CEDAR RAPIDS — The Yankees had the M&M brothers. Last night Cedar Rapids Kennedy put a twist on that and gave fans the H&H

With two touchdowns each, running backs Trevor Heitland and Alexander Hillyer rushed for 77 and 111 yards, respectively, as Kennedy shut out Cedar Rapids Jefferson, 32-0, on a night when the press box at Kingston Stadium was named after legendary radio icon Bob Brooks.

The Cougars drew first blood when they capped a methodical eight-play, 60-yard drive with Heitland running from 9 yards out for a 7-0 lead with 6:06 left to play in the

The Cougars came out strong in the second quarter, taking advantage of the good field position given to them caused by two bad snaps on punts and turned them into three touchdowns and a safety in a span of 6:30. Included was a 25-yard scamper from Hillyer to put the score at 30-0 going into halftime.

Another bad snap on a punt gave the Cougars a second safety in the four quarter to compete the


said. "We have a lot of work to do in getting ready for those (final three games).'


