this year, just five have come back to advance, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.


It's been a bleak October for both Chicago teams. The Cubs lost their first two NL playoff games at home to the Los Angeles Dodgers.





No. 4 Warriors keep Trojans winless

After slow start, Washington comes on to topple West, 28-7

IOWA CITY — Cedar Rapids Washington is still undefeated without star Keenan Davis, but it wasn't easy last night against winless Iowa City West.

The fourth-ranked Warriors survived a slow start and a second-half threat from West in a 28-7 victory in high school football at West.

Washington running back Andre Dawson ran for 104 yards and two touchdowns, and quarterback Wyatt Suess threw for a score and ran for another.

Yards weren't easy early on for the Warriors (5-1), who didn't score until midway through the second quarter. But Washington but together three long scoring drives behind Suess and Dawson and controlled most of the second

'Lucky' Travis

CEDAR RAPIDS perfect world, Steven Travis would have been named the homecoming king at Cedar Rapids Xavier High School last night.

He did just about everything else for the Saints.

Travis ran for a 65-yard touchdown, passed for an 11yard score and intercepted two passes for the Saints in their gritty 17-10 victory over Dubuque Wahlert in a Mississippi Valley Conference football game.

His reaction?

"I just got lucky," he said. Lucky, perhaps, but good.

'Steven was up and down, to be honest," said Xavier Coach Duane Schulte. "The bottom line, he led his team to a victory.

The game was tied, 10-10, when Travis faked a handoff, circled to his left and raced 65 yards for the go-ahead score down the far sideline.

'It's just our guys doing their jobs and I got free," he said, saluting his blockers.

Wahlert quarterback Eric May completed 22 of 40 passes for 280 yards and a touchdown, but those two interceptions by Travis helped keep the Golden Eagles (2-4) away from the end zone most of the night.

Xavier grabbed a 7-3 edge on the touchdown pass from Travis to Hollingsworth, then Wahlert took a 10-7 lead on May's 16-yard strike to Nick Bautigan. Mike Andries tied the game, 10-10, with a 43-yard field goal for Xavier with 1.1 seconds left in the first half.

It stayed that way until Travis, playing only his third game at quarterback, broke loose for his 65-yard gallop with 4:40 left in the game.


