

CEDAR RAPIDS — The Cedar Falls Tigers rolled into Cedar Rapids Prairie last night with the top-ranked defense in the Mississippi Valley Confer-

Count on them to retain that status as the season moves into Week 9.

Led by linebackers Jeff Hanson, Aiden Brock and Jeff Conrad, the Class 4A sixthranked Tigers forced five turnovers — including four pass interceptions — and blanked the Hawks, 33-0, at cold and muddy John Wall Field. Cedar Falls (7-1) won its seventh straight since a season-opening loss to Cedar Rapids Washington and certainly appears to be playing its best football with the postseason less than two weeks away

"Both teams played hard and it's one of those games where there were a lot of turnovers and we got the best part of that early. That set the tempo for the game," veteran Cedar Falls Coach Pat Mitch-

ell said. Prairie fumbled the ball away on its second possession of the game, then quarterbacks Alex Hanna and Josh Purman each threw two interceptions as the game progressed. The turnovers gave the Tigers a sition and got three first-half

Cedar Falls and Prairie are assured of spots in the substate round of the postseason.

Cedar Falls finished with 312 yards of total offense through a nice mix of run and pass, but its defense was the story. Prairie mustered only 152 total yards of offense — 82 on the ground and 70 through the air. The Hawks' first three possessions ended with interceptions.

"We were ready to come out

here and get on them early," Conrad said. "It was a good game and we played very well. Our safeties were covering what they needed to. We did everything we needed to do and we came out with a win."

Mitchell loved the way his defense played while posting its fourth shutout.

We've played good defense all year long and again they played well tonight," he said. There are a lot of good players out there and they take a lot of pride in it.
