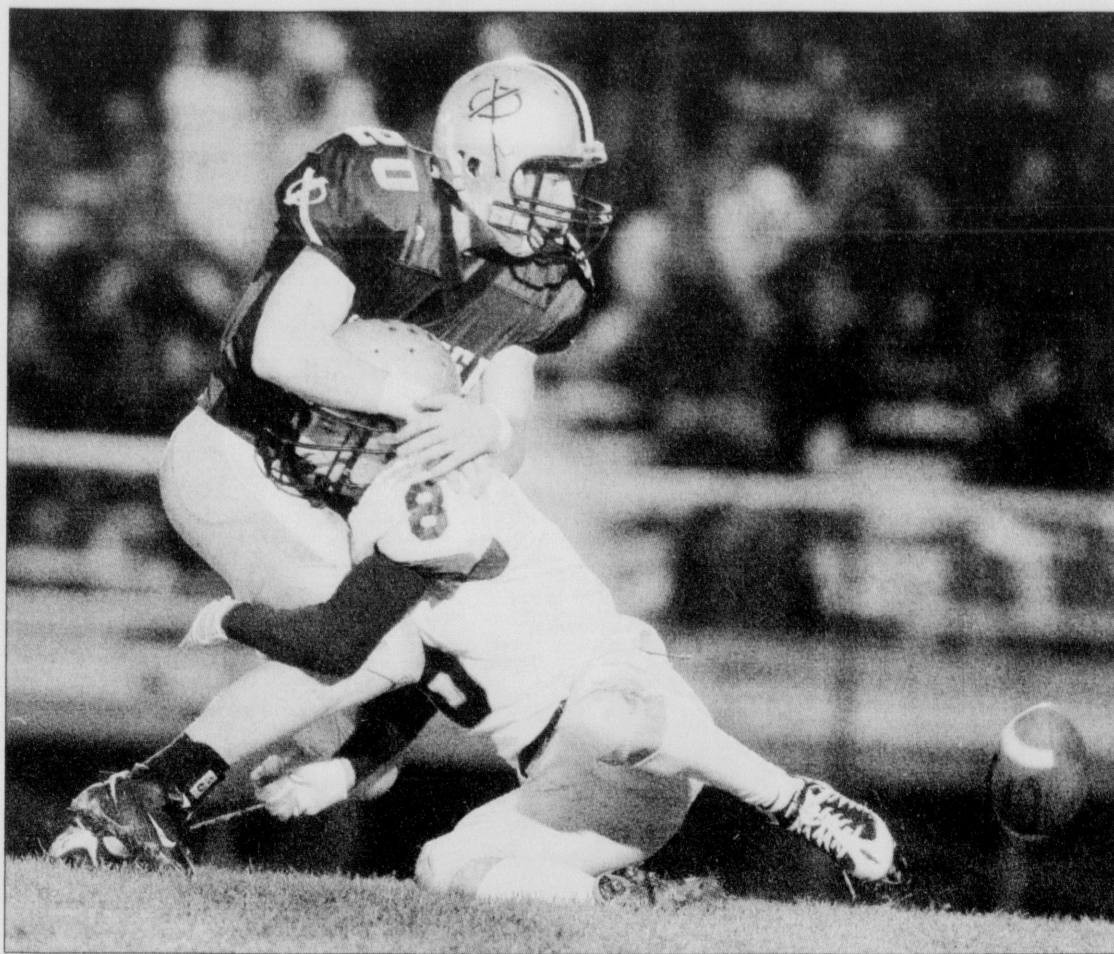

Late drive lets Hempstead slip past Kennedy, 17-13

Short punt sets up winning 46-yard drive

CEDAR RAPIDS — If you wanted defensive, smash-mouth football, cold Kingston Stadium was the place to be last night.

And if you wanted an exciting, last-second, come-from-behind victory, well, Kingston Stadium was warm to the task.

Dubuque Hempstead quarterback Matt Ehlers' 5-yard run with 32.8 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter led the Mustangs (6-2) to a 17-13 victory over Cedar Rapids Kennedy (3-5).

"It's like a dream. I'm going to have to look at the film to see what really happened there at the end," said Hempstead Coach Mark Ehlers. "Matt made a great cut. It was a big play."

