Maquoketa rips Marion

MARION — Maquoketa had a sluggish start in its regular-season finale last night against Marion at Thomas Park.

But it didn't take the Cardinals long to get things straightened out in a 31-7 victory. The state's No. 8-ranked team in Class 3A found itself tied 7-7 with the Indians late in the first quarter before quarterback Chase Coakley took control.

He threw for 186 yards and a score in the first half as Maquoketa grabbed a 31-7 lead at the break. Neither team scored in the second half as the two teams combined for three turnovers.

The Cardinals (8-1, 6-0 3A-5) posted the first unbeaten district record in school history and did it behind Coakley.

It looked like it might be a Cardinal rout early when Perry Hawks recovered a snap over the punter's head in the first quarter for a score. Marion came back and tied it on a Colton Storla 6-yard run, but from then on it was all Cardinals.

Coakley twice passed Maquoketa to the goal line where Craig Johnson, who finished with 87 yards on 14 carries, capped off the drives with short TD runs. Coakley's lone TD pass was a 6-yard strike to Jonathan Bopes.

Marion (4-5, 2-5) started 4-1, but lost its last four games to miss the playoffs. Storla had a strong second half, closing his career with 123 yards on 33 carries. He was forced to play some quarterback from the shotgun after starting Cale Cannoy, one of 11 Indian seniors playing his final home game, left with a shoulder injury.

Cancer claims career coach Stamp at 65

LISBON — Gary Stamp was granted another season to coach. Another vacation. More miles to run. More time.

"Life's a journey, and softball's a journey," Stamp said in July after his softball team from Mount Vernon High School lost to Solon in a Class 3A regional final.

"It's going to hurt tomorrow, and the next day, and next week ... but this season has been a joyous ride."

Stamp, who coached 42 years at 12 spots, died

at MD Anderson Cancer Center in Houston at 1:45 p.m. Friday of complications from lung cancer. He was 65. He was diagnosed March 9, despite being a non-smoker.

"I won't remember how he died, as much as I'll remember how he lived," said Bud Legg, information director for the Iowa High School Athletic Association. "He had a perspective and if all

coaches had it, it would be a better world."

Through last winter, Stamp could not shake bad health. His appetite was poor. He was treated for bronchitis, then pneumonia. But his condition worsened.

In early March, a few weeks after he served as an official at the state wrestling tournament, he was diagnosed with lung cancer. A week later, it was discovered it was in its most advanced stage (Stage IV) and had spread to his bones and lymph nodes. He underwent treatment at MD Ander-

son, then returned home. Meanwhile, a drug named Tarceva, a chemotherapy pill that combats lung cancer without major side effects, seemed to be working.

From April into September, Stamp's condition improved. He returned to coach the Mustangs to a 32-7 record. They finished one game short of the state tournament after advancing in

2009 and 2010.

An avid jogger before his illness, Stamp was told by doctors during his original diagnosis he would not run again. Sept. 17, he completed a 5K road race at Coe College, winning the 65-and-under men's age division in 33:24.

But soon after that, it was clear that cancer was on the move again in Stamp's body. Oct. 7, Tait Stamp wrote at his father's Caring Bridge Web page that it has spread to his bones and his liver.

Beckman dances past S. Winn for district title

DYERSVILLE — Dyersville Beckman met at midfield, formed one big circle and did the "Hokey Pokey," calling it their end-of-season ritual.

After last night, they may want to refer to it as the championship dance.

Eighth-ranked Beckman trounced No. 7 South Winneshiek to capture the Class 2A District 4 title with a 37-0 victory at Beckman Field.

Beckman, South Winn and North Fayette had 6-1 district records but the points system left Beckman needing to win by at least a field goal for the district's top seed.

"We didn't want to settle for anything less than first," Beckman quarterback Connor Golden said. "We knew we had to beat them by three points, so that's why every extra point was crucial. Everything we did tonight was crucial."

The Blazers (8-1, 6-1) were focused all week, knowing a strong performance was needed against South Winn (8-1, 6-1).

"We practiced really hard this week," Beckman wideout Ty Troutman said. "We had probably one of our best weeks of practice. We just came out firing tonight."

Golden ended up firing to Troutman and wide receiver Robbie Anstoetter to light up the South

Winn defense.

With the Blazers owning a 2-0 lead after the opening quarter, Golden hit Anstoetter on a pair of touchdowns to give Beckman a 16-0 lead at halftime. Anstoetter made an over-the-head catch while stumbling back, regained his feet and turned up the sideline, reaching for the pylon with a defender draped over him for a 15-yard TD with 3:55 left in the second quarter.

After Beckman held

the Warriors on a three-and-out series, the pair connected on a similar play from 33 yards out just 1:20 before the break. The play worked again for a 42-yard TD to make the score 30-0 in the final minutes of the third quarter.

Golden had 239 yards passing and five TDs. Anstoetter and Troutman took each of their receptions for touchdowns.

CEDAR RAPIDS — Cedar Rapids Kennedy may have had the most popular football team in the state last night.

Not only were Cougars fans pulling for their boys, so were teams and fans of a bunch of other schools. With all that support, how could they lose?

