CEDAR RAPIDS — Cedar Rapids Kennedy let one lead slip through its fingers, and the Cougars were determined to avoid a repeat

So when they took a lead this time they grasped it with a visetight grip.

Less than a week removed from losing its opener in the final minutes, Kennedy kept churning out the points and thumped Cedar Rapids Jefferson, 56-14, in a Mississippi Valley Conference game last night at Kingston Stadium.

The Cougars squandered a double-digit lead last week to Linn-Mar and used that as motivation. Once they had a lead they added to it instead of relaxing
