C.R. Kennedy slips past Senior

CEDAR RAPIDS — It was a long wait. A wet wait. But the Kennedy Cougars finally capped a soggy night with a homecoming win.

Cedar Rapids Kennedy moved to 3-1 last night, downing Dubuque Senior, 19-9, in a MVC Mississippi Division game at Kingston Stadium.

The game was delayed by a severe thunderstorm. The sophomore game was delayed, then cut short in the third quarter at about 6:15 p.m.

Officials waited out the wind and the lightning, with the varsity game starting at 8:40 p.m. A steady rain continued throughout.

Senior was the surprise of the MVC last year, but has been a major disappointment this season. The Cougars extended the Rams' misery by stopping their running attack cold.

The Rams were held to minus-5 yards on the ground in the first half, and Kennedy went into the locker room with a 12-2 led.

Kennedy journeyed 60 yards in an eight-play march on its second drive. Miles Moa opened it with a 21-yard run, then Logan Wedo capped it with a 5-yard touchdown run with 7 seconds left in the first

quarter. The PAT attempt was blocked, leaving it at 6-0.

An alert play by Anthony Carter set up the Cougars' second TD. A 42-yard field goal attempt was misheld, and Jack Kloft shanked it short of

the goal line. Carter hesitated, then picked it up around the 5-yard line. He took off, eluded a tackler and was off to the races before being drug down at the Senior 21.

On third-and-goal from the

3, quarterback Derek Jacobus raced for the right pylon and extended the ball to the end zone to make it 12-0 with 2:30 left in the half.

the place."

Area Shriners heard about the accident and helped the family with eight prosthetic hands over the years. One is cosmetic and another allows him to move the palm, middle and index fingers to grasp things.

"They've made life easier," he said.

Originally a student at Star-mont, Olinger planned to play football before his accident. Seventh grade is when the school begins its tackle football program. Just because he was missing his left hand didn't alter those plans. Olinger played and fell in love with the game.

"After the accident, we told him he could still do anything he wanted, and he has," said Gene Olinger, Paul's dad. "He just loves football."

"I don't think of Paul as having any sort of disability what-

soever," said Ed-Co Coach James Rochford. "He's just Paul. He's got a high motor, a lot of energy. It doesn't really surprise me what he's done."

What he's done is start three years. He led the Vikings in tackles last season and is tops again through three games.

He's Ed-Co's leading rusher with 289 yards and a touchdown, averaging 6.3 yards per carry.

Throw in kickoff return duties and a roster of just 15 players, and he never leaves the field.

Ed-Co (0-3) hosts Wapsie Valley for homecoming tonight.

"It all starts in the weight room," Paul said. "I mean, I'm probably in there 90, 95 percent of the time throughout the year. Just dedication, I guess. Even that gets to be a challenge, you know? Benching, squatting, doing all that. But I find ways to do it."

"Sometimes it's scary to watch him play," said Geraldine Olinger, Paul's mom. "But I support him in whatever he wants to do."

Rochford said Olinger can catch a football as well as anyone on his team. Olinger proudly said he hasn't fumbled this season.

He even finished last week's game against Postville at quarterback because of an injury. Ed-Co switched to a shotgun pistol formation to accommodate him, since he's unable to take snaps directly under center — one of the few things he can't do on the football field.

"I asked, 'Who wants to play quarterback?,' and he was the first to volunteer," Rochford said. "That didn't surprise me at all. Paul is the ultimate team player."

And he's very well-liked and admired at school.

Geraldine said homecoming

week included a day when Ed-Co students could dress up as one of their teachers, and teachers could do the same as students.

"Four teachers were dressing up like Paul," she said, proudly.

Olinger wasn't keen on allowing his tale of courage in overcoming adversity to be told.

He has never wanted to draw attention to himself or his malady, although he did show a moment of swagger when asked how he is able to accumulate so many defensive tackles with only one hand.

"If I hit them hard enough, they just kind of fall over," he said. "I've got movement in my whole left arm, so I can wrap up guys. I love hitting. I do. I get told I hit just as hard on offense as I do on defense. Either way, they get smoked."

