Fans to take field before Yankee Stadium finale

NEW YORK — Yankee Stadium will get a long send-off Sunday, with fans allowed to walk on the field hours before a pregame ceremony honoring the ballpark's rich history.

Some of the plans for the New York Yankees' final game at their longtime home were released Friday after the club kept them under wraps for much of the summer

Gates will open at 1 p.m. about 7 hours, 15 minutes before New York plays the Baltimore Orioles at the 85year-old stadium. For the first three hours, fans can walk through Monument Park, behind the fence in left-center, and walk along the warning track in the outfield and to home plate. Field access will end at about 4 p.m., and Monument Park will close at about 6:45 p.m.

Coe, Cornell going at it early this year

CEDAR RAPIDS — John Cochrane's house hasn't been egged. He doesn't have students swearing at him as he meets them walking across campus.

It doesn't seem to be too big

Cochrane is in his first year as athletics director at Cornell College. His previous job was Iowa Conference commission-

He's the guy most responsible for Cornell and Coe playing today at Cornell's Ash Park. That's right, today.

The oldest college football

rivalry west of the Mississippi River hasn't been played this early since 1974 when the rivals opened Midwest Conference play against each other.

The 118th game in this historic series, which began in 1894, opens Iowa Conference play. Coe holds a 62-51-4 edge.

"No, I haven't been given any guff about anything," Cochrane said, laughing. "I haven't heard (anyone say anything).

The Class 4A third-ranked Little Hawks were far from mistake-free, but they packed some punch on defense in a 21-7 victory over rival Iowa City West in the Battle for the Boot last night at Trojan Field.

'We just want to punch people in the mouth and be hardnosed," City High junior linebacker James Taylor said of the Little Hawks' defensive philoso-

City High (4-0) had its shutout streak snapped at seven quarters when West (0-4) converted a 4th-and-17 on a fourth-quarter touchdown march. Quarterback Tayler Bontrager capped the drive with a 1-yard TD run with 8 minutes, 28 seconds remaining, cutting the Little Hawks' lead to

Other than that, City High contained the West offense, led by the shifty dual-threat signalcaller Bontrager.



Xavier takes off after half, upends Kennedy as students celebrate

CEDAR RAPIDS - As student section chants go, this one leaned toward the unique

But there's never been anything business as usual in the 42nd Street rivalry between Cedar Rapids Xavier and Kennedy high schools.

"This is our street," the Xavier students chanted. "This is our street."

The Xavier Saints came out of the locker room for the second half with their motors at full throttle, outscored the Cougars 17-0 over the final two periods and shocked 4A eighth-ranked Kennedy, 31-13, in front of a standing-roomonly crowd that ringed Saints Field on a picture-perfect eve-

'We wanted it this week. We cared," said senior quarterback Steven Travis, who was making his first varsity start. "Coaches give us a packet every week and wrote on there in big block letters: 'Care.' So that's what it was.'

Xavier (2-2) took control in the third quarter when Travis came out and completed his first four passes for 59 yards as the Saints put 10 points on the board in the 12-minute frame. The first came on a 1yard touchdown plunge by Dylan Martin to cap a time consuming 65-yard drive and the final points were thanks to a 20-yard field goal from Mike Andries with 50.3 seconds remaining.

They put the game out of reach when Travis completed a 3-yard scoring pass to Ryan Sander early in the fourth quarter.

"It's a credit to our kids. They practiced hard all week and came out and played hard," Xavier Coach Duane Schulte said. "But give Kennedy credit, too. That was a hard-fought win. They really made us earn that.

Travis finished 7 for 18 for 127 yards and tailback Corey Reed rushed a yeoman's 27 times for 137 yards to pace the offense. But the Saints defense held what had been a prolific Kennedy offense to a minus-7 yards rushing, although the Cougars were 25 of 48 passing for 293 yards and two TDs.

"We want them to be perfect every play and the closest we can get to that, we hope good things happen for them, Xavier defensive coordinator Jim O'Connell said. "(Kennedy has) so many weapons and the first thing we always try to start out with is to try to stop the run.'

The Xavier defensive effort last night was led by Dan Thorsetienson, David Ryberg and a host of others.
