Boston celebrates with victory in 6

BOSTON — The Boston Red Sox completed a rousing run from a last-place finish to top of the baseball universe by routing the St. Louis Cardinals, 6-1, last night in Game 6 to win the World Series

The emphatic victory gave the Red Sox a 4-2 triumph in the best-of-seven Fall Classic for their third championship in 10 seasons, starting the surge when they ended an 86-year title drought with their 2004 sweep of the Cardinals.

Shane Victorino, back in the lineup after missing two games

with a stiff back, led the way with a three-run double in the third and a bases-loaded single in the fourth for four runs bat-

Closer Koji Uehara retired Matt Carpenter for the final out, setting off wild celebrations on the field and in the stands for the first World Series clinched in front of the home fans at Fenway Park since their 1918 championship.

It was an emotional climax for a team that had finished last in the American League East in 2012 with a 69-93 record. and had vowed to "B strong" in

deadly bomb attacks at the finish line of the Boston Marathon

The Red Sox became the only team other than the 1991 Minnesota Twins to go from last place one year to World Series champion the next year.

While Victorino and the Red Sox did their damage against the Cardinals' 22-year-old rookie sensation Michael Wacha. Boston starter John Lackey held St. Louis in check. He went 6-2/3 innings, scattering


Ott wanted that single-digit number when he reported in August 2012.

Kingston Stadium.

Miles Moa ran for two touchdowns, Derek Jacobus connected with Jacob Shannon for two more, and Logan Daughetee put a cherry on it with an 80-yard interception for a score.

The Cougars (7-3) advance to face No. 7 Davenport Assumption in the second round Monday at Brady Street Stadium. Assumption (9-1) handled Davenport Central, 26-0.

It was Kennedy's second win over the Hawks (5-5) this season. In the regular season, the Cougars had to come from behind. Wednesday, they got ahead and

staved ahead.

'It was so important to keep scoring," Jacobus said.
"They knew what was coming, but this was one of the best team efforts we've has all season.

Moa rushed for 124 yards to lead a balanced attack. Jacobus ran for 79, and completed 4 of 5 passes with two touchdowns to Shannon.

CEDAR RAPIDS — This game was over in a hurry.



No repeat; West in a rout

IOWA CITY - Iowa City West ran wild in wet conditions.

The Class 4A fifth-ranked Trojans racked up 535 yards on the ground — 398 in the first half — in a dominating 69-7 win over Dubuque Hempstead last night in a first-round playoff game at Trojan Field.

Quarterback Nate Boland ran for 191 yards and three touchdowns for West (9-1), which will play Bettendorf next Monday in the second round.

"Our guys up front dominated both sides," West Coach Brian Sauser said.

Hempstead (4-6) managed two first downs in the game and only 22 yards in the first half against West's first-team defense.

This game didn't even remotely resemble the 39-35 win West eked out over Hempstead in the regular season. The Trojans needed a go-ahead touchdown drive in the final minute earlier this month to avoid the

West's dominance on both lines turned a could-be stressful rematch into a relaxing and resounding win. The Trojans averaged 9.2 yards per carry. They had 13 runs for 10 or more yards in the first half

Devin Raffensperger rushed 12 times for 110 yards and two TDs. Micah Kelsay finished with 76 yards, including a 64yard TD in the second quarter.

West's playoff loss to Bettendorf two years ago set the tone for this game. Sauser thought that team relied too much on outside speed and saw an opportunity when rain popped up in the forecast.

"For two years we've been building for a night like this," Sauser said. "I thought this would be an interesting test for us to see if we can line up against a good team and just pound the football.'

The Trojans aced it and were equally impressive on defense. In the first half, half of Hempstead's runs didn't get back to the line of scrimmage. West finished with six sacks.