The dreamlike drive started on the Kennedy 46 with 4:02 to play after an 18-yard punt by Nicholas Bruns.

The Cougars, who remain alive for a playoff berth, had taken a 13-10 lead on the strength of their kicking game as Erik Boyer booted field

goals of 47 and 29 yards, the latter with 5:42 to go. When Caleb Mare recorded his second interception of the game on Hempstead's next series to give Kennedy the ball at its 46, it appeared the home team would be able to pull out the win.

Alas, that was not meant to be as the Cougars were forced to punt, setting up the clinching 10-play, 46-yard drive.

Ehlers was proud of his players and complimentary to his opponents.

"It was a defensive struggle," he said. "These were two teams that were very well prepared. We persevered. They had us against the ropes in the fourth quarter. (Kennedy) is a heck of a football team. They only have lost to good teams."

Ehlers completed 12 of 15 passes but tossed two picks and had only 79 yards through the air. The Mustangs had 128 yards on the ground but needed 43 rushes to get that.

Kennedy quarterback Jed Haycraft, whose last-ditch pass fell incomplete in the end zone as time expired, was 10 of 16 for 114 yards. The Cougars' running game was held to 41 yards.

Second-half surge sparks C.R. Xavier

CEDAR RAPIDS

— Take that, brother.

Well, that's not exactly the way Joe Sayre put it last night. At least not publicly.

The Cedar Rapids Xavier quarterback threw two touchdown passes to help his team past Iowa City West, 35-10, last night at Saints Field. He has 10 this season, tying Dan Schmall for the school's season record, and surpassing his older brother, Mike, by one.

"That's news to me," Joe Sayre said. "No, it doesn't really mean anything to me. It's a team game."

That what Saints Coach Duane Schulte stressed after his team's fifth straight victory. Xavier (6-2) ends the regular season next week at

Cedar Rapids Prairie, and a victory would all but assure a home game in the substate round of the playoffs.

"I hope you don't write a whole lot just about (Sayre) because it took the whole team," Schulte said.

"It takes all of our offensive linemen and receivers. It takes everybody to get the ball across the goal line. It takes a defense being able to get you field position, and special teams that do their job, too."

Xavier got all of that in the second half, outscoring pesky West (3-5) by a 21-0 margin.

The Trojans' Alex Troester kicked a 31-yard field goal right before halftime to make it 14-10, but it was all Saints in the second half.

Ryan Sander caught a

third-down hitch pass on the opening possession of the third quarter and turned it into a 14-yard touchdown.

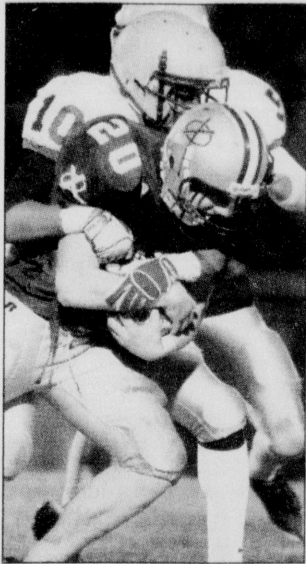
Fullback Dylan Martin scored on a 1-yard TD run late in the third, and tailback Pat Chizek on a 10-yarder early in the fourth.

Chizek had an 11-yard TD run in the first quarter and finished with 121 yards rushing.

"The holes were just there," Chizek said. "They're easy to see when they're right there in front of you. The line did great."

"We just told the seniors (at half) 'How do you want the last home game of your senior year to be?'" Schulte said. "That was it."

Top-ranked City High jumps on Wahawks early

IOWA CITY — Coach Dan Sabers says undefeated and top-ranked Iowa City High can still improve, but he can't squawk at the results.

His team has the right attitude for October, too.

Seniors A.J. Derby and Ellis Jordan were laughing and yelling with the rest of their huddled teammates after another impressive win last night in City High's final home game.

Before the first quarter ended, Derby and Jordan had each scored twice to help the Little Hawks cruise to a 47-14 victory over Waterloo West at Frank Bates Field.

"We took control of the game early like we wanted to," Sabers said, adding he liked the loose atmosphere surrounding his team with one game left next week before the postseason begins.

"They've always been that way."

