


"It's over," Phillies short-stop Jimmy Rollins said. "It's over, man.



sage "I got done with Detroit, and they said I was too small," he said. "Then I went to Buffalo, and they said I was too small and just didn't have the arm strength.'

He thought about NFL Europe and the Canadian Football League, but neither was appealing. Then he got an offer to become a graduate

assistant at Syracuse University, where he could get into coaching and work on a master's degree. He was sold.

'This came up (at Syracuse) and I was like, "Hey, I guess it's time to move on,' he said Saturday.

Sanders was no ordinary quarterback in college. He set the NCAA Division I FCS record for career accuracy by completing 69.59 percent of his passes at UNI by hitting 714 of 1,026 from 2004 through '07, a remarkable achievement.

He finished his career with Missouri Valley Conference records for career total offense (9,579 yards) and season accuracy (75.23 percent in 2007), and finished second in the Valley in career passing yards

(9,012) and TD passes (70) He set a bunch of school records while helping the Panthers compile a 35-15 record, including a trip to the national title game in 2005 and the No. 1 ranking in the country for six weeks in 2007. His career ended with a

39-27 loss to Delaware in the quarterfinals of the FCS playoffs after an 11-0 regular season. "It still hurts," he said.

Now he's Coach Sanders, with shorter hair ("I went for the clean-cut look") and a new perspective on the game. Syracuse is struggling at 1-6 overall and 0-3 in the Big East Conference, but he's getting an inside look at "big-time" college football and how another program is run.

He misses the action though. He'd love to run the scout-team offense at Syracuse, but that's not allowed. He breaks down films, puts scouting reports together, works on practice plans and films practices. "We stay busy," he said. Curt Bradley, a former UNI

football and baseball player, is a graduate assistant at Syracuse and helped Sanders get the job. They drove from Syracuse, N.Y., to Youngstown, Ohio, last Friday during an idle week to watch the Panthers play Youngstown State, then drove back Saturday night.

"We've got nothing else to do," he said. "We don't know too many people there.

Sanders visited with UNI coaches, players and fans, then stood on the sidelines and watched his former team post a 21-20 vic-

tory Last year's Panthers produced two NFL draft picks, the Payton Award runner-up (Sanders), the FCS Coach of the Year (Mark Farley) and beat Iowa



Northern Iowa did not have an opening on its staff for Sanders this year so it was time to move on, but don't be surprised if he returns to Cedar Falls in the near future and becomes a Panther again. "I'd love to," he said.

paign message is not openly endorsed by Iowa officials, who view the effort like an advertisement from a political action committee. Just a wink, a nod and mild support for a black-and-gold underground campaign.

"We are very quietly watching what's going on and taking some notes and doing our own planning, but the reality is we've got a big game on Saturday (at Illinois)," said Rick Klatt, Iowa's associate athletics director for external affairs. "So while administratively we've got some things we're thinking of doing, we simply can't put the cart before the horse. We've got a real important game on Saturday, so that's where our focus is.

Greene, a junior, is third nationally in rushing yards with 1,154 on 177 attempts, a 6.5 yard-per-carry average. He's rushed for more than 100 yards in every game and 10 touchdowns. Against Wisconsin two weeks ago, Greene ran for 217 yards and four scores and was Big Ten Offensive Player of the Week.

Some Iowa fans can't hide their enthusiasm for Greene. Michael Van Dyke dabbles in graphic artistry and came

The Little Hawks (10-0) advance to play Cedar Rapids Xavier (7-3) in a first-round game here Monday. City High blanked the Saints, 21-0, Sept. 12 at Bates Field.

CEDAR RAPIDS — They're called Nintendo numbers, and Cedar Rapids Washington put up some of them in its Class 4A postseason football game last night.

The Warriors were absolutely unstoppable offensively in a 62-14 substate romp over Muscatine at Kingston Stadium. It was a ridiculous video game-like display that tied the school record for points and would have made the best Madden gamer proud.

"Oh, yeah, I love Ninten-do," said Washington back Andre Dawson. "I play Madden every day.

It's hard to imagine Dawson coming up with better numbers on his PlayStation than what he and his teammates put up last night. Washington (9-1) racked up 631 yards, 462 on the ground, 10.7 yards per carry.

Dawson finished with 184 rushing yards and four touchdowns (one receiving) in a little over two quarters. Sophomore Alex Carr replaced him and added 165 and two TDs in his varsity debut.

'The offensive line really did a great job tonight," said Dawson, giving kudos to his main upfront guys Jordan Young, Matthew Huffer, Toby Ziemer, Matt Schrafer and Zach Patzwald. "Coach said that it's playoff time, and that we need to step up

a little bit. I think we sent a really big message out to the state that we're ready to play anybody.

"Andre has come out at the half of our last couple games," said Washington Coach Tony Lombardi. "We wanted to keep him healthy and fresh for the playoffs ... That ended up costing him the MVC rushing title, and I feel bad about that. (But) I think he's the best back in the MVC, and it was nice for him to be able to showcase

Washington, which plays at Dubuque Hempstead (6-4) in a 4A playoff game Mon-day night, rolled to a 48-14 halftime lead behind Dawson and quarterback Wyatt Suess, who had three touchdowns in the first half, two passing and one rushing.
