



Warriors' Tann turns it around

By Jeff Johnson The Gazette **EDAR RAPIDS** On a seasonopening night feeling way more like summer than fall, there couldn't have been a more appropriately named kid to make a game-changing play than Tann.

Junior safety David Tann's 32-yard interception return a for touchdown in the third quarter was the highlight of a strong defensive performance that lifted Cedar Rapids Washington past Cedar Rapids Prairie, 41-21, last night at Kingston Stadium.

Washington's usually high-octane offense wasn't all that high octane until late, although it didn't need to be considering the guys on the other side of the ball. That included Tann, who deftly stepped in front of an intended receiver over the middle, picked off a Chaz Boots pass and negotiated his way to the end zone to create hard-fought separation for his team

The ensuing extra point put Washington up 14-3 midway through the third. A fourthdown stop at midfield and interception by defensive lineman Toby Ziemer led to an avalanche of offense, as the teams combined for six touchdowns and 42 points in the final 12 and a half minutes.

Alex Carr was anticipated to be the next terrific Washington tailback and he definitely didn't disappoint. The

Saints' Schulte hits 100

EDAR RAPIDS come to the Century Club, Duane Schulte. Class 4A third-ranked Cedar Rapids Xavier repeatedly took advantage of a short field in the first half and clobbered 42nd Street rival Cedar Rapids Kennedy, 35-7, in a Mississippi Valley Conference battle last

night at Saints Field. The victory was the 100th of Schulte's career, now in his 17th season.

"I've been fortunate enough


and outstanding players," Schulte said. "And I'm fortunate to have a wife like mine (Sherry) who more or less raised our four kids. Schulte is 100-62 overall,

including 76-48 at Xavier. This one came surprisingly easy.

The Saints (1-0) had the lead barely two minutes into the game, extended it to 14-0 soon after, and built a 28-0 halftime advantage.

Four players scored the four first-half touchdowns. Momentum swung Xavier's



'I was a little nervous beforehand," he said. "But the line came out and did their jobs, the receivers ran great routes. The defense gave us great field position. It made my job pretty easy.

Kennedy drove to the Xavier 15 before Nicholas Bruns missed on a field-goal attempt early in the second quarter, then Xavier went back to work, driving 80 yards for another score. Pat Chizek did the honors from 5 yards out.

"Big-Play" Atwater would fit. The junior quarterback produced plenty of big plays, powering Linn-Mar past Cedar Rapids Jefferson, 43-15, in a Mississippi Valley Conference prep football game at Armstrong Field.

Atwater threw for 275 yards and three touchdowns and rushed for 163 yards and a score. The "big-play" moniker has a good ring to it.

Little Hawks open with 48-6 rout of Dubuque Senior

Dubuque Telegraph Herald DUBUQUE - Through one week of the regular season, at least, the newlook Iowa City High Little Hawks bear a striking resemblance to their championship predecessors.

With just eight of 22 starters back from the team that won the Class 4A state title last fall, City High is a team of intrigue in 2010. These Little Hawks passed their first test with flying colors, demolishing Dubuque

Senior, 48-6, last night at Dalzell Field.

On a team with many unknowns, one certainty for the Little Hawks is their offensive line. That unit, which returns three starters, absolutely dominated last night's game. Iowa City rushed for 299 yards and racked up 21 first downs.

The Little Hawks led by 20 points after one quarter and 34 at half-

Senior running back Ronald Thompson followed the punishing blocks of an offensive line that averages 241 1/2 pounds. That's 20 pounds heavier than the average of Senior's defensive line. Thompson rushed for 92 yards and a score while quarterback Andrew McNulty carried the ball three times for 91 yards

"The offensive line was great. They was blocking for me perfect, and I hit the holes hard," Thompson said.

The Little Hawks' defensive line was pretty

stout as well. Senior, which is trying to break a string of three consecutive one-victory seasons, barely inched across the 100-yard mark for total offense in the game and was just 1-for-9 converting third downs

All in all, not a bad debut for the new-look Little

"It's great, because it's definitely a different roster," Thompson said. "We've got to just go out and play our game and dominate."