City High (8-0) held Waterloo West to 71 yards in the first half and intercepted more passes than it allowed to be completed until midway through the fourth quarter.

Derby scored on a 2-yard plunge 16 seconds

into the first quarter following a long kickoff return by Jordan, which looked like he might take all the way before slipping and fumbling at the 20-yard line.

Jordan then ran for a 2-yard touchdown run of his own, set up by an interception by City High's John Chelf.

On Waterloo West's ensuing drive, Jordan intercepted a pass and returned it 29 yards for a score with 6:46 left in the first quarter.

Just over four minutes later, Derby scampered to a 48-yard touchdown. The University of Iowa commitment followed that with a 20-yard pass to David Koehnke with 10:21 left in the third quarter, a nice throw on the run after a rollout to the right sideline.

Derby didn't play in the second half and finished with 71 rushing yards on six carries. He completed just the one touchdown pass on five attempts and was intercepted once after a tipped pass.

Waterloo West (2-6) added second-half touchdowns on a Mike Steimel 12-yard run and Anthony Patterson's 43 punt return.

North Fayette rolls past Cascade in battle of unbeatens

In a battle of unbeatens, North Fayette's Tanner Mork had 332 yards rushing and three touchdowns, while Tom Nesvik rushed for two touchdowns as North Fayette (8-0) clinched the Class A District 4 title with a 40-19 win over Cascade (7-1) last night at Cascade.

Connor Redmond tossed two touchdown passes to Jesse Beringer for the Cougars.

HIGHLAND 28, NEW LONDON 0 — At Highland, the Husky defense forced six turnovers to post the shutout. Riley Kleopfer tossed three touchdown passes, and Dakota Flory had three touchdowns, two receiving and one rushing to pace Highland (2-5) to the win over New London (1-6).

OLIN 41, EAST CENTRAL 32 — Devin French scored four touchdowns

last night with two rushing touchdowns, one kick return, and one interception for a touchdown for host Olin (1-7).

CLAYTON RIDGE 67, ALBURNETT 0 — Clayton Ridge dominated this game with 508 total yards holding Alburnett to 14 total yards.

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Focused Boyle awaits Wartburg

CEDAR RAPIDS
—Brad Boyle missed a practice recently for the Coe College football team. The starting quarterback didn't have an injury and wasn't sick.

Try an elongated lab for a biology class instead. Ah, NCAA Division III.

Do you think that's something Ricky Stanzi worries about at Iowa?

"Probably not," Boyle said. "That'd be nice not to."

The absence didn't affect him much. Boyle, a sophomore from New Sharon, goes into Coe's game today at Wartburg second to Wartburg's Nick Yordi in Iowa Conference passing and total offense.

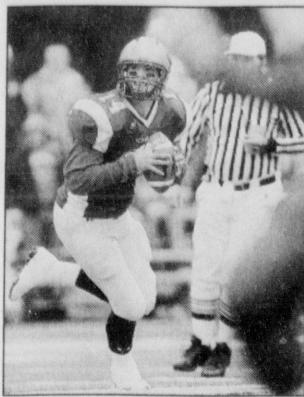
Boyle is completing 65 percent of his throws and has eight touchdown passes in five games. He has yet to throw an interception.

"I don't like to talk about that," Boyle said. "At the end of the year, if I don't have any, I'll be happy to talk about it."

Coe Coach Steve Staker, while knocking on wood in his office, wasn't afraid to talk about Boyle's accuracy and ability to stay away from turnovers. A lot of it is the way offensive coordinator Tyler Staker mentors him, Staker said.

"(Boyle) knows that if he doesn't have something there, he needs to either run with it or get rid of the football," Staker said. "Tyler has drilled that into his head."

Boyle wasn't happy with his performance last

month in Coe's only loss, 24-6, at Central. He completed 16 of 31 throws for 189 yards.

He bounced back the next week to torch Dubuque to the tune of 20-for-25 passing for 204 yards and three TDs. It's another big game for the Kohawks today, and Boyle is determined to do well.

"I feel like I let the team down against Central," he said. "I didn't play my best game, and I know that kind of hurt our chances of winning. But I do think that was a good learning experience, too. It was my first big pressure game, and now I've gotten it out of the way."
