

IOWA CITY — Dan Sabers' postgame words to his Iowa City High football team said everything.

'You are the best team in the MVC. Sabers said in typical raspy voice to a bunch of whoops and hollers. about that.

No question at all. A lightning-quick start and devastating ground game lifted the No. 2 Little Hawks to a 49-28 victory over No. 3 Cedar Falls in a Class 4A playoff quarterfinal last night at Bates Field.

A lot of people were looking forward to this battle of Mississippi Valley Conference divisional champions, but it wasn't much of a battle. City High (12-0) scored two touchdowns in the first 29 seconds.



The Gazette CEDAR RAPIDS Cedar Rapids Kennedy played another splendid

defensive game. But Bettendorf's defense was even better.

The fourth-ranked Bulldogs held Kennedy to 48 yards through the first three quarters and prevailed, 14-7, in a Class 4A quarterfinal football game last night at Kingston Stadium.

"Hats off to them," said Kennedy quarterback Jed Haycraft. We tried to run, and it didn't work. We tried to pass, and we had some success, but it was just a little too late.

Bettendorf (12-0) will face No. 2 Iowa City High (12-0) in a semifinal at the UNI-Dome next Friday. Kennedy


saw a six-game winning streak come to an end and retired at 7-5.

"All we can do now is look back at the good things we've done (the past few weeks)," Kennedy's Christian French said. "You just have to take this for what it is and accept the loss.

This was the third straight low-scoring affair the Cougars endured. They beat Cedar Rapids Xavier and North Scott in the first two rounds by scores of 11-7 and 13-7.

LISBON - It was a little deja vu for the Lisbon Lions and WACO




