No. 1 'Bama comes calling on Tigers

Kansas City Star COLUMBIA, Mo. — Like many of his Missouri teammates, Brad McNulty knows he will have his

hands full this weekend.
Alabama, the No. 1
team in the land, is here
today. McNulty, a redshirt freshman center
from Texas — who is
making just his second
collegiate start — will
be lined up across from
senior nose guard Jesse
Williams, a 6-foot-4,
320-pound behemoth who
bench-pressed 600 pounds
this summer.

Six. Hundred. Pounds. "I was aware of it at the time," McNulty said, respectfully.

The scarier thing is this: While Williams is a good player, he is but one piece of a Crimson Tide defense that's loaded with size, speed and NFL-caliber talent.

"Not many teams score many points (against them)," Tigers receiver T.J. Moe said with a chuckle.

Indeed. While Williams and other potential NFL Draft picks, such as cornerback Dee Milliner and linebacker Nico Johnson, help the Crimson Tide pass the eye test, Alabama's defensive stat line is even more formidable.

At 5-0, the defending national champions have allowed an average of 191 yards and seven points per game — the best marks in the nation. The Tide also lead the nation in turnover margin. They've recovered six fumbles and recorded nine interceptions while committing only three turnovers.

In other words, this is exactly the kind of team that Missouri's struggling offense — which ranks 80th in the nation in scoring, with 25 points per game, and 95th in the nation in total offense, at 356 yards per game — probably doesn't need to see

right now.
"They're No. 1 in the nation in almost every statistical category," Missouri Coach Gary Pinkel said. "Obviously, it's difficult, but that's the challenge, and that's what's fun about playing in a game like this."

It would certainly be a lot more fun if Missouri's offense wasn't so banged up. Jack Meiners and Mitch Morse, regular starters on the Tigers' offensive line, will miss the game because of knee injuries, while left tackle Elvis Fisher will again play on a balky knee.


Most important, starting quarterback James Franklin — who was beginning to look like his old self in the first half of Missouri's 19-15 loss to Vanderbilt last Saturday — will again sit out because of a sprained knee ligament.

That means red-shirt freshman Corbin Berkstresser — who struggled mightily against Vandy, completing only nine of 30 passes — will get the call in a game that will be nationally televised by CRS

tionally televised by CBS. "I think he'll be fine; he'll settle down," Pinkel said. "I think he's very capable. ... He's not the first quarterback to have a tough day."

While Missouri would certainly love to take refuge in its running game—running back Kendial Lawrence is averaging a respectable 5.7 yards per carry—Alabama is third in the nation in rush defense, allowing just 65 yards per game.

It's safe to say Berkstresser is going to have to iron out the kinks in his delivery — something Pinkel alluded to Monday — and make plays with his arm to give his team any chance of winning.

Slow start, then Trojans shine

Jefferson gives West a pretty good tussle early in a 71-14 defeat

No. 2 Iowa City West's

No. 2 Iowa City West's potent offense looked rusty in the first half.
The Trojans even trailed 7-0 before rattling off 29 unanswered points and 42 in the second half in a big 71-14 win over Cedar Rapids Jefferson last night at Trojan Field.
The Trojans (8-0, 5-0)

The Trojans (8-0, 5-0) clinched the Mississippi Division title behind Ezra Reiners' 118 yards and three touchdowns.

West's 437 points this season set a Mississippi Valley Conference record, topping Iowa City High's 423 in 1993. The Trojans are a win from their first undefeated regular season since 1999.

West threw an interception on its first pass and then bit on a halfback pass to fall behind 7-0 in the opening minutes. The Trojans, coming off their first win in eight years over Iowa City High in the Battle for the Boot, re-

sponded in a big way. Reiners' 1-yard run

tied it up midway through the quarter and a Jeremy Morgan's interception and return to the 2-yard line set up the go-ahead score.

West's Reid Bonner's 64-yard punt return for a TD was the highlight of the night. Bonner broke at least five tackles on the swirling run. He appeared to be wrapped up at one point but broke through.

Jefferson (1-7, 1-4), which has been shut out in three games, had a strong first half against one of the state's best teams.

Layne Sullivan jumped a slant pass on West's

first play for an interception. Jefferson converted the turnover into a 30-yard TD on a nifty halfback pass from Michael Moncivais to Blake Bernauer for a quick 7-0 lead. Bernauer hauled in a 30-yard TD pass from Sullivan with 14 seconds left in the half to get the J-Hawks within two scores.

Bears roll, in playoffs once again

West Branch is in the high school football playoffs for the 21st time.

Getting four touchdowns from Cole Cook — two through the air and two on the ground — the Bears rolled past Eddyville-Blakesburg, 62-22, last night in a Class 1A-6 game at home.

Cade Jones rushed for 101 yards and three touchdowns and Bo Bower added 105 yards and two TDs as West Branch improved to 3-2, 6-2.

Kennedy continues late-season push toward a berth in playoffs

CEDAR RAPIDS — Cedar Rapids Kennedy used a hot start to stay on fire.

Donovan Kosman returned the opening kickoff 89 yards for a touchdown and Alex Hillyer scored four times in the first half to ignite the Cougars to a third straight win, 48-7, over Dubuque Hempstead last night at Kingston Stadium.

The effort has been good throughout the season, but the Cougars own an increased sense of urgency to earn an eighth straight postseason berth.

"Seniors have figured out they're getting toward the end of this thing and

they want to keep playing," Kennedy Coach Tim Lewis said before the game. "They're looking back to what we've done in the past with the late runs.

"We've played decent at times the last few games and we decided we were starting a new season the Jefferson (game) week, and we were going to take it one game at a time from there."

Kennedy (3-5, 2-3 division) tallied 252 yards on the ground, dominating Hempstead in the first half. Hillyer ran through and by the Mustangs regularly before the break, capping Kennedy's first two drives with 4- and 10-yard touchdown runs.

The Hillyer effect was apparent when he ran for gains of 26, 34 and 6 yards on consecutive plays to account for the Cougars' entire fourth offensive drive. Hillyer also added a 5-yard touchdown as time expired in the first half, giving the Cougars a 41-0 lead at the break.

Hillyer, who is second in Class 4A in rushing yards, amassed 221 last night to give him 1,203 this season.

The struggles continued after the break for Hempstead (0-8, 0-6 division), which fumbled on the first play from scrimmage in the second half. Kennedy took advantage on Alex Boomershine's 3-yard TD. Boomershine

The Saints held Cedar Falls to 99 yards of total offense and just four first downs in the first half of action.


Ryan Persick converted a 30-yard field goal to
