

He's three shots back of leader Troy Matteson after the first round.



An extremely Regal moment

IOWA CITY - A huge matchup turned into just as big a mismatch.

Iowa City Regina took on and then took down rival Solon to win a battle of defending state championship football teams. The Class 2A secondranked Regals used big plays

from a potent rushing offense to handle 3A second-ranked Solon, 35-9, last night at Regina High School.

Regina (2-0) extended its winning streak to 16 games. Solon, which won the 3A title in 2010 after winning three straight 2A titles, has lost twice since the 2006 2A state championship — both at the

hands of the Regals.

Regina showed big-play ability, scoring at light speed. It built a 21-3 halftime lead on three scoring drives of four plays or less.

The opening driving started from good field position, thanks to a kickoff return into Solon territory, and the final drive of the half was set up

by a George Sehl interception when he grabbed an overthrown pass by Spartan quarterback J.J. Hanus.

The Regals rolled 46 yards in four plays with bookend Jacob Vollstedt runs. Vollstedt scored on a 6-yard run after quarterback Nate Streb scur-




