Jason Williams retires after 10 seasons in NBA

LOS ANGELES — Jason Williams announced his retirement Friday, ending his 10-year NBA career less than two months after signing with the Los Angeles Clippers.

Williams, who helped the Miami Heat to the NBA title in 2006, averaged 11.4 points, 6.3 assists and shot 39.6 percent from the floor in 679 games.

The point guard was drafted seventh overall pick in 1998 out of Florida by the Sacramento Kings and averaged 12.8 points and six assists as a rookie.

Williams joined the Memphis Grizzlies three years later, and in 2001-02 averaged 14.8 points per game.

Texans to play Colts at Reliant Stadium Oct. 5

HOUSTON - The Houston Texans will play their home opener against the Indianapolis Colts on Oct. 5 in hurricane-damaged Reliant Stadium with the roof open.



"Coach told us during practice the whole week that we'd be running a lot," Dawson said. "Their defense thought we were going to pass a lot.


It was certainly effective and complemented nicely Wyatt Suess's passing effort of 10 of 19 for 192 yards and two touchdowns.




