Cougars stymie Jefferson, 32-0

CEDAR RAPIDS — The Yankees had the M&M brothers. Last night Cedar Rapids Kennedy put a twist on that and gave fans the H&H show.

With two touchdowns each, running backs Trevor Heitland and Alexander Hillyer rushed for 77 and 111 yards, respectively, as Kennedy shut out Cedar Rapids Jefferson, 32-0, on a night when the press box at Kingston Stadium was named after legendary radio icon Bob Brooks.

The Cougars drew first blood when they capped a methodical eight-play, 60-yard drive with Heitland running from 9 yards out for a 7-0 lead with 6:06 left to play in the first quarter.

The Cougars came out strong in the second quarter, taking advantage of the good field position given to them caused by two bad snaps on punts and turned them into three touchdowns and a safety in a span of 6:30. Included was a 25-yard scamper from Hillyer to put the score at 30-0 going into halftime.

Another bad snap on a punt gave the Cougars a second safety in the four quarter to compete the scoring at 32-0.

Kennedy also used a stellar defensive attack, putting eight or nine players in the box for most of the game, and limited the J-Hawks to -38 yards in the first half.

The Cougars finished with sec-

ond sacks, including two by Logan Letellier, and limited the J-Hawks to 38 yards total for the game.

The Cougars evened their record at 3-3, and the J-Hawks dropped to 0-6.

Atwater finds Henry again, Linn-Mar rolls

MARION — It was the Mark Atwater to Andy Henry show last night. The Linn-Mar Lions continue to show why they are among the state's elite high school football teams by defeating Dubuque Senior, 41-7, in front of a large homecoming crowd at Linn-Mar.

Atwater and Henry connected for three touchdown passes in the first half while the Lions built a commanding 34-0 halftime edge. Henry's touchdowns were from 19, 13 and 35 yards in helping the Lions move to 6-0 for the season.

He said those scores were the result of a team effort.

"Mark threw some great balls, and the line did a good job blocking," he said. "We were all on the same page with our passing game tonight."

Atwater continues to be impressive. He was 10 of 14 passing for 223 yards and four touchdowns.

Mitch Wantock led the way in rushing with 149 yards on nine carries and one touchdown. He also caught an Atwater aerial for another score.

Linn-Mar Coach Bob Forsyth said he's happy with the position his team is in right now.

"Our goal was to be undefeated at this point in the season, with three tough games left," he
