


Iowa opened the game with a 52-12 run and Jarrod Uthoff scored a team-high 14 points in his Hawkeye debut in Iowa's impressive 82-39 victory last night over UNC-Wilmington.

Freshman Peter Jok added 11 points in his first game as eight Hawkeyes scored at least five points.

Iowa (1-0) dominated the opener in a year when many are predicting a return to the NCAA tournament. Iowa looked sharp with an aggres-


sive defense and quick, up-tempo offense.



CEDAR RAPIDS — They held hands and walked from end zone to end zone. A couple of them stopped at midfield and kissed the turf, more than a couple of them jumped and hung on one of the goal-post crossbars.

them were smiling. The last home game for a memorable senior class at Cedar Rapids Xavier ended successfully. Probably appropriately successful.

"These guys have believed and worked hard their entire careers here," Xavier Coach Duane Schulte said after his team's 21-0 win over Cedar Rapids Kennedy in a grind-them-out Class 4A playoff quarterfinal last night. "It's a tribute and a reward for them."

scored three touchdowns in the third quarter to move on to the semifinals a second straight year. The opponent next Friday at the UNI-Dome is Bettendorf (9-2).

Regina claws a step closer to title No. 4

DELHI — Survive and advance.

Iowa City Regina realizes how crucial the former is and how fortunate it is to be able to do the latter.

The top-ranked Regals scored 21 unanswered points, including 11 in the final quarter to defeat No. 4 Maquoketa Valley, 24-7, last night in a Class 1A quarterfinal. Regina plays No. 8 North Fayette Valley (11-1) in a semifinal contest next Saturday at the UNI-Dome in Cedar Falls.

"I think they're learning now that you have to cherish it "Regina Coach Mary Cook

said. "The road to the Dome is a difficult thing. Fortunately enough, tonight our kids made enough plays to move us one step closer."

The Regals (12-0) won their 54th straight game, pulling within one game of the state's record winning streak by Waterloo East (1965-71), but more importantly still contending for a fourth straight championship. Regina won the 1A title last season after two straight 2A crowns. The Wildcats (11-1) threatened the streak for three-and-a half quarters.

Five straight trips to the state semifinals, four straight championships and 42 straight wins had spoiled the Spartans.

A two-year state semifinal drought since Solon's last title Class 3A in 2010 — ended last night in a 28-20 win over Class 3A No. 2 Decorah, and

"I think sometimes you don't appreciate the fact that when you go there for five straight years, what it is to be there," said Solon Coach Kevin Miller. "And now being away from it for a couple years, being away from that magical experience, I think you respect it that much

Solon earned its way

back to the UNI-Dome on the strength of a young man who is new to the Spartan tradition. Quarterback Jacob Black, a transfer from Monticello, carried the ball 25 times for 112 yards and two touchdowns and hit 7 of 10 passes for 133 yards and two more

Black also had the gameending interception of Decorah's Bryce Pierce.

Miller pointed to how diffi-

cult task it can be for a teenager to enter a new school for his senior year and adapt as one of many reasons he's proud of his quarterback.

"His knowledge on both sides of the ball, Miller said, keeps the Spartans in line and is one of the biggest reasons for their success

"It says a lot about his leadership. We put a lot on his shoulders, obviously, a lot of the things we do go directly

through him," Miller said. "He leads by example. He's a positive leader. I can't say enough great things about what he's meant to our program.
