan Davis caught a pass, but fumbled the ball at the

West 1-yard line, trying to fight for the end zone. Teammate Sam O'Donnell fell on the football for a touchdown with 9:32 remaining.

After recovering a West fumble, the Warriors (5-0) struck again. This time, Davis outjumped West's Rontavius Farmer in the corner of the end zone for a 7-yard touchdown with 5:11 left in the first.

"They have a lot of quality athletes and a lot of weapons," West Coach Mike Cooper said.

West (0-5) came out trying to establish its ground game, and it had success with a steady diet of senior Aaron Martin.

Martin carried the ball on the Trojans' first 11 plays, gaining 61 yards. On its second possession, West drove to the Warrior 12-yard line, but ended up settling for Austin Otto's 32-yard field goal with 11:08 left in the first half to cut Washington's lead to 13-3.

Martin finished with 131 yards rushing on 26 carries.

"Our offensive line continues to improve every week," Cooper said. "Aaron Martin is a very good running back. He ran hard tonight. We did take another step (forward).'

Trailing 20-3, West had a 15-play, 74-yard touchdown drive that was capped by tight end Blake Stahlecker's 7-yard scoring grab from quarterback Kyle Mason with 3:10 remaining in the third. Mason started the second half for Gavin Smith, who suffered an injury to his non-throwing left shoulder.

Washington added an insurance touchdown on Jerome Strong's 9-yard run.
