Solon marches on in Class 3A rout

SOLON - The march for four continues.

Three-time Class 2A state champion Solon knocked off Grinnell, 31-7, last night in a 3A secondround prep football playoff game.

The cliche rang true — the game was closer than the final score indicated.

Grinnell opened the scoring with a 27-yard touchdown pass from running back Jordan Fersh to Dylan Gretzky on its first possession.

From that point on, however, it was all Solon.

"We knew all along with Grinnell coming in they would be a very physical team," Solon Coach Kevin Miller said. "We played them two weeks ago, so we knew a little bit about them. We knew we'd be in for a tough night.

Solon won the regular-season meeting, 17-10, Oct. 22.

The Spartans' offense was led

by quarterback J.J. Hanus, who rushed for 88 yards and passed for 66. He scored on a 32-yard run late in the first to tie the game at 7-7

J.J. was on tonight, distributing the ball and running the offense the way we needed to get going,' Miller said.

Defensively, the Spartans shut down the Tigers, holding them to 226 yards total offense, Grinnell

Coach Jim Dunne said that was the difference.

"We couldn't get our offense going against that defense," he said, 'and we had some late turnovers that really hurt us.

They made some defensive adjustments and we weren't able to get our offense going.'

Solon had four interceptions last night, including one returned 57 yards by Brian Jedlicka. He also scored on a 12-yard run in the third that put Solon up, 17-7.

'We were playing a zone and the ball came right to me," Jedlicka said of the interception. "I saw an opening to the left and got some great blocks and was able to get it

Solon (10-1) has another rematch next Monday, this time with Williamsburg.

"We know all about Williamsburg," Miller said. "They are wellcoached and very physical. We expect it to be a great game.'

Williamsburg takes shootout with CCA

Williamsburg prepared for a state playoff football game with the goal of scoring 10 times. For some, that might be lofty yet unattainable motivation. For the Raiders, it was realized by game's end last Monday night.

Seventh-ranked Williamsburg racked up nine touchdowns and a field goal to trounce Clear Creek Amana, 65-35, in the second round of the Class 3A state playoffs.

"That's all we talked about was getting 10 scores," Williamsburg Coach Curt Ritchie said. Thought it was crazy at the time, but it was something our kids really bought into it.

The Raiders dominated from the outset with an Austin Hilligas interception and a Kelly O'Rourke 11-vard touchdown run. Williamsburg scored three times in the opening quarter and added four more in the second.

Brett Waughop gave the Raiders a 13-0 lead with a 7-yard TD run, and the lead blossomed to 27-0 with Waughop's 3-yard plunge with 8:46 to go in the first half.

After Clear Creek got on the board on a 76-yard touchdown pass from Dillon Villhauer to Nash Stopko, Waughop answered by going 57 yards on the Raiders' next play from scrimmage.

Waughop, who carried only four times in the second half as the Raiders played reserves, rushed

"It all starts up front with the linemen, Waughop said. "They got a lot of blocks and I was able to hit the holes and get in the secondary quickly.

O'Rourke hit Cody VanDee for a 20-yard TD pass to cap a 64-yard, 8-play drive to open the second half that put Williamsburg up 55-14. O'Rourke rushed for two touchdowns and threw for one, posting 134 yards passing and 13 on the ground. A Tim Jones 41-yard field goal and a Bryan McDonald 1-yard TD run with 9:43 to play gave Williamsburg its 10

"It doesn't surprise me we scored 10 tonight, linemen Austin Blythe said. "We played a great game. CCA has a good team. It was a good physical game, and that's what we like to play.'

Williamsburg advanced to the quarterfinals to face Solon (10-1), which beat Grinnell, 31-7, in the second round. Solon beat the Raiders, 22-7, Oct. 8. Now it stands in the way of a trip to the UNI-Dome.

"It's great," Blythe said. "They handed us our only loss of the year so far. We're going to have great preparation. Solon is a great team. .. We're going to have to play like we did tonight."



EDEN PRAIRIE, Minn. (AP) — Just four weeks ago, Randy Moss gushed about returning to Minnesota. He felt fortunate to return to his first team and was looking forward to seeing those purple No. 84 jerseys again. So much for the happy reunion.

After three disappointing losses in four games, Vikings players confirmed Monday that Coach Brad Childress informed them during a team meeting that the wide receiver had been let go. The move had not been made official with the league but Moss' agent, Joel Segal, said he's been in contact with Minnesota and the delay was "merely a technical thing," he said in an email.

The NFL Network first reported the struggling Vikings (2-5) had waived the six-time Pro Bowler less than a month after acquiring him from New England for a third-round draft pick. The cut came one day after Moss' rant following a 28-18 loss the Patriots, during which he was wistful about his days in New England and critical of the Vikings for not taking his game-planning advice.

It was another shocker in a tumultuous season for a team that began the year with Super Bowl aspirations. Childress and other Vikings officials didn't respond to messages seeking confirmation of the decision.

About an hour before the news came out, Childress took 12 consecutive questions during his regular news conference about Moss, his effort and his mindset in response to a rant by Moss following Sunday night's 28-18 loss to the Patriots.

Moss, who was fined \$25,000 last week for failing to cooperate with the media and make himself regularly available for interviews, stepped to the podium after the game but announced he wouldn't take any questions. He repeatedly expressed admiration for Coach Bill Belichick and his former team and criticized the Vikings for not taking enough of his game-planning advice.

Manning leads Colts to win over Houston

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) Peyton Manning threw for two touchdowns and Mike Hart ran for a career-high 84 yards as the Indianapolis Colts held on for a 30-17 victory over Houston last night at Lucas Oil Stadium.

Indianapolis has won three straight and the defending AFC champs have sole possession of the AFC South lead for the first time this season. The Colts also evened the season series with Houston (4-3) despite playing with a makeshift offense that was without All-Pro tight end Dallas Clark, receiver Austin Collie and running back Joseph Addai. Manning was 26 of 45

for 268 yards.

Matt Schaub struggled early, finishing 22 of 38 for 201 yards with one TD and one interception for Houston.

The Colts built a 17-3 halftime lead and countered Houston punch for punch in the second half.
