Utley blasts 2 homers as Phillies capture Game 5, 8-6

— Put those parade plans on hold, New York. The Phillies are coming back.

MAJOR LEAGUE BASEBALL

Chase Utley hit two home runs to raise his World Series total to a record-tying five, backing Cliff Lee once again as Philadelphia staved off elimination with an 8-6 victory last night and set up a Game 6 for the first time since 2003.

Utley hit a go-ahead, three-run homer in the first inning off A.J. Burnett and added a solo shot in the seventh to join Reg- A-Rod chased him with gie Jackson as the only players to hit five home runs in a single World

Philadelphia closed within three games to two by replicating its winning formula from the opener, when Utley hit two solo homers and Lee pitched a six-hitter. Raul Ibanez set off fireworks from the Liberty Bell one last time, adding a second solo shot in the seventh off Phil Coke that made it 8-2.

Lee gave up a runscoring single to Alex Rodriguez in the first inning but settled in until

a two-run double in the eighth. Robinson Cano drove in Rodriguez with a sacrifice fly, and New York gave Philadelphia a scare when Jorge Posada doubled and Hideki Matsui singled at the start of the ninth against Ryan Madson.

Derek Jeter hit into a run-scoring double play, Johnny Damon singled and Madson struck out slumping Mark Teixeira for the save.

The Yankees, who have won the Series all eight previous times they took a 3-1 lead, will try

to close out title No. 27 on Wednesday night at home. Game 3 winner Andy Pettitte is expected to come back on three days' rest and face Game 2 loser Pedro Martinez.

Pitching on short rest didn't work well for Burnett, who had been 4-0 previously in his career on three days' off and kept the Phillies off balance in Game 2.

He kept falling behind batters and allowed six runs, four hits and four walks in two-plus innings, his shortest start since his first outing in



Speaking of rolling, the Saints (9-2) won their eighth straight game. They'll travel to Clinton (11-0) — a 37-23 winner over Cedar Falls - in a quarterfinal Friday.

IOWA CITY — Iowa City High needed a jolt midway through the second quarter last night. As the Little Hawks have done all year, they called on quarterback A.J. Derby and wide receiver John Chelf to provide them with one.

With a seven-point lead and facing a second-and-6 at the Dubuque Hempstead 41, the Little Hawks ran a

play-action fake against the boxed-in Hempstead defense. Derby then hit Chelf up the right sideline, past Hempstead cornerback Alex Brown for a 41-yard touchdown pass and a two-touchdown lead. The top-ranked Little Hawks maintained its momentum to beat the Mustangs, 24-7, at Bates Field in a Class 4A state first-round

"We felt we could get them over the top on a play action,

so we just called it," Chelf said. "A.J. threw a good ball over the defender right into my hands and right in the end zone.

"They kind of switch up their defenses but he (Brown) was playing up tight," Derby said. "We ran a play action and got it over the top and got a touchdown.

Hempstead stacked the line to stop the Little Hawks' running attack, which led to

the play call and, ultimately, the touchdown.

"Obviously, we're a power team," Iowa City High Coach Dan Sabers said. "If teams are going to (stack the line), hey, we've got John Chelf out there one-on-one against guys. John's pretty good. So we feel very fortunate to have that situation, and A.J. throws a deep ball as good as
