In his first full season of racing after a six-year hiatus, Hawkeye Downs Wall of Famer Kevin Korsmo celebrated his Legends division debut season with a points

championship, his first since capturing the sportsmen division championship in 2005.

'This one has been just a blast this season running with these guys, Korsmo said. "I'll tell you what, it's been one of my favorite seasons.'

Matt Petrzelka punctuated his defense of his 2011 hobby stock championship with his ninth feature win of the season.

"It's been a good year for me," Petrzelka said.

Sportsman division winner Dave McCalla credits his crew for a dominant season in which he won 11 of 14 features to earn his first points championship since winning three straight (2006-

08).
"It feels really good, I asked a lot of them this year and they really stepped up," McCalla

Quick start to Wash

Warriors drop Cougars in Valley opener at Kingston

The Gazette CEDAR RAPIDS — That thing about Cedar Rapids Washington being in a rebuilding situation? You apparently can forget that.

That thing about Cedar Rapids Kennedy getting off to a quick start to a season? Forget that, too.

It probably doesn't qualify as a shocker, but Washington's 17-6 win last night in the season opener at Kingston Stadium certainly was surprising. Mitch Bredeson rushed for 115 yards and two first-half touchdowns to get the inexperienced Warriors off to a beginning a veteran Kennedy team sorely wanted.

"I think they were expecting to win, and I think we showed that we can still play," said

Bredeson, one of very few returning players from Washington's Class 4A state playoff quarterfinal team last year. "We kept fighting and did a great job.'

Kennedy has had a habit of starting seasons slowly and finishing strongly, a pattern it thought it could break considering all of its returning players, especially up front offensively. Running back Alex Hillyer rushed 19 times for 138 yards, but the Cougars could never dent the end zone, settling for a pair of Eric Bertroche field goals.

Bredeson capped an 80-yard drive on the game's initial series with a 2-yard TD run for Washington, then broke loose for a 47yard TD on a counter play in the second quarter. Riyad Ajram's 30-yard field goal in the third provided the

'Defending Dondre (Alexander) and Jeremy (Morgan), that's a mismatch for anybody," Sauser said. "If anybody tries to keep up with them one-on-one, nobody's going to keep up with them.

Individual mismatch-

es. Collective mismatch. Nate Boland passed for 237 yards as West ended Linn-Mar's ninegame regular-season winning streak, 49-14, in a Mississippi Valley Conference interdivisional football game last night at Linn-Mar Stadium.

West's seven touchdowns were scored by six players.

A junior, Boland proved to be a worthy successor under center to Charles Rogers, who is at Iowa State these days. He completes 14 of 22 passes, and two touchdowns.

Boland connected with six receivers, locating those mismatch guys — Alexander and Morgan — four times apiece.
"That was a heck

of a first game for (Boland)," Sauser said. "He was calm, cool and collected.'

Alexander's four snags accounted for 118 yards. And Ezra Reiners ran for 118 yards and a score.

West (1-0) is ranked No. 5 in Class 4A by The Gazette/KCRG. The Associated Press' first rankings will be released Monday.

The Trojans came up empty on their first drive, then scored on their next four.

Boland connected with Morgan for a 14yard touchdown, Fullback Colin Baker tallied from 4 yards out, Boland hooked up with Micah Kelsay for a 10-yard score, then took it in himself on fourth-andgoal from 6 yards away.

West led 28-0 at halftime, racking up 294 yards.

Linn-Mar (0-1) had one serious drive in the first half, reaching the West 20 midway through the second quarter. But the Lions went back-

For Xavier, on a night it honored its seniors, it was the Saints only stumble of the game.




