But with the Big Ten Network's debut Aug. 30 and its priority on exclusive content, Mediacom is not allowed to broadcast weekly replays or coaches shows, which violates the contract's terms.

"We have a saying that desire beats talent every time," Perkins said. "We got beat by desire tonight."

Central's patented run-itright-at-you offensive attack produced 251 yards and ate tons of time off the clock, and the Sabers outlasted an outplayed Marion team, 17-13, on a gorgeous night

Central took over sole position of the lead in Class 3A District 5 with a 5-0 record (5-2 overall) and staked a pretty good claim for a playoff berth two weeks from now. Marion dropped to 6-1 and 4-1 and still harbors playoff hopes.

But Central controlled this game from the begin-"We didn't look at it as

playing the No. 2 team in the state," Central Coach Kurt Kreiter said. "We got off to a slow start but we played a couple of pretty good teams in Benton and

West Delaware.

"I'm not taking anything away from Marion because Marion - Marion's an outstanding team, and I think we have a pretty good team. We played hard in all aspects.'

Junior Michael Burke led the Sabers with 99 rushing yards, including a 36-yard run on their second play from scrimmage that kind of set the tone.

Marion took a precarious 7-3 lead into the locker room at halftime after failing to mount any kind of rushing attack against Central. It had 25 rushing yards at the break.

The Indians got on the board first when Curtis Hubbell made a diving catch of a pass from Matt Barnd for a 26-yard TD with 8:02 left in the second quarter.

The Sabers' only points came on a 24-yard field goal from Keaton Mueller with 17 seconds left in the half

# Dubuque Wahlert keeps lowa City West winless

Despite a solid effort from quarterback Kyle Mason and running back Aaron Martin, the Trojans couldn't come up with the big plays when they needed them, dropping a hard-fought contest to Dubuque Wahlert, 33-20, last night in a Mississippi Valley Conference prep football

Wahlert improved to 5-2

while West fell to 0-7.

The Trojan secondary dealt well with the Golden Eagle spread, but quarterback Eric May was the difference, scrambling his way to 105 yards and a touchdown.

"That's a quality offense," West Coach Mike Cooper said. "They've got a quarterback that can throw it and run it. That's what killed us tonight. It wasn't passing, it was him keeping the ball."

West put itself in an immediate hole. After a holding penalty pushed West back inside its own 20, Mason's pitch the game.

# Trick play helps beat C.R. Prairie

CEDAR RAPIDS says you can't teach an old coach new tricks?

Pat Mitchell, 68, has been a successful head coach at Cedar Falls High School for 41 years, but he'd never used a fake field goal like this be-

The trick play helped the No. 3 Tigers defeat Cedar Rapids Prairie, 30-7, and clinch a spot in the Class 4A playoffs in a Mississippi Valley Conference game at John Wall

Michael Schindel, the holder on the fake field goal, took the snap and tossed the ball blindly over his head to place-kicker Riley Morris, who caught the ball on the run and scooted into the end zone for six points.

Cedar Falls borrowed the trick play from top-ranked LSU, which used it to score a touchdown against Auburn a few weeks ago.

"Hey, why not?" Mitchell said. "We try to have fun with the players, rather than the routine things."

Actually, it was Cedar Falls co-head coach Brad Remmert who saw LSU use the play on TV and decided to give it a

whirl. 'We're kind of a copy-cat deal sometimes," said Remmert, who will become the head coach when Mitchell retires. "You see a good play on TV and try to work it in. It

just worked out for us." Cedar Falls (7-0) was leading, 21-7, in the third quarter when it lined up for an apparent field goal at the 16-yard line. The snap was good, Schindel tossed it to Morris, and he was off.

The Tigers had tried the play only three or four times in practice the last two weeks before giving it a shot last night.

"Coach Remmert put it in and completely surprised me," Morris said. "I didn't know we were going to run it

Morris was stunned when the play was called.

"Oh, I couldn't breathe good," he said.

Cedar Falls didn't need a lot of tricks to defeat Prairie, which killed itself with five turnovers.

'Turnovers have been our biggest problem this year,' said Prairie Coach Craig Jeli-
