#### USA starts slowly, finally routs Tunisia

ISTANBUL - Eric Gordon scored 21 points and the United States pulled away after a sluggish first half to beat Tunisia, 92-57, Thursday in its final game of pool play at the world championship.

The Americans sleepwalked through most of the early start, leading the winless team by only four points early in the third quarter before turning it into a rout over the final 15 minutes.

The top seed from Group B, the United States (5-0) will play Monday in the knockout round against Angola, the No. 4 seed from Group A.

# lowa bumps Ferentz to \$3.675 million

IOWA CITY — Quite the week for Iowa Athletics Director Gary Barta.

#### **IOWA FOOTBALL**

Wednesday, Barta won a race with Wisconsin and Athletics Director Barry Alvarez to secure a season-finale rivalry with Big Ten newcomer Nebraska. Thursday, Barta, who turns 47 Saturday, made Kirk Ferentz the highest-paid coach in the Big Ten Conference.

Ferentz is expected

to sign a deal today that Barta called "a strong statement.

The contract is worth \$3.675 million a year

and runs through the 2020 season. This replaces the July 2009 contract that paid Ferentz just more than \$3 million

yearly through 2015. It also makes Ferentz one of the nation's highest-paid coaches

Ohio State Coach Jim Tressel signed an extension in March that paid him roughly \$3.5 million a year, making him the highest-paid Big Ten coach. Tressel is trying to guide Ohio State to its sixth consecutive Big Ten title this season.

#### Fast start, big finish mark opening victory

MES - If this is what Iowa State's offense can do on a consistent basis, this could be a fun team to watch

And the supposedly shaky defense wasn't too shabby

The Cyclones piled up 402 yards of offense last night and looked strong in beating Northern Illinois in a seasonopening 27-10 victory. The pace slowed after halftime, and the game got close before ISU pulled away late front of 43,116 football-starved fans at Jack Trice Stadium.

Austen Arnaud looked every bit the improved quarterback that's been promised. The senior completed 27 of 36 passes for 265 yards - and to eight receivers - and was in command of the offense from the start.


He also had two ugly interceptions and some mental mistakes Rhoads didn't like

"We played really hard, and I'm happy with the result," said Tommy Feller, who collected a couple of sacks.



market and he's certainly proven that he's very valuable in that marketplace," Barta said. "This contract will make him the highest-paid coach in the Big Ten Conference. The 10 years is as strong of a statement as any-

Ferentz begins his 12th season as Iowa's head coach Saturday against Eastern Illinois. Last season, the Hawkeyes finished 11-2 and won the Orange Bowl.

Almost annually, Ferentz, who spent six seasons as an NFL assistant coach, is linked to jobs in the NFL or other BCS schools. Barta hopes this deal leads to a string of rumor-free offseasons.

"Every year since I've been here and certainly every year before I arrived, he gets the opportunities," Barta said. "People approach him, whether it's in the NFL or other institutions, to consider going somewhere

"I'd love for when those calls come and, as he has in the past, have him say, 'I like Iowa, I'm staving at Iowa.' There are no guarantees, but certainly this is a strong statement.'

Recruits get the message. Iowa is one of only 11 FBS programs to have the same full-time coaching staff in 2010 for a third straight year.

The first thing I saw off the bat was the coaches. They're a bunch of great guys," said Cole Fisher, a 2011 linebacker

recruit from Omaha Millard North High School. "Also, it's been the same guys forever now. There isn't going to be any changing or anything like that. It's comforting to not have to worry about anything like that. The guy

who's recruiting you is

going to be your coach." Ferentz wasn't available for comment Thursday, but said in a news release, "I am grateful to the University of Iowa and thrilled to begin my 12th season as head coach and 21st overall with this

world class institution.' 'He's had many opportunities to leave and he's proven over and over again that this is the place he enjoys," Barta said. "There are no guarantees that he would never leave, but certainly we're trying to make a statement and together we agreed on this contract. We're excited about it.

Local reaction was predictably positive.

"If anybody is worth it, he's worth it," said former Marion High football coach Dave Messerli. "He's a class guy.

Former Hawkeye Bill Happel of Hiawatha, whose last season was in 1985, echoed that.

"He's worth every penny," Happel said last night. "The money the program brings in more than pays for his salary, and I think it's worth it to have a great football program.

All-state running back Jer Garman ran for 137 yards on 19 carries. His 17-yard touchdown with 10:25 left gave the Lions a 17-8 lead.

Kennedy (0-2) drove to the Linn-Mar 14 on the next drive, but Aaron Hunter picked off a fourth-and-24 pass from Jed Haycraft - intended for Division-I recruit Christian French — near the goal line.

French is 6-foot-6, Hunter is "5-8 with my cleats on.'

"He's tough to defend. He's a big target," Hunter said. "As long as you don't let him behind you, you have a chance.'

Nicholas Bruns' 32yard field goal with 2:37 to play got the Cougars within six points, but they never got the ball back.

The game was scoreless most of the first half. merman hit a 35-yard field goal with 23 seconds left in the half for all of the pre-intermission scor-

Mark Atwater's 2-yard run on the first possession of the second half made it 10-0, but the Cougars quickly countered.

French caught a lob pass that was bobbled by a Linn-Mar defender and took it to the Lions 11. Three plays later, Rossi Adams scored on a 4-yard

Anthony Crawley bobbled the PAT snap, then alertly outran the coverage to the corner of the end zone to bring Kennedy within 10-8.

The Lions host Dubuque Wahlert next week; Kennedy faces Cedar Rapids Washington at Kingston.