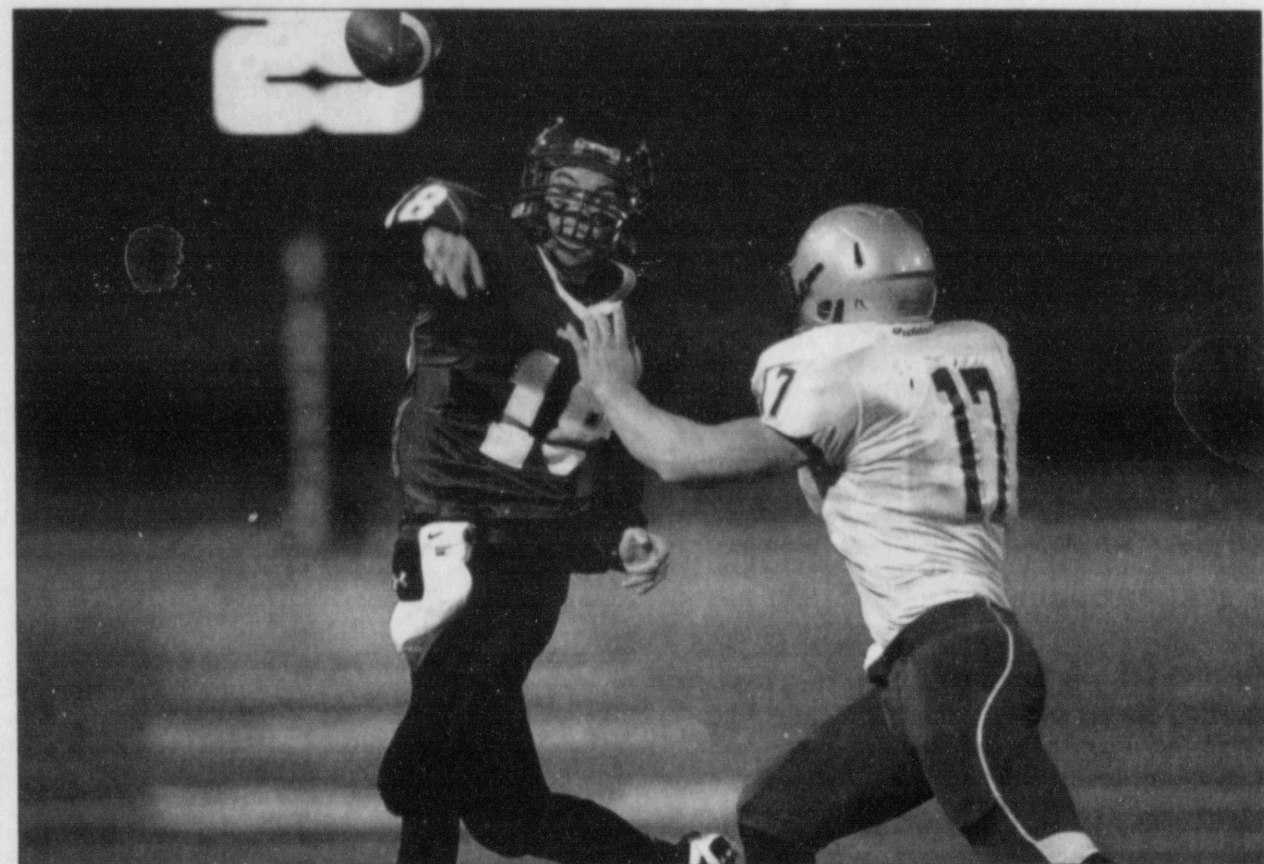
They didn't, getting big games from the H&H Boys to smack Dubuque Wahlert, 36-14, in the regular-season finale at Kingston Stadium.

"I'm not sure about the seedings and all that," said Kennedy's Trevor Heitland. "I just knew it was a big game for us."

Heitland rushed for 164 yards and three touchdowns, and Alex Hillyer added 95 yards and two scores as Kennedy finished 5-4 and with momentum heading into the opening round of post-season play Wednesday night. It made its other opponents happy, too, because a winning record increased their respective standings point totals and ultimately their playoff seedings.

Pretty much win-win all around.

"I don't think there are too many people around who gave us a shot when the season started," said Kennedy Coach Tim Lewis. "We were so young

and inexperienced. We started out pretty rough, got shellacked by a couple of pretty good football teams. But I'm just really happy for these guys for bouncing back and battling like they have."

This game turned on a huge defensive play

by Kennedy safety Josh Jahlas late in the second quarter. He intercepted a Riley McCarron pass at the Cougars 13 and returned it to the 47.

Quarterback Chico Lizarraga hit Heitland for a 19-yard TD pass with 19.6 seconds left in the

half, with the extra point tying the game at 14-14 at halftime. Kennedy scored on its initial possession in the second half (a Hillyer 1-yard plunge), and it was pretty much all Cougars from there.

Lizarraga completed 13 of 24 passes for 192 yards

to perfectly complement Kennedy's ground game, which produced 251 yards.

The Cougars defense also was able to contain dangerous Wahlert quarterback Riley McCarron.

Spartans ride ground game, Grinnell mistakes to win, 3A-6 title

Solon will start another trip to the state playoffs right where it started the season, playing DeWitt Central.

The Spartans (8-1) defeated Grinnell (7-2), 31-14, last night in Grinnell to capture the District 3A-6 title. Their first-round playoff date next Wednesday will be a rematch of the season-opener, won by Solon 28-21.

"Our kids understand the mental, emotional and physical grind (of the postseason)," Solon Coach Kevin Miller told KCRG 9.2 after the game.

The defending state champion Spartans used turnovers and a punishing ground game to stop the Tigers. Tim Lance returned a pair of first-quarter fumbles for two touchdowns. Solon scored a put-away TD after a fourth-quarter interception.

Cody Fritz rushed for 138 yards and one TD on

28 carries. Quarterback J.J. Hanus added 89 yards and a TD on 13 carries and also completed 11 of 19 passes for 143 yards.

WEST BRANCH 35, NORTH CEDAR 0 — Three ballcarries hit the 100-yard rushing mark as West Branch totaled 413 yards on the ground at home.

Cade Jones led the way with 137 yards and a touchdown. Bo Bower and Brandon Young added 100 each and two, 2 TDs apiece.
