records show. Huntrods was arrested on Sept. 6 and charged with public urination, public intoxication and interference with official acts. Police say an officer saw him urinating on the sidewalk. Huntrods began to walk away after the officer identified himself and then ran from the officer.

He was dismissed from the football team four days later.

# Little movement on Big Ten Network

IOWA CITY — Big Ten Network President Mark Silverman wants less talk and more action in his network's negotiations with Mediacom.

Two months have passed since the network's Aug. 30 debut. Mediacom, the fourth-largest cable operator within

the Big Ten's eight-state area, does not carry the network, which has sent some of its customers scrambling to sports bars and satellite homes when the Big Ten Network broadcasts an Iowa football game.

Entering November, the companies continue to negotiate but a settlement seems unlikely without a major position change

Lickliter smiled when he heard the story. His assistant coaches call him Coach Lick, as did his players at Butler. As long as it's done respect-

fully, it's OK. "He can call me anything he wants," Lickliter said. "Just show up and compete."

Lickliter and the Hawkeyes start competing tonight in an exhibition game against Simpson College at Carver-Hawkeye Arena. It doesn't count in the standings, but the Hawks want to get off to a good start.

Gorney has a goal. "I told Coach this: I'd like to go through our non-conference season undefeated," he said. "It's going to be tough and everything, but I think

That's the attitude Lickliter wants. He wants his players to accept the challenge, compete hard and not make ex-

we have the tools to do it."

Gorney, a 7-footer from Ohio, feels refreshed with the new coach.

"It's a new start for us, and everybody's got a different attitude from last year," he said. "I guess that motivates

you to go out and try harder. So I think that's what's going on.

Gorney seems more relaxed and confident than he did a vear ago when Steve Alford was in his final season as head coach. It's still very early in the transition, but Gorney likes what he's seen.

"With Lickliter, he teaches you what to do and takes his time with you," he said. "If you don't get something right, he'll stop the play and kind of explain everything. I think it's helping us learn the plays a lot better.

According to Gorney, that's not the way it worked with Alford and former associate head coach Craig Neal in previous years.

"I think they're real good coaches and everything, Gorney said. "I think they ex pected you to know, and if you didn't they really didn't want to have to go over it

again. How they did it wasn't the best method.'

That's only one man's opinion, of course, and might differ drastically from what former UI stars Jeff Horner, Adam Haluska and Greg Brunner would say, but that's the way Gorney feels heading into the new year.

Gorney started 17 of 31 games last season when the Hawks finished 17-14 and did not qualify for the NCAA tournament or NIT. He averaged 5.5 points and 3.8 rebounds, which makes him one of the top veterans on the team.

Gorney might have a lot more to give this year. He's a big guy who likes to shoot from the outside, and Lickliter is a rare coach who encourages his centers to shoot from the perimeter — if they

prove they can make it. Lickliter will reveal a starting lineup for the first time

tonight against Simpson, although it could change numerous times this season. Lickliter wants all 11 players to be ready at all times, whether they think they're going to play 30 minutes in a game or just three.

It could be big-man-by-committee with Gorney, David Palmer, Cyrus Tate, Kurt Looby and Jarryd Cole all rotating up front, which means every player needs to go as hard as he can for as long as he can. That's been the concept in practices, which have been concise 2-hour workouts instead of 3-hour marathons.

'He wants us to learn what we need to in a shorter amount of time, get our rest. come back and be able to go 100 percent again the next day," Gorney said.

Iowa fans can start to make their own judgments tonight.

# **Last-minute TD ends** Little Hawks' season

Iowa City High had rallied from 21 down to tie Bettendorf

BETTENDORF After spotting top-ranked Bettendorf a three-touchdown lead, Iowa City High Coach Dan Sabers challenged his upsetminded football team.

"Coach said, 'Don't give up and leave everything you Little have on the field," Hawk senior quarterback Teddy Schmidt said. "That's what we did. I didn't want to get blown out."

Schmidt passed for 361 yards and four touchdowns, but the outstanding performance came in his final game in a City High uniform.

Bettendorf junior Carter Ridenour caught a game-winning 19-yard touchdown with 57 seconds left to give the Bulldogs a thrilling, 35-28, win over No. 9 City High in a Class 4A first-round playoff game at TouVelle Stadium last night.

Ridenour had four receptions for 55 yards on the final eight-play, 69-yard drive, including a 19-yard grab on third-and-7 from his own 34yard line

Bettendorf (10-0) advances to play rival Davenport Assumption in the quarterfinals Monday, while City High finishes the season at 7-3

"We missed some tackles, but we made some plays in the second half when we had Bulldog Coach Randy Scott said. "The end result, we did just enough of the little things to win the game."

Bettendorf jumped out to a commanding 21-0 lead in the first quarter on scoring drives of 16, 64 and 14 yards.

The two shortest drives were set up by City High turnovers.

# Cedar Falls survives Xavier scare

CEDAR FALLS resemble the traits and characteristics of your leader, there's no wonder Cedar Rapids Xavier gave Cedar Falls a big-time Halloween night scare in their Class 4A first-round football playoff

Xavier head coach Duane Schulte was at the UNI-Dome doing his thing on the sideline despite having an emergency appendectomy late Tuesday night/early Wednesday morning.

Now that's toughness, something his team had plenty of as well. In fact, it took a 41-yard pass play from Kyle Bernard to tight end Darion Howard with 1:44 left to allow thirdranked Cedar Falls to escape with a 21-17 win.

17-14 lead on an 81-yard end zone for the winning touchdown pass from Dan Schmall to Bryce Colston with 4:58 remaining. But after an exchange of punts, Cedar Falls (10-0) got one last crack at avoiding the upset and made the most of

The Tigers took possession at their 24 with 3:08 left and no timeouts. A huge play on the drive occurred when quarterback Bernard scrambled for six yards on a 3rd-and-10 play at the Cedar Falls 30 and was hit out of bounds for a 15-yard penal-

Later on the drive, Cedar Falls faced a 3rd-and-7 on the Xavier 41. Bernard rolled right away from pressure up the middle and hit an open Howard at about the 20, with Howard breaking an attempted shoestring score.

Xavier (7-3) went four-andout on its ensuing possession. It got one last play from its 20 with two seconds remaining, but a Schmall Hail Mary went incomplete.

Schmall completed 14 of 31 passes for 219 yards and two touchdowns in a fine perfor-

Cedar Falls looked like it grabbed control of this one when it took the second-half kickoff and drove for a touchdown that gave it a 14-3 lead. Tough-running back Andrew Tindall did the honors from 6 yards out on a pitch play, part of a 116yard rushing night.

But Xavier came right back on the ensuing possession, behind the arm of Schmall. He connected with Colston for a pair of comple-Xavier took a stunning tackle and rambling into the tions that accounted for 42

That's the way the game stayed until Xavier literally hit lightning in a bottle midway through the fourth.

Schmall was sacked on a 3rd-and-17 play at the Xavier 8 but the play was negated by a defensive holding call on Cedar Falls. Facing 3rdand-7 instead, Schmall dropped back and hit a sprinting Colston for a sideline bomb and a Xavier lead.

Xavier carried much of the first-half play but had to be a tad discouraged by its 7-3 halftime deficit.

The only score of the third period came on a 1-yard run by Johnson with 41.4 seconds left in the frame that gave the Cougars a 28-14 lead.

In the end, Kennedy was stopped despite three Washington turnovers that looked like would kill the Warriors early in the game.