422 yards and five touchdowns. He has 113 receiving yards on seven catches and a score.

Coach Marv Cook said a trait of a good team is depth at running back.

"We have multiple guys we can put in there," Cook said. "As good as Riley is, he's a very talented football player, these other guys have

strengths as well. We'll play to their strengths.

"Some of these guys are powerful runners and bring a little bit different mindset to the running back position. Ultimately, I think they will be just as effective."

Cook said Brinkman is a good decision-maker who leads with his shoulder pads and runs hard. He described Adam as a "true north-south runner"

who doesn't dance around in the backfield. Nick Phillips, who saw action as a freshman and has been a target as a wide receiver, is shifty like Dixon. Elliott Halsch is big and physical.

Regina's game plan won't change with the personnel.

"We're still going to run what we run and do what we do," Cook said.

"We have to be effective

with it."

The offensive line plays an important part in the running success with improved blocking. Regina has run for 668 yards and 10 touchdowns and averages 6.7 yards per carry.

"Our offensive line has stepped up," Dixon said. "They made huge strides last week."

section for game sales while continuing to sell available tickets to students.

"We would prefer that it be filled with students because we believe that it's part of being a college student," Klatt said. "But if they're not going to buy them, and we've given them ample opportunity, we'll most certainly make them available to fans of the Hawkeyes."

"Our student numbers are down, but they're the ones who react the most quickly to wins and losses. I think that's probably a national fact of life."

Iowa has company in the slow sales department. While its student tickets sold out,

Wisconsin's general public season-ticket renewal rate was 95 percent this year, down from 97.5 percent, according to the Capital Times. In two games against comparable opponents on its 2012 schedule (FCS, mid-major opponent), the Badgers averaged 77,045 fans, down from 79,450 last year.

Michigan State played high-profile 2012 home games against Boise State and Notre Dame. In the same time span this year, the Spartans have played Western Michigan, South Florida and Youngstown State. The average attendance for those games in 2012 was 78,964. For three games this year, it's 71,080. Minnesota and Penn State also have drops.

Southeastern Conference schools Auburn, Missouri and Vanderbilt have struggled. Arkansas averages about 6,000 fewer fans for two home games after a 4-8 season last year. Tennessee returned 3,500 of its 8,000-ticket allotment against Florida this weekend. West Virginia, Baylor and Kansas have witnessed declines.

"The tricky part of it now is once we get into the season, sale of tickets get tied to team performance," Klatt said. "No surprise there. If we get on a winning streak, boom, all those tickets get purchased by people getting excited. If we win-one, lose-one, the sales kind of reflect that choppy win-one, lose-one approach.

There's a method to the madness to try to sell as many tickets before the season as we can because all of a sudden you're swayed to the things that are out of your control."

Klatt said the school plans to market student tickets more aggressively next year.

"We'd like to think that last year was an anomaly, and we'll be winning more than losing again," Klatt said. "I truly believe that. That student issue will rebound nicely, and we'll have in our football stadium the swing back to that whole supply and demand, and we'll have more demand and tickets available."

49ers' Smith
busted again on
suspicion of DUI

San Francisco 49ers pass rusher Aldon Smith was arrested Friday morning for suspicion of DUI and marijuana possession after he was involved in a crash, according to the Santa Clara County Sheriff's Department.

Smith was the driver in a single-vehicle accident, according to San Jose Police.

Nobody was injured in the crash. He was arrested at 7 a.m.

The Bay Area News Group reported that marijuana and pills were also found in the car. Smith was driving when he crashed into a tree. He also reportedly had a blood alcohol content level of 0.15.

An NFL spokesman told the Bay Area News Group that such an arrest could result in a suspension, per league policy.

It is Smith's second DUI arrest since the 49ers drafted him in the first round in 2011 out of Missouri.

Smith played football and basketball for a couple of years at Cedar Rapids Washington before moving to Missouri with his family. He played college football at Missouri.
